Reminders from Nibley City Staff

As in years past, as of November 1, the Cache County Sheriff's Department has been enforcing Nibley's winter parking regulations. Nibley City Code, found in section 6-1-4(d), states, "It shall be unlawful to park any vehicle, trailer or other obstruction on any street in the city between November 1 of each year and April 1 of the following year, for a period of time longer than thirty (30) minutes when loading, unloading or delivering property between the hours of twelve o'clock (12:00) midnight and six o'clock (6:00) a.m." This ordinance keeps our streets clear from obstacles that might hinder our public works department from safely removing snow. A citation may be issued for anyone who violates the ordinance. Please help us keep our streets clear and safe this winter.

There are vending machines with Coca-Cola products located at all of our city parks. Pennies will not work in the machines. If the machine "eats your money," please call **1-800-659-4395** and someone will assist you. They will come and fix the machine and you will get a refund from Coca-Cola directly. We hope you enjoy having this service.

If a street light in your neighborhood is not functioning please call Nibley City at **752-0431** and provide the location of the light. We pay for the lights whether they are on or not, so we should get our money's worth and make sure they are all working.

Nibley City Tree Board News



The Tree Board has submitted completed applications to the State to recertify our Tree City USA status. Several requirements need to be met for this recognition, such as: regular meetings by the

City Tree Board, drafting a Community Tree Ordinance, maintaining a Community Forestry Program, and observing National Arbor Day.

We have also applied for the Tree City USA "Growth" Award to show that the City values the many benefits trees provide. That application included our new Heritage and Legacy Tree programs, announcements in the City newsletter, City planting projects, and encouraging citizens to plant trees on their own property. Our residents responded by reporting a total of 313 new trees being planted this Summer. Thanks to all of you who participated this year. We look forward to 2013 being an even better year for all of us, including our trees.

A tree tip: If the bark is splitting on the South side of the tree trunk, it may be due to sun reflecting off the snow during the Winter months. Use white protective tree wrap to reduce, or prevent, this damage.

Here are ten more benefits of trees:

- Provide windbreaks to reduce winter heating costs
- Purifies water above and below ground
- Leaf litter feeds aquatic animals
- Water vapor stabilizes climate
- Reduces excess fertilizer going into streams
- Provides lumber for homes
- Roots increase groundwater recharge
- Tree landscapes reduce urban crime levels
- Sources of recreational equipment
- Windbreaks prevent soil erosion

H.E.A.T. PROGRAM

The H.E.A.T. (Home Energy Assistance Target) Program began on November 1, 2012. This program assists low income individuals in paying energy bills. An eligible household can apply for only one H.E.A.T payment per winter season. The amount paid is based on type of fuel used, household size, family income, and your energy burden.

Dog Licensing

The deadline for licensing dogs for 2013 is February 28. This includes first time applicants as well as renewals. The fees are:

- Spayed/neutered—\$10
- Unneutered male—\$12
- Unspayed female—\$15

A \$10.00 late fee for each dog will be charged after February 28. If you have more than two dogs, a kennel license is required. Call the Nibley City Office if you have questions regarding renewal and/or kennel licenses. A renewal application is included with this newsletter.
