

The Meeting of the Nibley City Council held at Nibley City Hall, 625 W. 3200 S. Nibley, Utah, on Thursday, November 18, 2010.

The following actions were made during the meeting:

**Councilman Hansen motioned to approve the plans and final design for the new city hall. Councilman Jacobsen seconded the motion. The vote tied 2-2; with Councilman Hansen and Councilman Jacobsen in favor. Councilman Dustin and Councilman Larsen were opposed. Mayor Knight broke the tie with a yea vote. The motion passed 3-2.**

**Councilman Dustin motioned to approve the nominees for the tree board of Nibley City. Councilman Jacobsen seconded the motion. The motion passed 3-1; with Councilman Dustin, Councilman Jacobsen, and Councilman Hansen in favor. Councilman Larsen was opposed.**

**Councilman Hansen motioned to approve Ordinance 10-08—Penalties for not cleaning snow from city sidewalks; changing \$50.00 to \$25.00 and with no 24 hour waiver. Councilman Jacobsen seconded the motion. The motion passed 3-0; with Councilman Hansen, Councilman Jacobsen, and Councilman Larsen.**

**Councilman Hansen motioned to table the snow removal policy discussion. Councilman Jacobsen seconded the motion. The motion failed 2-1 with Councilman Hansen and Councilman Jacobsen in favor. Councilman Larsen was opposed.**

**Councilman Larsen motioned to approve the snow removal policy as written with the change of “manpower” to “city worker” and with the removal of number 3. Councilman Jacobsen seconded the motion. The motion failed 2-1 with Councilman Larsen and Councilman Jacobsen in favor. Councilman Hansen was opposed.**

**Councilman Larsen motioned to approve Resolution 10-09—the Appointment of Scott Larsen as City representative to the Cache Mosquito Abatement District board; striking from the word “or” to the end. Councilman Jacobsen seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously 3-0; with Councilman Larsen, Councilman Jacobsen, and Councilman Hansen in favor.**

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#### OFFICIAL MINUTES OF THE MEETING

Mayor Gerald Knight called the Thursday, November 18, 2010 Nibley City Council meeting to order at 6:05 p.m. Those in attendance included Mayor Gerald Knight, Councilman Larry Jacobsen, Councilman Brian Hansen, Councilman Scott Larsen, and Councilman Shaun Dustin. Also in attendance were City Manager, Larry Anhder, and City Planner, Shari Phippen. Councilman Thayne Mickelson was excused from the meeting.

**Call to order, approval of the evening's agenda and minutes of the November 4, 2010 meeting.**

Councilman Jacobsen made a motion to approve the minutes from November 4<sup>th</sup> and the evening's agenda. Councilman Hansen seconded the motion.

Mr. Anhder noted that the First Responders would not be present to make their presentation as per the agenda.

The motion passed unanimously 3-0; with Councilman Jacobsen, Councilman Hansen, and Councilman Larsen in favor.

**Review and approval of final design of new city hall**

Mr. James Child and Lisa Erickson with JRCA Architects, Inc. were present at the meeting and gave a presentation on the design features of the new city hall. Wayne Anderson, with DWA Construction was also present at the meeting. Mr. Child said these samples would define what the actual materials were but the final color would be decided through the bidding process.

Lisa Erickson said they had brick and stone which would be the main features on the space. She had example of the products that would be used on the building. She said the final color selection could be decided later. Mr. Child also brought sample shingles.

Mr. Child moved to the plan for the inside of the building and discussed color and window possibilities. Ms. Erickson talked about the key finishes for the interior space; they were flooring, wood, and paint. She had samples of those items. Mr. Child and Miss Erickson went through the new city hall room by room with a schematic and sample material and color choices.

Councilman Dustin arrived at 6:45.

