Thoughts From Mayor Dustin

If you haven't noticed all the road construction in Nibley, you don't live here .

On the not so bright side, our roads will continue to be impacted—likely through November. On the bright side, we are getting much needed improvements to our infrastructure and because of the hard work and foresight of your city

staff and Council, we are getting approximately \$6,400,000 of needed roadwork done at a cost of \$1,400,000 to the taxpayers. That's about an 75% discount. When we are done, 3200 South will be good for the foreseeable future. We will also have a traffic light on Highway 89 to allow people to turn left at a



2021 Notice of Election

Nibley City will conduct a General Election on November 2, 2021.

The Nibley City Council adopted Resolution 21-09 on April 15, 2021, which noticed Nibley City's intent to participate in Ranked Choice Voting during the 2021 Municipal Election. Therefore, Nibley City will not hold a Primary Election and Declaration for Candidacy will begin on August 10, 2021, and will close on August 17, 2021. safety and traffic flow.

- Total project cost: \$3,500,000
- Nibley cost: \$400,000

This intersection has been a sore spot for a long time. 12th west has been planned to be

a straight connection between Nibley and Hyrum since at least the 1970s—that's half a century. The roadway width was planned and developed by the County and the City to fit in a 100–120 ft. wide right-of-way but the planners didn't envision the residential development that grew up around it.

When I came into office, I started discussions with staff, the Planning Commission, and the Council about how to respect the need for transportation provided by the road, and the reality of the residences and families that lived there. It didn't make sense to me to have a five lane road there, but that's where we were headed; in fact, at the north end near 2400 South, that is what had already been built. So we contracted with an engineering firm to figure out how to balance those uses. The firm had an engineer

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Truth in Taxation Hearing

NIBLEY CITY is proposing to increase its property tax revenue. All Nibley residents are invited to a public hearing concerning the proposed tax increase.

Date/Time: Thursday, August 26 at 6:30 p.m.

Location: Nibley City Hall, Council Chambers; 455 West 3200 South, Nibley

- The NIBLEY CITY tax on a \$353,000 residence would increase from \$288.12 to \$323.65, which is \$35.53 per year.
- The NIBLEY CITY tax on a \$353,000 business would increase from \$523.85 to \$588.45, which is \$64.60 per year.

If the proposed budget is approved, Nibley City would increase its property tax budgeted revenue by 12.32% above last year's property tax budgeted revenue excluding eligible new growth.

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(Thoughts From Mayor Dustin, continued from page 1) who specialized in the kinds of roadway design that use things like curbs and curves to keep speeds down and people safer. The engineer understood that Nibley didn't have a lot of pedestrians, but had a lot of kids and families that crossed that street who we needed to keep safe. The engineer proceeded to show us the data about roundabouts and how they allow you to move the same number of cars with fewer lanes and lower speeds. He showed us how to use curbing and bike lanes to reduce the amount of street kids have to cross to get safely to the other side. He helped us see how a narrower street uses less asphalt, so it's cheaper to plow in the winter and repair when the pavement wears out. We applied those principles to the whole 12th west corridor and the roundabout is the first part of that you will see.

I know roundabouts can be intimidating and we don't have a ton of experience with them, but the data show that they are safer for pedestrians and better for traffic.

The Cache County Council of

Governments, a group that includes all the Mayor's in Cache Valley and the County Executive, saw the value in the project and gave us \$3,150,000 if we would chip in 7% of the project cost. Basically, we paid for the design, and the CCOG is going to pay for the construction.

I was riding my skateboard down 3200 south a few years ago and noticed that the road just seemed to be fall-

ing apart. I brought it up with our Public Works Director and he told me that the design from the initial 3200 south pavement was failing and would have to be redone. I didn't know what to do. We had about \$1,000,000 saved but we needed at least twice that much. I asked Justin to look into it. About a year later he told me about the gas main replacement (that we've all seen going on) and that the gas company would have to repave half the road because of the construction. He asked them what it would

cost to get the other half done, and now for about what we had saved, 3200 south will be good for another 15-20 years. No tax increase, all paid out of savings.

A few years ago I was approached by representatives of Wesley Nelson Farms about annexing into Nibley. The Nelsons are one of the old families that built this part of the valley who wanted to be a part of what we were doing in Nibley. This last week, they agreed to rebuild 2600 South from 1200 West to Highway 89. UDOT has been planning two lights on the west side of Nibley for about 15 years. One is scheduled for 3200 South and we expect that to happen next year. The other is at 2600 South and that one will be built this fall. The agreement with Nelson Farms is that the road will be built at no cost to the Nibley taxpayers. As the developers, it's their responsibility to construct it.

Code Enforcement Corner

Recently, city staff, the Planning Commission and City Council have been working to improve a number of city codes. In particular, the following ordinances have been updated:

levi@nibleycity.com 1. Accessory building setback standards: A minimum sideyard and rear yard setback of 10 feet was added for accessory buildings (sheds, shops, etc.) that are over 15 feet in height. This was enacted to mitigate impacts of adjacent neighbors.

- 2. An amendment to public noticing requirements so the city's procedures in line with state requirements.
- 3. A Rezone of a property at 4350 South Main St. from Residential to Commercial.
- 4. A Rezone of a property at 3105 South 700 West from Industrial to Residential.

The City is currently considering the following ordinance amendments:

- 1. A requirement for city staff review of lot line and parcel boundary adjustments to ensure compliance with the city's zoning Code.
- 2. Changes to the Animal Land Use ordinance, including potentially allowing miniature pigs in residential areas and other changes.

Reminders from Nibley City Staff

Nibley's Water Rates

Nibley City has received a lot of questions about water rates this summer. The State of Utah passed a law that required cities to implement an increasing block culinary water rate structure to incentivize water conservation.

The Nibley City Council passed Resolution 20-07 on June 25, 2020. This Resolution sets the following water rates:

The average water user in the City will see a \$20-\$35 <u>yearly</u> increase.

Emergency Medical Services Fee

Nibley has contracted with Cache County to provide essential emergency medical services for Nibley City residents. Nibley residents will have an even greater level of emergency service if you find yourself in a life threatening, emergency situation.

Unfortunately, this change comes at a cost. To cover this cost, the Nibley City Council passed a Resolution that will add an additional \$6/month fee on each residential and commercial utility bill. You may have already noticed this fee on your utility bills. If you have questions regarding this fee, please contact Nibley City staff.
