The Scarecrows Are Coming



Why is My Dog Digging?

Dogs dig for a lot of reasons. Your dog may dig because he was bred to be a digger, like a terrier. He may dig because he is hot and wants to lay down on the cool dirt. And, he may dig because he is so bored that he can't think of anything else to do.

Highway 165. A grant from the Tree Utah organization provided funds to help beautify this area and make it attractive to pollinators and residents alike.

The Tree Board would like to remind us of the following:

- Extensive heat can make planting trees a bit of a gamble in July and August. If you find great prices on your desired species, you may want to keep them potted, watered, and stored in the shade along the north side of your home until Fall.
- Please be conservative with your use of water during these hot summer months. Use a broom, not your hose, to clean sidewalks and driveways.
- Remember to report the number of trees you plant this year so that we can apply for the 2012 Tree City Growth Award. Call city hall to report your numbers.