Mr. Anderson said they had their bid dates set for the 2<sup>nd</sup> of December at 2:00 P.M.; it would take a couple of days to put those together with a scoring matrix and then they would be brought to the Council for a final decision. Mr. Anderson said they have had a lot of people looking at the plans and he thought they would get really good value for the city with the bid plan. Councilman Larsen asked Mr. Anderson if he foresaw any potential problems at this point. Mr. Anderson said they needed to have further discussion on the earth work; he was not sure the city had the equipment necessary to make the ground ready in time. He said they were looking at a end of February start date and a November finish date.

Mayor Knight said he would like a vote on approval of the final design plans for the building or the building layout. Councilman Larsen asked why he wanted a vote. Mayor Knight said because a Councilman had requested they be a part of this process and weigh in on the final design. Councilman Larsen said it did not matter because it was already out to bid. Mayor Knight said they could make changes if the Council voted to make a

change; this was the best approach to meet their time line and give the Council what they had requested. Councilman Larsen asked what the Mayor would do if the motion failed. Mayor Knight said they would change the design the way the Council wanted. Councilman Dustin said his concern was not with any particular element; it was with the process. His feeling was this had been “ramrodded” and had not received due consideration; they are trying to get things done in a certain amount of time. It has gone too fast. This accentuated the idea that the process was already in place and now they expected the Council to rubber stamp it and that is the wrong way to run government. Mayor Knight said he disagreed; he did feel they gave due consideration and he has yet to hear what the problems were. Councilman Dustin said the focus has always been on the design standpoint and not whether they needed this or not. Councilman Dustin noted the public present at the public hearing and the fact that less than 25% spoke in favor of the building. Councilman Dustin said the design and layout of the building when he looked at the master plan and the way things are laid out he did not feel that received due consideration because the process had been so accelerated; that is not the place where he would put the city center. Councilman Larsen said the Mayor did not understand his opposition. Councilman Larsen said his opposition was a process thing too. He did not feel it was appropriate for the final design to go out and then have it come back for approval. It was just like the planting of trees on 3200 South and then approving a tree plan. It was trees in the ground. He said things come back to them after the fact and they are the ones spending the money. He wondered what good his vote would do. He said they did not follow the steps. Mayor Knight said the number one step is to find something that looks good and try to mimic it. He said they would agree to disagree. Mayor Knight said according to him Councilman Larsen’s concerns were that they were putting money into a new city hall and not into other areas. Councilman Larsen asked how that addressed that concern. Mayor Knight said it didn’t.

Councilman Hansen made a motion to approve the plans and final design for the new city hall. Councilman Jacobsen seconded the motion.

Councilman Jacobsen asked Mr. Child about the south elevation and eaves that would maximize the winter sun exposure but would give some shade in the summer based on sun elevation. Mr. Child said the eaves were about 30 inches deep and should provide those types of angles. Councilman Jacobsen said they also discussed some minimal LEADS certification that would not break the bank. Mr. Child said as far as materials they were receiving those benefits. Councilman Hansen asked for clarification on material selection. Councilman Dustin said he appreciated the opportunity to weigh on the building but being asked after the fact did not do much. He felt it had become rather systemic of the way they did things around here; it seemed to happen on a regular basis and needed to stop.

The vote tied 2-2; with Councilman Hansen and Councilman Jacobsen in favor. Councilman Dustin and Councilman Larsen were opposed. Mayor Knight broke the tie with a yea vote. The motion passed 3-2.

**7:00—Public Hearing—to receive comments about the proposed Park and Trail**

### **Master Plan for Nibley City**

Mayor Knight said this process had involved reaching out to the public to see what their thought were and what their desires and needs were for the parks in the city. The consultants they had been using helped draft the plan. The consultants did an analysis of the future parks needs in the city. He outlined the preferred option on page 22; in the next 15-20 years Nibley will need an additional 50-60 acres of parks facilities. They recommended putting most of that in one location with possible a regional park. The cost of that plan is about \$5.5 million. That is a park that will be built over the next 15-20 years as they can afford it, partly with impact fees. Mayor Knight gave instructions to the public present.

