Mayor Jacobsen's Message



We need your help. As the school session starts (again, already?), we need your help to ensure our students get safely to and from school. Getting kids to school safely starts with a cooperative effort between the Cache County School District and Nibley City. Oh... there is a third entity to include these days. Some Logan residents live within the Cache County School District and attend schools in Nibley. A large

percentage of the elementary students in Nibley walk to school. Nibley Elementary and the Thomas Edison Charter school are both no-bus schools, and Heritage Elementary is limited to only a few bus routes. The School Community Councils at each school determine safe walking routes and then Nibley City helps protect those routes with cross walks, traffic control, and crossing guards.

Because Heritage Elementary has a Dual Language Immersion program, and given the Charter School's specialized curriculum, these schools attract students throughout the county. As such, many students are picked up and dropped off by parents. In addition, parents with children in traditional programs will drive their kids to school–especially during bad weather. This concentration of parent vehicles and student pedestrians requires special attention, and we have been specifically working with Principal Robins and several parents at Heritage Elementary on pick-up and drop-off issues. Please watch for announcements from the school.

The real key to getting kids safely to and from school relies on vehicle drivers. Please be especially aware of students as the school session starts. Please pay special attention during the times of day and in the parts of our city when and where students concentrate. I ask that you avoid using mobile phones or other distracting media while driving (*really, at all times*). We need your help.

To many of us, the most worrisome driving behavior affecting safety in Nibley is vehicle speeds. I receive more citizen input over concern with vehicle speeds than any other topic. That input leads me to another ask for help. Do you have ideas on how to slow down vehicles in Nibley? There are tools available to us. We post speed limits, and we consider new locations for additional speed limit signs. We contract with Cache County for law enforcement in Nibley and that includes traffic enforcement. Many thanks to Deputy Matt Hansen and his colleagues for their community-building service to Nibley. We could deploy more speed patrols, and we have discussed whether we are issuing the right combination of warnings and citations. We deploy stealthy radars that help us identify problem areas and problem times of day to make those enforcement patrols most efficient. We deploy other radars that display vehicle speeds to drivers and remind them when they are over the limit. We turn to accepted standards like the Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices



Truth in Taxation Hearing

NIBLEY CITY is proposing to increase its property tax revenue. All Nibley residents are invited to a public hearing concerning the proposed tax increase.

Date/Time: Thursday, August 25 at 6:30 p.m.

Location: Nibley City Hall, Council Chambers; 455 West 3200 South, Nibley

• The NIBLEY CITY tax on a \$482,000 residence would increase from \$345.16 to \$393.67, which is \$48.51 per year.

• The NIBLEY CITY tax on a \$482,000 business would increase from \$627.56 to \$715.77, which is \$88.21 per year.

If the proposed budget is approved, Nibley City would increase its property tax budgeted revenue by 14.07% above last year's property tax budgeted revenue excluding eligible new growth.



Cache Valley Wildlife Association Monarch Butterflies in the News

The recent decision to classify migratory monarch butterflies as endangered by the International Union for the Conservation of Nature (IUCN) has led to some confusion in the United States. Monarchs are currently NOT listed as endangered under the United States Endangered Species Act (ESA) but, instead, are considered a candi-



date species for listing. Monarchs will be re-evaluated for listing in 2024. It is important to note that the IUCN's endangered listing does not affect regulatory requirements or ongoing conservation efforts in the United States.

The lack of endangered status under the ESA in no way indicates that the species is not in trouble; numbers of the western population have declined as much as 99.9% between the 1980s and 2021 as documented by the annual counts in their wintering grounds along the coast of California and in Mexico. However, at the time of the decision (December 2020), over 600 other species were deemed to be spiraling closer to extinction and in need of regulatory action. Threats to monarchs include urban development, loss of milkweed (the only host plant for the larvae), pesticide and herbicide use, and climate change, to name a few.

You might ask what you can do to help the monarch butterfly and other insects in peril?

- *Plant native milkweed*–(showy and swamp are best for our area) and nectar-rich flowers (www.xerces.org/milkweed or www.xerces.org/monarchs/monarch-nectar-plant-guides).
- *Advocate for more monarch habitat at local levels*-Did you know that Nibley has a pollinator garden at Firefly Park which supports a breeding population of monarchs, co-hosts a Monarchs & Other Winged Wonder Festival, and has taken the Mayor's Monarch Pledge with the National Wildlife Federation? (www.nwf.org/ mayorsmonarchpledge).
- *Report your monarch and milkweed observations*–Journey North or other citizen science programs fill knowledge gaps and provide valuable data to researchers (www.journeynorth.org/sightings/ or www.sites. google.com/view/utahpollinatorpursuit/home).
- Reduce the amount of pesticide and herbicide use on your property

Watersource Protection

Common household hazardous waste you might find in your garage or yard are:

- tires
- gasoline
- gasonne
 car batteries
- insecticides
- fertilizers & herbicides
- pesticides

• antifreeze

• motor oil

• brake fluids

• transmission fluid

These household hazardous wastes require special handling and should not be placed in your curbside garbage. Incorrect disposal could affect the environment, water supplies, and the public. Nibley City contracts with Logan City for residential waste management. The Logan landfill offers FREE (except for tires) disposal of these items to make it more convenient for <u>you</u> to dispose of them properly. Emergency <mark>Medic</mark>al Servic<mark>es Fee</mark>



Nibley has contracts with Cache County to provide essential emergency medical services for Nibley City residents. Nibley residents should feel assured of the level of service you will receive if you find yourself in a life threatening, emergency situation.

For the past year, residents have paid \$6/month to cover the cost of EMS. This fee has been reflected on your residential and commercial utility bill. After one year under contract with Cache County, the Nibley City Council was able to reevaluate the fees for EMS services and voted to decrease the EMS service fee to \$5/month. You may have already noticed this reduced fee on your utility bills. Look for the line EMS SERVICES. If you have questions regarding this fee, please contact Nibley City staff.

Sadly, Nibley City has recently seen an increased occurrence of vandalism at Nibley City parks.
