From the Mayor

As the year winds down, we are finishing one big project and starting another in Nibley City. The concrete lid of the 2,000,000-gallon water tank will be poured by the end of November. The tank will be finished by the end of December. This project represents a \$1,500,000 upgrade to our drinking water delivery system and was done without new taxes from our residents. Building the new City Hall next year will be as important and involved. The final bid for this project will be determined by December 15, 2010. The total cost of the project is estimated to be \$1,350,000. This project will be built without new taxes from our residents. Construction of the building will start in March and be finished by November next year. A copy of the plans can be viewed at City Hall. We have had some well-attended public hearings lately. I appreciate the enthusiasm and respectful comments.

The City Council adopted an ordinance establishing a Tree Board in Nibley City and approved my recommendations for members of this board positioning Nibley City to become a Tree City USA. Our desire in becoming a Tree City USA is to further beautify and enhance the quality of life in Nibley City.

My next step in enhancing our quality of life is to form a City Beautification Committee. This committee will be tasked with educating and assisting the Nibley residents to beautify their neighborhoods. The committee will recommend community design and beautification programs as well as planning annual neighborhood competitions. Nibley is a wonderful place to live thanks to its residents and their dedicated service. I appreciate the ideas, comments, and efforts to improve our corner of the world. HOLIDAY PET CARE BONES

Although the holidays bring many fun festivities, they can also potentially and unexpectedly bring harm to our furry friends. Beware of the following hazards. A little precaution and prevention will make the holidays a happy time for everyone.

Some of the more common hazards to pets include:

Bones: The holiday turkey leaves behind a lot of tantalizing bones. Do not feed them to your pet. Small bones and chips can lodge in their throat, stomach, and intestinal tract.

Foods: Keep holiday treats/candies out of your pet's reach. Some can make them very sick. Potentially harmful foods

include: coffee grounds, chocolate, tea, salt, onions, grapes, raisins, avocados, garlic, alcohol, and macadamia nuts.

Holiday Plants: Holly and mistletoe are extremely poisonous when eaten. The poinsettia's milky white sap and leaves can cause severe gastric distress to your pets.

Stress and Company: With everyone coming and going, watch for open doors and sneaky pets. Make sure pets have

updated collars and tags (two forms of identitification) in case of escape. Micro chipping your pet will also help if your pet escapes. Provide a quiet place for your pets to retreat to when the festivities get too stressful.