Mayor Knight opened the public hearing at 7:19.

Casey Judd, the recreation director for Nibley City said when they did the master plan they compared Nibley to other small communities. He with softball and baseball they have 25+ teams they are trying to facilitate on 2 fields; the older size boys do not have a regulation field to play on. Mr. Judd said they have 3.61 soccer fields and the needs are for 4.51. There is a need for these things already; they already need to get going. He said the plan was valid and he supported it; it was time to start moving forward.

Allan Haycock said he was over soccer in the Nibley area. He said they had 400+ kids in their recreation soccer program; this did not include competition teams. They now have 17 competition teams. That is a lot of kids on that green space. He said they also participated in the fall recreation program for the first time and 150 kids participated in that; they were not able to support that program as much as they could have; the need is already there.

Barbara Wilden said this mostly covered a sports complex. It did not address small parks with trees and benches and places to sit and relax for older individuals. She asked if any of the land had been bought on 640.

Corlyss Drinkard said she noticed that a lot of the parks they have are very small and hardly suitable for recreational sport and asked if one of them could be turned into an elder park for relaxation and older individuals. She asked if there had been any discussion on combining land and harmonizing them to serve neighborhoods better.

Richard Leishman said 26 years ago the first parks master plan was developed but because of the speed of the growth none of those parks were recognized or implemented. The city has a lot of land available; they have had a lot of opportunity to pick up land. He noted access to those properties and that there were no ways to access some of these parks. The well site would be a poor place to put a park and the land down by the river. He said they have the properties to develop. Mr. Leishman noted there were a lot of kids playing soccer and that it was mentioned that the soccer fields were full; he noticed that several times they had been full but the park at 3200 South was empty. He said they need to concentrate on what the parks are doing for the city. He said he did like the implementation process included in the plan. He said just because they had 800 kids

playing soccer did not mean they needed to build a 5 million dollar sports complex. He said they need to be cautious and encourage developers with large parcels of ground to leave some of their land for parks. Mr. Leishman said they had a greater need for trails. They have no way to access some of these parks especially if they are across the highway.

Allan Haycock said in his experience the staff implementation had been wonderful. They had acted very responsibly. He said soccer moved away from the 3200 park several years ago to leave room for softball/baseball.

Seeing no other public comments Mayor Knight closed the public hearing at 7:32.

Councilman Larsen said as a member of the steering committee for this plan and being over parks and recreation some time ago he knew the need was there. The plan they got was not necessarily what they thought they would get when they started the process. He thought they would get more plans for all of their parks. Ms. Phippen said she thought an element that was missing from the plan was perhaps retrofitting some of their other parks to meet the needs of individuals without children or not playing sports. Councilman Larsen said he thought they needed more detail in the plan to what they want in parks to give direction to future councils. He thought then needed more conceptual ideas as to what they wanted in different areas. He also thought they needed a larger passive park; they had some properties they could develop for those types of needs and they would cost less to develop. Councilman Larsen said they talked about the Morgan Farm a little in this plan but he felt they should develop plans for all of their properties. Councilman Larsen said he felt they should incorporate the community garden idea in their parks plan. He said Seniors at Utah State University may be looking for opportunities and could design some of these properties for them. Councilman Larsen said he also liked the idea of having community involvement with service days or Eagle Scout projects. He said there may be a possibility for a youth group to do some sort of fund raiser and get a lot of man power for less cost. Councilman Larsen said he would like to have some priorities put in place for how they would accomplish things; they needed to set dates and goals.

