Cache Valley Wildlife Association

May is a great time to incorporate shrubs into your landscape and enhance the suitability of your yard for some species of wildlife, particularly birds and pollinating insects. Shrubs provide shelter, nesting sites, and forage (berries, seeds, and nectar) for wildlife.

In the Cache Valley area, consider planting native shrubs that provide these wildlife benefits but also appeal to the homeowner and neighbors. Great native options include serviceberry, mountain mahogany, red-twigged dogwood, elderberry, and chokecherry. Be wary of the location if you select a type that likes to wander, like chokecherry. An added benefit of natives is that they generally require less water to maintain.

Other fruiting or flowering shrubs that attract wildlife are lilac and forsythia. Boxwood, Russian sage, peashrub, barberry, potentilla, and hydrangea are also great options that feed early-emerging pollinating insects.

Keeping Our Nibley Water Clean

Public drinking water systems can be contaminated by pollutants or contaminants that backflow into the water system through unprotected cross-connections. A cross-connection is a physical connection between the public drinking water system and anything else.

Public Drinking Water Rules require that all cross connections be eliminated or protected against backflow by installing an approved backflow devise or assembly; ensuring no impurities or contaminants are introduced to the public drinking water supply.

Nibley City is once again offering Nibley residents a way to dispose of your household debris, so be ready to dejunk your yards and garage on Saturday, May 8. Large dumpsters will be offered at Anhder Park (294 West 3200 South) from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and we will haul your stuff away. Nibley City Public Works staff will be on hand that day to help you determine if your item(s) can be properly disposed of.

The dumpsters are only available until they are filled and this service has been very popular in the past. Be sure to plan ahead and have your items ready to be hauled away.

*The following items will NOT be accepted: tires, antifreeze, computers/monitors, household cleaners, motor oil, propane cylinders, batteries, fertilizer, yard chemicals, insecticides, pesticides, fungicides, A/C units, paint/paint thinner, refrigeration units, bleach, televisions, gasoline, other fuels, pool chemicals, transmission fluid, or anything containing mercury.



2021 Notice of Election

Nibley City will be conducting a general election on November 2, 2021.

The offices that will be on the municipal general election ballot are Nibley City Mayor and two (2) Nibley City Council seats. During the April 15, 2021 City Council meeting, the Nibley City Council adopted Resolution 21-109, which noticed Nibley City's intent to participate in Ranked Choice Voting during the 2021 Municipal Election (see information on RCV on page 3). Therefore, Declaration for candidacy will begin on August 10, 2021, and will close on August 17, 2021. RANKED CHOICE VOTING HOW DOES IT WORK?



Instead of picking just your top candidate, when you vote, you rank them and the candidate with an absolute majority (50%) wins.

YOUR BALLOT



ELECTION RESULTS



If no candidate secures an absolute majority in the first round, a runoff election instantly takes place.

When a runoff election is needed, instead of having voters go back to the polls, an automatic runoff takes place using the ranked choices.





11% 19% ELEMENTED 21% 49%

The last place candidate is eliminated and each of their supporter's second choice candidates are awarded their votes.

The process continues in this fashion, one by one, until a single candidate receives an absolute majority.

If you are constructing a new fence in the City, you are required to obtain a Fence permit. The permit is nation to ensure that you are

free and requires limited information to ensure that you are in compliance with the City's fence regulations.

If you are remodeling your home, making an addition or building an accessory building over 200 sq. ft., please remember that a building permit is required.

Park Pavilion Reservation



Solicitors

Nibley City Code (3-4) requires all solicitors or peddlers to obtain a license from Nibley City. Nibley City requires a background check of any individual seeking a license. Solicitors are required to show their license at the request of any citizen. If a solicitor is caught without a license, they can be cited by law enforcement.

3200 South Reconstruction—You've probably noticed that the pavement on 3200 South is not in great shape. One of the side benefits to the gas line work is that the gas company spends a lot of money to fix asphalt, and that means they get really good prices on paving. The work they are doing is going to require repaying half of 3200 S. City staff was able to negotiate with them to replace the whole street instead of half of it. This was something the Council and I have been trying to budget for. We felt like we would be several years out and at least twice as much as we had saved because the street was failing faster than the design was supposed to. A street is made up of layers and the top layer, the asphalt, is there to protect the lower layers that we don't see-the crushed rock and gravel. If the top layer fails the bottom layers are exposed to the weather, and once those lower layers get messed up, fixing the road gets a LOT more expensive.

The bottom line is, that because of the work the gas company is doing, we will be able to protect your investment in 3200 S. for at least another 10 years. We will get to do this for less than half what we thought, we get to do it now, and we get to pay cash with what the Council has saved up.

12th West Roundabout—Last week, bids for the 12th West Roundabout project came in \$400,000 under budget. This is pretty exciting. We can't put the money back in the budget because it's from a series of grants that Nibley has gotten over the years with rules attached that the funds are spent on roads and transportation. The funds can use it to fix connectivity problems in Nibley, and your Council and staff and I will work on that. In the meantime, that project is moving forward and will also impact 3200 S. and 1200 W. this summer.

Logan Apartments—Your Council and I continue to try to work this out with Logan. I've made it clear to the property developer that Nibley has no choice but to fight this. I've reached out to Logan and asked them to reconsider and work with us to come to a resolution that recognizes the property owner's rights and minimizes the impact on Nibley. I've made it clear to all parties that Nibley understands and supports the need to have varied housing types in our community. The hope is they will agree with us-that given that the apartments are coming, the land should be annexed into Nibley. We will keep fighting for you, for those new people and for our community. Thanks for all your help and support.

Heritage Days—Barring something crazy, Heritage Days is on and scheduled for June. Get vaccinated, get out there, and have fun. Fun is your heritage–not hiding in the house with a mask on.
