From the Mayor

Dear Nibley Residents,

It is time for our Heritage Days celebration this month. We have a great committee that is enthusiastically organizing the last minute details for the week-long celebration. Mark your calendar and plan on participating in as many of the events as you can. You will not want to miss this great opportunity to connect with neighbors and friends as we celebrate our city's heritage. Look for activity details in this newsletter. Many activities require pre-registration.

For spring break, I took my family to Southeastern Utah to see some of the many Anasazi ruins at Hovenweep National Monument and Mesa Verde National Park. These fascinating remains are all that is left of a once large population of people that occupied the four corners area for several hundred years. These people abruptly abandoned the area around 1290 A.D. leaving behind their homes, some of which are in remarkably good condition, as the only testament to the work and toil required to scrape out a living in this high desert country. It is incredible to imagine what life was like for these early inhabitants of the southwest. This vacation helped me appreciate the importance of a monument to remind one of the critical roles early settlers have on the life we now live. A citizen effort is underway to build a monument to celebrate the settlement of Cache Valley. The project is called "The Beginnings" Pioneer Monument. The first European settlement in Cache Valley was called Elk Horn Ranch which was here in Nibley City. To honor these first settlers, a beautiful sculpture is being planned for the west side of Heritage Park. The monument mostly will be funded with private donations. The organizing committee will be seeking donations during many of the Heritage Days events. Please be generous with your support of this worthy project.

The city is in need of more volunteers to build the city's county fair display. This display represents Nibley City at the Cache County Fair in August. I appreciate all those that have helped in the past. They have represented Nibley well. Please contact me if you are willing to give of your talents to Nibley City.

Finally, please remember to declare your intention to run for city office in person **June 3 to 7** during regular business hours at City Hall. Two council positions and the mayor are up for election. Your service will help shape the character of this wonderful community. Encourage your friends and family to get involved. It is a great opportunity to work with your neighbors in building a great place to call home.

Bear River Head Start Preschool

The Bear River Head Start preschool is now accepting applications for the 2013-2014 school year. Head Start provides:

Family advocacy services • Preschool activities • Home education activities • Parent workshops • Educational services to families at no cost • Nutrition education • Service to children with disabilities ranging from mild to severe disabilities in collaboration with the school district • Assistance for families in obtaining counseling services in collaboration with community agencies • Assists families in obtaining regular dental & health services for their Head Start child.

Children must be 4 years old by September 1, 2013 for Center Based Services or 3 years old by September 1, 2013 for Home Based Services. Head Start does not bus any child to or from school.

When turning in your application, you must bring the following documents: 1. Your child's age verification (birth, blessing, or baptism certificate) 2. Your child's immunization record 3. Wildlife and Nibley City Tree Board News



Would you like a free tree? Come to the Tree Board booth on Saturday, June 22 during Nibley Heritage Days. Nibley's Tree Board will also have lists of good tree species to plant in this area, and tips on how to plant them. All residents are welcome to attend the Tree Board meetings, the first Wednes-

day of each month at 6:30 p.m.

This is still a good time to get new trees in the ground. Remember to report your new planting so Nibley can renew its Tree City USA status.

Why plant more trees?

- They raise property values by thousands of dollars
- They reduce air-conditioning costs by providing shade
- They provide shelter and food for songbirds
- They reduce air pollution
- They are proven to reduce stress levels
- They produce leaves for great fall compost
- They make good visual screens to eliminate unsightly views

- They provide natural windbreaks
- Their roots can remove toxic chemicals from soil
- They absorb carbon dioxide for growth

The all-volunteer Wildlife Committee has successfully made Nibley the first community in Utah registered with the <u>N</u>ational <u>W</u>ildlife <u>F</u>ederation. They are now striving to become officially "certified" by NWF, but can't do it without your help. Please go to www.nwf.org, scroll down to Wildlife Gardening, then click on Certify. There are tips on how you can have your property certified by providing food, water, shelter, and a place to raise young (think songbirds and butterflies) and you don't need a big yard to do this. Beautiful signs can also be ordered to show your neighbors that you care about wildlife. Call 245-9186 to report the date you certify. There will be great tips on certifying at the Heritage Days booth, as well as a free tour map showing homes in Nibley that have become NWF certified. All residents are invited to join the Wildlife Committee meetings the first Wednesday of each month at 7:30 p.m.