Councilman Jacobsen asked Mr. Haycock if he thought all the cities in the area were contributing equally for soccer and how Nibley contributed. Mr. Haycock said looking back there were a lot of city's that had put a lot into providing for areas for kids to play. He said communities like Mendon were recognizing the needs and were trying to provide a space. He thought most cities were proactive but some had become stagnant. Councilman Jacobsen looked at page 9 that inventories existing facilities and asked if that included school facilities. Ms. Phippen said she thought that inventory was only city owned properties. Councilman Larsen said every year baseball gets a letter from the school saying if they did not obey their parking then they were off their fields. Councilman Jacobsen said he thought participation with the school was an incredibly healthy direction to go; it was a double use of the tax payers dollar. Councilman Jacobsen said he thought the trails plan was a bit "wishy". He wished they could spend \$5.5 on a trail plan but that was not realistic. He said trails were also opportunistic as land is developed. He said there was not a lot of "meat" to the trails plan.

Councilman Hansen asked if they finished the field at Heritage as a baseball diamond that would bring them into compliance as of 2010. Councilman Larsen said it would but that was only up to 2010. Councilman Hansen said he appreciated that there was an implementation plan. He leaned on the side of trails as well and he did not feel they were taking a proactive approach to their trail planning. He would like to come up with a trails map that shows a possible phased plan. He said they could include some signage to show that they did have a vision for a trails plan. He did not feel what was included in the plan was a good marketing plan; they could work and enhance the plan to make it more marketable. Councilman Hansen said he was very much in favor of passive parks and the community garden. Councilman Hansen said he still held hope that something could be agreed to and done on Hollow Road.

Councilman Larsen addressed Mrs. Wilden's question about property on 640. He said they do not have a designated spot for the park; they already own 20 of the 50 acres at 640 and they would not have to acquire as much but they don't want to commit themselves there if they have other opportunities. Councilman Larsen said it was not written in stone. He said they are always looking for property when opportunities presents themselves. Mayor Knight read from the proposed master plan when addressing Mr. Leishman's concerns with future development and trails. Mayor Knight said there were those parks that could fit the definition of a park for the elderly; he mentioned Shadow Brook Park. He said they had areas they could dedicate to those uses.

Mr. Anhder said they needed to keep in mind and project themselves 20-30 years into the future. This was very achievable 20-30 years from now. Mr. Anhder said the 640 property is approximately 2 miles from 90% of the community in Nibley and with future growth, would most likely be in the center of Nibley. He agreed they needed something more specific on trails that can be developed now. Some of it would be as development came but this presented a great opportunity for forward thinking.

Councilman Larsen said they needed to have more teeth to their trails plan. He said it could be developer driven to a point. If they could tell people before hand and stick to it then they would have a better trails system. Councilman Larsen said this plan could be a continual process that could be added on to. Mayor Knight asked when the Council would like to see this again. Mayor Knight said he wanted specific Council revisions.

Councilman Dustin said this was basically a capital improvement plan for one park. He wondered if the rest of the Council was alright with that. If it was going to go in that direction he did not see the necessity to put the effort into it. Mr. Anhder said it set the big goal but did not prohibit opportunities that could come up along the way. He said this was so well located that it did away with a lot of the need. Councilman Dustin said he still saw the need for smaller neighborhood parks and said his fear was that they will make a \$5.5 dollar commitment and then everything else would come up with opposition. Mayor Knight said he envisioned coming back with a map that would include areas of where they want to include smaller neighborhood parks. He did not feel the larger park did away with the need for smaller neighborhood parks.

Mayor Knight asked if there were any objections to holding a meeting on the December 16<sup>th</sup>. He requested they bring any major, specific input to that meeting. Councilman Larsen said he thought it would be a good idea to have an open house and show the draft of the plan. Councilman Dustin said he planned on submitting a list of capital improvements that needed to be incorporated into the plan. Mayor Knight expressed that would be great.

