I wish to thank everyone that organized and participated in our Nibley Heritage Days celebration. It was a big success. I had a great time at each of the activities. I publicly thank Jennifer Hollingsworth, Bonnie Darrington, and Laura Frandsen for their tremendous work in organizing the pageant, children's play, and Heritage Days. They had many people that helped them create these wonderful events for our community. I appreciate everyone that helped.

I have been excited and anxious to move into our new council chambers / community center that was built in cooperation with the Cache County School District's Heritage Elementary School. The school is set to open in August 2010. However, Nibley City will not be occupying a portion of this school. For over a year, we have worked with the superintendent and his staff to design and build our addition to the school. When it came down to getting the School Board's approval, we could not reach an agreement that satisfied both parties. Therefore, we are looking at the possibility of building a new city hall and community center. We have funding in place with a very good interest rate, less than two percent. Construction costs are as low as they have been in the last five years or more. We will make our last bond payment on our current building this fiscal year. There is considerable need for new office space. The timing seems to be ideal. We are currently weighing all our options and hope to make a decision within the next month. As always, please give me your ideas.

I hope you continue taking the time to enjoy all that Nibley City has to offer. There are always the things we tend to take for granted; i.e., drinking water, roads, etc. In addition, our city parks are a tremendous benefit to the community. I thank Rod Elwood for his professional care and personal touch in designing and maintaining these facilities. We are lucky to have him as a city employee. Our parks are his showcase front yard. Please let him know how to make these open spaces more enjoyable for you and your family. Have a wonderful Nibley City summer. They do not get any better.

CARS ON ROADWAYS

The City often receives calls about cars being left on the roadway for extended periods of time (multiple days). Residents are reminded that it is against city ordinances to leave a vehicle unattended on a public road for more than 24 hours. Vehicles, including trailers, parked on the public right-of-way cause safety and aesthetic concerns.

DIRT AND GRAVEL ON CITY STREETS

It is common for homeowners to order topsoil or gravel and have it dumped on the streets in front of their homes. The City's storm water regulations require that any such piles of dirt be cleaned up the day they are deposited. Piles of dirt on the street cause traffic safety and pollution concerns. Rain storms wash sediment into our storm water system and, ultimately, into the rivers and streams of our valley.
