#### **Dog and Business Licensing**

The deadline for licensing dogs for 2013 is **February 28.** This includes first time applicants as well as renewals. The fees are:

- Spayed/neutered—\$10
- Unneutered male—\$12
- Unspayed female—\$15

A \$10.00 late fee for each dog will be charged after February 28. If you have more than two dogs, a kennel license is required. Call the Nibley City Office if you have questions regarding renewal and/or kennel licenses. Business license renewals are due by **January 31.** A \$10.00 late fee will be charged after January 31.

### Caring for Our Pets in **Cold Weather**

When it gets cold outside, and especially with the frigid temperatures we are experiencing, there are times when it's important for you to do special things for your



animals. Outside animals like dogs use more calories to keep warm in winter, so you should give your dog additional food. Fresh straw (not hay) can make a nice bed in the doghouse because it is comfortable and helps keep your dog warm, and if you leave water outside, make sure it does not become frozen. Dogs need regular, cool water to drink, not ice.

After your dog has been playing in the snow, check his feet. There may be snowballs stuck between his toes. Snow can also build up on a dog's ears, tail, and belly. It forms little balls of very hard, icy snow that can be very cold and painful.

Many people wonder where dogs, especially little ones, can go to the bathroom when there is deep snow. One thing you can do is shovel the snow in an area that is big enough for your dog to "do his business".

Young puppies should not be left outside when it's very cold. They can't make themselves warm like older dogs. Please take these preventative steps to ensure our four-legged friends stay safe this winter.

If you do not have a user name and password you will need to create one. If you have multiple children playing, please list the child you would like to coach.

In person spring soccer registration will be held Saturday, January 26 and Saturday, February 2, from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. at the Nibley City offices.

Fees for recreation soccer are \$35/player and \$50/player for Academy. A \$5 discount will be given for each child after the second child registered. #### **Wildlife and Nibley City Tree Board News**

We share this planet with an amazing diversity of wildlife, which many of us are glad to see . . . most of the time. There are occasional instances when deer and other animals may cause some damage to landscaping or crops, but winter can be hard on wildlife simply trying to survive with reduced food and freezing temperatures. Many residents help wildlife through the winter by providing feeding stations, but a growing number of citizens are making an extra effort through a noteworthy program.


The National Wildlife Federation sponsors a process where citizens can have their property designated as "Certified Wildlife Habitat". While most of us don't have the space to provide habitat for large animals, start by thinking small and considering ways you could help songbirds and pollinating insects. To certify your yard you need to provide the following:

- food—plant native species or supplemental feeders
- water—even human-made features like bird baths
- cover—hiding places from predators and weather
- places to raise young—shrubs, bird houses, thickets

When these four elements are established, go to *www.nwf.org*, scroll to the bottom of their homepage, click on Wildlife Gardening, and follow the simple instructions in joining over 156,000 certified habitat owners. There is a \$20 fee to complete the process.

Beautiful metal signs are available to post on your property at a 20% discount if 24 citizens enroll in the program. Contact Rod Hellstern, our Nibley City Tree Board Chair, at 435-245-9186 or *redrockron@gmail.com* as soon as your property is certified and he will submit a single order to have the signs shipped to the City Office.

The Tree Board is also asking for 4-5 volunteers to form a Habitat Team to begin the process of making Nibley City the first Certified Wildlife "Community" in the State of Utah. If your property has already been certified in the past, let Ron know so we can add you to the list for our City application. Nibley has a great history of volunteer ism. This will not take much time, but will benefit the wildlife that share our land, and help to beautify our City.