### **Presentation and discussion of plans for Morgan Farm by Richard Eversull**

Mr. Richard Eversull was present at the meeting. Mr. Eversull said they were planning the Nativity at this time. He said he and Trudy Knight were working on that together. Last year the cost was about \$1,800; they took in about \$700 along with the food they collected. He thought the Nativity was worthwhile for the community. Mr. Eversull said this next fall they were looking to do a fall festival. He would be working with folklorist and putting in pumpkins, ornamental sunflowers, Indian corn, gourds, etc. Mr. Eversull said he had put about \$1,200 of his own money into the farm; he is trying to make it more accessible to the community. There is some money available from the U S Agricultural Department but they would need to have a long term plan to be eligible for that money. Mr. Eversull said he had talked to Councilman Hansen about the community garden. He said he was willing to do that but realized they would have to have a dedicated area for the garden if they wanted to keep the large animals off the property. Mr. Eversull recognized Trevor Chalfaunt and Justin Bailey who had been helping him put up rail fencing. Mr. Eversull said they have a lot of people who come there on a routine basis and he hoped it was valued as an aesthetic property to the community. He thought there was a considerable interest in having these dedicated parcels. He said he had not totally opened it up to the community because of the liability issues that arise with the old buildings and straw, etc.

Mr. Eversull said he was in San Diego last week with the State Administrators of Vocational Rehabilitation; he is the Utah State chairperson . He noted an organization named Americor that he could utilize. He thought he could involve the community more in improving the farm. Mr. Eversull said he would like to see the city utilize the antique tractors and make them visible to the public. Steve Stowers said he would like to see that area preserved as a farm. Mr. Eversull said he believed they could engage other young people to participate in farming activities; and that not all kids play soccer.

Councilman Hansen said he believed there were at least two buildings that needed to be torn down; they looked like a hazard. Councilman Hansen said he was worried they were not securing the building well enough. Mr. Eversull said he worried about leaving too much public access. He would like to see the barn turned into a place that they could perhaps have a barn dance. Mayor Knight asked how many feet of railing had been put up. Mr. Eversull assumed they had put up approximately 450 ft.

Councilman Larsen asked Mr. Eversull about an incident last year when there were individuals at the farm that were running their horses and a stud service. He was concerned with doing that type of thing and running that type of operation. Mr. Eversull

said they were gone and it was poor judgment on his part. He had trusted someone against his better judgment. Councilman Larsen said he was concerned because he had been there at the park and helped catch a horse when she jumped the fence. Mr. Eversull said that was no longer an issue. Councilman Hansen let Mr. Eversull know how much they appreciated what he did there. Mayor Knight thanked Mr. Eversull also.

Mayor Knight recognized Scout Troop 385 with members Sam Haycock and Nate Haycock and their father Allan Haycock.

### **Approval of appointments to the Nibley City Tree Board**

Mayor Knight said according to Ordinance 10-6 they need to establish a tree board in order to become a Tree City USA. They needed one member from the City Council, one member of the Planning & Zoning Commission, one citizen trained in the field of forestry, landscaping, or horticulture, and 2 citizens at large. The City Planner and Parks Superintendent serve but as non-voting members. The first two terms are two years and the remaining three will have four year terms.

Mayor Knight said he was appointing himself, Commissioner Marina Heidt, the citizen trained in forestry, landscaping, and horticulture, Clayne Liechty, Catherine Anhder Buse, and Andrew Cross who also had training in landscaping. The City Council and Planning & Zoning Commission seats are two year terms and the remaining seats are four year terms.

Councilman Dustin made a motion to approve the nominees for the tree board of Nibley City. Councilman Jacobsen seconded the motion.

Councilman Hansen said Carl Wildrick would be a great resource for this board.

The motion passed 3-1; with Councilman Dustin, Councilman Jacobsen, and Councilman Hansen in favor. Councilman Larsen was opposed.

