From the Mayor

Dear Nibley Resident,

Our new city manager, David Zook, is settling in after a few weeks on the job. He is full of energy, vision, and experience. The new City Council is working together nicely as well. The month of May is when we work through the budget for the coming fiscal year that starts July 1, 2012. Most budget items are predetermined based on the need to maintain the roads, provide fire and police protection, keep the clean water running to and the dirty water running out of our homes. We must continue to maintain our parks and other facilities for the benefit of all. However, we have some discretion as to how many parks and whether we build sidewalks or provide other recreation opportunities. Previous councils have dedicated much of our discretionary money to building parks and creating other open-space opportunities for the community. We have also spent much money building and improving new sidewalks along our roads and enhancing the roadways with beautiful landscaping. After providing the necessities, my main focus is to beautify the community and provide a more people friendly environment. Please share your ideas with me.

Historically, at the end of our budget year, we have had a surplus of general funds that we use for one time special projects such as sidewalks, beautification projects or public works equipment. This year we have roughly \$150,000 for these purposes. The budget will be introduced to the city council on May 3 and then debated over the next two months with the goal for final approval before June 30 as required by law. Please come and be a part of this exciting process.

The Honorable Jack Stevens, Nibley City's Justice Court Judge for nearly 30 years, is retiring this summer. He has done a fabulous job of administering justice in our community. He is highly respected in judicial circles. He is a good man, neighbor, and excellent citizen of the community. I will miss his wisdom. I wish him well in his future endeavors. Thank you, Judge Stevens, for the many great years. A new judge will be appointed in the next few days and seated later this summer. I will introduce him in our next newsletter.

What is storm water

Storm water is runoff from rain and snow storms. A system of gutters, ditches and storm drains collect this runoff from our yards, rooftops, streets, parking lots and other land surfaces. This collection of water then discharges untreated directly into our natural waterways.

Help Keep Our Storm Water Clean

Storm water picks up pollutants as it flows across the land surfaces. Pollutants like... -Litter and garbage, pesticides, fertilizer and yard waste, oil and antifreeze, paint and cleaners, pets and animal waste, construction debris and many more.

Garden Plots are now available for the 2012 planting season at the Nibley Community Garden* at the Morgan Farm. The garden is located at 770 W. 2680 S., Nibley, directly south of Elkhorn Park. Irrigation and gardening tools are provided.

For those demonstrating need, registration fees may be waived partially or in full. A general (10' X 20') gardening plot is \$20 (plus a refundable \$15 cleaning deposit). Additional plots are only the \$20 registration fee. Permanent gardening plots and raised garden beds are also available.

Come and join the fun and grow some great vegetables along the way! Planting begins the 1st week of June.

Baby Animals at the Morgan Farm

It is spring again at the Morgan Farm. This year both of the Momma goats had twins; so there are two cute medium sized billy goat kids and 2 little bitty pygmy goats. One is a nanny and the other a billy goat. Several of the neighborhood children were witnesses to the birth of the Pygmy goats. Richard Eversull, our Morgan Farm curator, happened to arrive about the time the children were frantically looking for help from someone. They all had quite an eye

opening experience, part of which grossed them out and the balance of which captivated their attention for a few hours. Mr. Eversull said one little girl said that she was sure glad her Mom made her stay home from another invitation because none of them had ever seen anything "bornded".

We invite everyone down to the farm to enjoy the new babies. They will be having baby chicks soon and Mr. Eversull has returned the Donkeys to the front pasture where they have already been greeted by many of their friends and are being spoiled with treats and attention. They will even sing for their supper if they think you are holding out on them.

Everyone is welcome, however please use caution; stay out of the pens and don't climb on the old buildings. Generally the kids who have come to the farm have been great and the animals are there for their enjoyment! Mr. Eversull reminds us he is not always there to supervise and reminds us to be safe.

Mr. Eversull has several projects planned, such as disassembling the old garage and rebuilding a safer and more useful building. There are also smaller projects like cleaning up and helping prepare for next year's Nativity Benefit. Just a Reminder

As we enjoy Spring and head into Summer, we know that home and yard projects will be on many people's minds.

We wanted to pass on a few reminders to help everyone to be happy and safe and productive:

• Before burning grass clippings, trees, branches or bushes, contact Cache County to obtain a burn permit. For more information, vistit: www.cachecounty.org/fire.php

• With the short winter and early warm weather, we will be starting our weed enforcement two weeks early this year, on **May 15**. Be sure to keep your weeds under control—our ordinance prohibits weeds from growing over 12" inches high.

- Frequently during the summer, we run into problems with residents working on their yards and homes and allowing dirt, gravel, and other building materials to spill over onto the sidewalk and into the street or having piles of compost delivered in a pile in the street. We also have a problem with basketball standards in the street. Failure to keep the sidewalks and street around your home free from these and other items is a violation of City code (7-1-3 and 7-1-5) and you may be cited for a violation.
- Before building a fence, be sure to stop by City Hall and get a fence permit. There is no charge.
- Before building a shed or adding on to your house, call to see whether a building permit is required.

We regularly get phone calls from residents letting us know of a problem with their neighbors, such as weeds, barking dogs etc. Many times, people wish to remain confidential. You can now do this online. We have added a feature to our web site where you can go and let us know a problem or concern you notice. You are not required to put in your contact information but will need to do so if you want someone from the City to contact you directly. There is also a place to find answers to frequently asked questions. Go to *www.nibleycity.com* and look for the green box—just follow the instructions. We look forward to hearing from you.