### **Presentation of Storm Water Master Plan**

BJ Nelson, Nibley City's Storm Water Manager, was present at the meeting. Ms. Phippen this was an unfunded mandate from the Environmental Protection Agency. This was part of the Clean Water Act. Every five years they are required to do this. The State of Utah is now functioning under a new permit effective August 1<sup>st</sup> of this year and they were given 120 days to comply with the State of Utah's permit. Ms. Phippen described the six minimum control measures they had to address. Ms. Phippen said there was also a lot more reporting they had to do now and there were monthly inspections that now had to be carried out. She said it was a requirement that this plan now be presented to the City Council; the man power and bookkeeping requirements would require money from the city. Ms. Phippen said the city would most like be audited by the State in the next three years. Ms. Phippen said this plan needed to be to the State on December 1<sup>st</sup> and she was asking for direction from the Council.

Councilman Dustin left at 9:26.

Mayor Knight recommended the City Council adopt the Storm Water Master Plan; he said they needed to adopt it. Mr. Nelson said the plan needed to be available for public view and they are allowed to make changes constantly throughout the year.

The Council decided to give the State what they had now and they would inform them of any changes they had made. The Council decided to consider adopting the plan at the meeting on December 16<sup>th</sup>.

Mr. Anhder complimented Ms. Phippen and BJ Nelson on the work they had put in to this plan and the education process. Mr. Anhder said the \$4 fee would most likely have to go up.

### **Discussion about enforcement of cleaning snow from sidewalks**

Mayor Knight said there needed to be better attempts at removing snow from our sidewalks. Mr. Anhder said after comments from Councilman Larsen about not enforcing the snow ordinance, he and the Mayor discussed that under the current ordinance mean a fine of \$1,000 and 6 months in jail. They decided to present a definitive fine to the Council. He said if they were going to enforce the ordinance all around the city he estimated that would be 300-500 homes around the city. They have not enforced this in the past because they did not want to send that message to the citizens of the city. Mr. Anhder described the enforcement policy in the ordinance. He believed the Council needed to think through all the ramifications. Mayor Knight said the new policy set out that they would put a door hanger on the violators' door giving those 24 hours to take care of the snow removal. They will only be sited if a complaint is received. Mayor Knight asked how they would address sidewalks that were not used; he thought they should only site on sidewalk that is used. He believed this would educate people. Councilman Larsen said he thought they should enforce snow removal on sidewalks. He noted that every year they educated the citizen with the newsletter and every year they get complaints. It was time to enforce the Ordinance. He also thought the door hanger was a waste of their manpower. Mayor Knight said he believed with a door hanger they will call attention to the problem and the next time around there would be significantly less problems until it became an isolated issue.

### **Consideration of Ordinance 10-08—Penalties for not cleaning snow from city sidewalks**

Councilman Hansen made a motion to approve Ordinance 10-08—Penalties for not cleaning snow from city sidewalks; changing \$50.00 to \$25.00 and with no 24 hour waiver.

Mayor Knight noted that if the violator removed the snow within 24 hours of notice of violation then the fine would be reduced to \$25.00. Mr. Anhder said for simplification they should eliminate that so they wouldn't need the manpower to follow up within the 24 hours. Mr. Anhder said the sheriff's department does not have the manpower to issue that many citations so a summons will be mailed to everybody and it will be three days before anyone receives a summons.

Councilman Jacobsen seconded the motion.

Councilman Hansen asked if a citizen had the avenue of claiming a hardship. Mr. Anhder said they could bring it to the judge. Mrs. Wilden suggested the city could admonish being a good neighbor in their newsletter. Councilman Jacobsen felt that \$25 would not cover their expenses; he was not even sure \$50 would be enough. He recognized this was not a form of income; it was a safety issue but he did not think \$25 would cover their expenses.

The motion passed 3-0; with Councilman Hansen, Councilman Jacobsen, and Councilman Larsen.

Councilman Larsen said he wanted this enforced. He was frustrated that they did not enforce their ordinances. Mr. Anhder viewed the ordinances as the absolute last resort; something they use when they absolutely had to. He was in disagreement that they as a city hammer their residents. Councilman Larsen read from the current ordinance. Councilman Larsen questioned the line “when manpower is available”. The City Council decided to include “city manpower” in that line. Councilman Larsen said he was not for the warning or the door hanger. Mayor Knight asked Councilman Larsen if this was a place they could start from and evaluate later. Councilman Jacobsen asked if they could keep track of warnings and only issue one warning per season. Councilman Jacobsen noted that it was not in there that they only act if there is a complaint but they could put it in.

Councilman Larsen said he felt as a citizen that he was not in favor of 3. He would change that 800 West is plowed. He was in favor of plowings the city’s sidewalks and the sidewalks in front of Weathershield but he wanted to strike 800 W. He would include “where there is farmland that is adjacent to a sidewalk” on 3200 S. but he was not in favor of doing all of 3200 So. Mayor Knight said Bill Saunders had led him to believe that once he got going on 3200 it was just as easy to keep going. Councilman Hansen said where it was a school route then they should do it. Councilman Larsen said if that was the argument then his street was a school route so they should do that. Mr. Anhder noted that they now have to have all the sidewalks plowed in front of their parks within 24 hours. Councilman Hansen said he did not want to change 3. Councilman Hansen said they were minor or major arterials in their city. Mr. Anhder suggested they do the west side of 800 W. and the north side of 3200 S. Councilman Jacobsen said it was hard to justify the favoritism; someone would note that the city was helping certain people in order to avoid removing the snow or paying a fine. Councilman Jacobsen thought they should strike number 3.

Councilman Hansen made a motion to table the policy discussion. Councilman Jacobsen seconded the motion. The motion failed 2-1 with Councilman Hansen and Councilman Jacobsen in favor. Councilman Larsen was opposed.

Councilman Jacobsen said it was not efficient to plow farmland and not just plow the whole thing but it would also be interpreted as favoritism. Councilman Larsen proposed they plow sidewalk along farmland. Councilman Larsen proposed they remove 3 altogether. Councilman Hansen said he thought with the new school they were foolish not to provide some snow removal.

Councilman Larsen made a motion to approve the policy as written with the change of “manpower” to “city worker” and with the removal of number 3; renumbering 4 to 3. Councilman Jacobsen seconded the motion.

Councilman Hansen said he would vote no because he still felt they should remove some snow along 3200. Mr. Anhder said if they don’t plow they would have to enforce it. Mr. Anhder said the City Manager’s policy was if it was not policy then it would not be done.

The motion failed 2-1 with Councilman Larsen and Councilman Jacobsen in favor. Councilman Hansen was opposed.

### **Consideration of Resolution 10-09—Appointment of City representative to the Cache Mosquito Abatement District board**

Councilman Larsen made a motion to approve Resolution 10-09—the Appointment of Scott Larsen as City representative to the Cache Mosquito Abatement District board; striking from the word “or” to the end. Councilman Jacobsen seconded the motion.

Councilman Larsen said the appointment is a four year appointment by state statute; they do not have to be elected. It allows them to appoint someone without going through a process of noticing, etc.

The motion passed unanimously 3-0; with Councilman Larsen, Councilman Jacobsen, and Councilman Hansen in favor.

### **City Manager Report**

Mr. Anhder said the apples tonight were provided by Zion’s Public Finance.

Mr. Anhder said he had the personal ambition of organizing a volunteer group and building the trail along the Blacksmith Fork river starting at the river bridge and ending at either 2900 S. or 3200 S.; whatever land they can acquire. He thought there was an increasing reservoir of volunteer talent in Nibley. There was a lot of work that needed to be done before that point.

### **Council Reports**

Councilman Jacobsen, by citizen request, thought they should revisit the idea of hunting within city limits. He thought they should have an ordinance that prohibits it. Mayor Knight and Councilman Larsen said they were not in favor of that. Councilman Jacobsen said he would try to get it to a vote on his own.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:59 p.m.
