### **Mayor Jacobsen's Message**

Nibley City does a lot of planning. A quick look at our website (www.NibleyCity.com; Government; Master Plans) shows nearly twenty different plans that we write and keep current with periodic updates. Those plans are diverse, ranging from the General Plan to the Wildfire Preparedness Mayor Larry Jacobsen Plan. The General Plan is the master document that drives

the other, more specific plans. The General Plan shapes the character of our community. It defines our shared values by identifying current land-use and planning for future land-use. The General Plan includes an Annexation Plan and anticipates the land-use of newly annexed areas. It also includes a Moderate-Income Housing Plan (updated in September 2022) and a section on economic development. An essential plan for Nibley City is the Parks, Trails, Recreation and Open Space Master Plan. We anticipate updating this plan this year, and it is very important that you, the citizens, help us write this new plan. In fact, it is important that each of our plans reflect the desires of Nibley citizens. The members of the City Council adopt these plans as your representatives, and each plan revision includes many opportunities for our citizens to be involved. Please help us plan the future of our community.

The citizens and the Council represent two of the three legs needed for good planning. The third, and equally important leg, is city staff. Good planning requires technical expertise, and that expertise is provided by our staff. I remember being on the Planning Commission roughly twenty years ago when Nibley City hired its first planner. That was a huge change for us—an inflection point when we realized the need for professionals to help move our city in the community's desired direction. Levi Roberts is our current City Planner, and he does an outstanding job. The Water Master Plan that details the future development of water sources and water distribution requires professional expertise, and we are the benefactors of Steve Eliason and the entire Public Works department. Many thanks to our staff in helping us plan our future.

The more I get involved with planning Nibley's future, the more I realize the importance of understanding our past. I have recently found a group of people—the Cache Valley Historical Society—that are an absolute joy to hang out with. A major function of the Historical Society is to give free monthly (roughly) lectures on the history of Cache Valley. The lectures are excellent. The first lecture I attended was on Elkhorn Ranch, an important landmark in Nibley City. The second was on the sugar-beet industry in Cache Valley. Q&A sessions follow each leacture where members of the audience give their own insights on the lecture topic. It's all about the stories. What stories will this, the next, and the next-after-that generations tell about Nibley? While I can't be sure, I know that the stories we will tell about our past will depend on how well we plan for our future. Each member of our community helps write our history, and it is important for all of us to help plan our future. Please tell me what you think.



#### Winter Parking\*

Plan ahead and be sure to keep your vehicles off the street between November 1 and April 1 between the hours of 12:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. to avoid a parking ticket.

Winter parking regulations were enacted to keep streets clear should Nibley's Public Works department need to clear the roadways after a storm. This ordinance applies whether or not there is snow on the ground. It is also very helpful to pull your garbage containers in from the roadway as soon as possible after pick-up. Cache Valley snowstorms can bury those cans pretty quickly.

Thank you for your help in keeping Niblev's roads drivable and safe.

#### Stormwater Do's and Don't

#### Do

- Sweep gutters and driveways and place the sweepings in the garden or flower beds.
- Rake leaves or lawn clip- Use too much fertilizer. pings up and use them as mulch in the garden or place them in the garbage.
- Replant areas of disturbed soil.
- Pick up litter in the park or on the street.
- Clean up pet droppings and dispose of them in the garbage can.

#### Don't

- Pile sand and soil in areas where it can wash into the storm water system.
- Drop packaging or cigarette butts on the ground.
- Don't leave litter where bins are already full.
- Don't leave grass clippings or leaves in the street when you're doing yard work. Use them for fertilizer, compost, or bag them.

For October, if you can do one thing:



#### Have 72 hours (3 days) worth of water stored for your household.

Whether you get water from a municipal water system or your home has a private well, your water supply depends on having power to operate the system. During a power outage—or any disaster that can cause a power outage, such as high winds, ice storm, or flood—you may find yourself without drinkable water.

#### Nibley City Hall Closed

#### Winterize Your Irrigation

Have your sprinkler pipes blown out in the fall to minimize the risk of damage done by freezing and avoid costly leaks and repairs in the spring. Even if you have drained the water out of your irrigation system, some water remains and can freeze, expand, and crack PVC piping.

#### Voting

There is still time to register to vote for the Tuesday, November 8, 2022 General Election. Go to vote.utah.gov to register to vote, learn about candidates and issues, and track your ballot.

#### Voter registration deadlines in Utah

- Online registration: Friday, October 28
- Register by mail: Received by Friday, October 28
- In person registration: Tuesday, November 8

If you are an active, registered voter, you will automatically receive a ballot in the mail. The County clerk will mail ballots the week of October 17, 2022. If you do not receive a ballot shortly after this time, contact the Cache County clerk's office as soon as possible.

### **Planning Our City**

The Nibley City Planning department's functions can be divided into two categories: current planning and long range planning. Current planning includes the review of land use applications, including subdivisions, conditional use permits and

site plans. Long range planning includes the creation of plans and policies that apply to future development and City-led initiatives. Below is a summary of some notable recent and ongoing activities of the Planning Department.

#### **Current Planning applications**

- Ridgeline Park Phase 4, located north of 3200 South at 250 West was recently approved by City Council. The development includes 34 townhome units and 40 condo units. The overall development will include 460 housing units, several acres of dedicated open space, a 17-acre park that the City is currently in the process of designing and 2 master-planned public trails.
- Firefly Estates Phase 2, located south of 2200 South at 1000 West was recently approved. The development includes 32 townhome and 15 single-family units. The overall development includes 132 housing units and a dedicated 2 acre park adjacent to Firefly Park.
- Nibley Meadows Phase 1-3 & 10, located south of 3200 South and east of 1200 West is currently being reviewed by City Staff. The development includes 273 housing units, several trails and a 4.5 acre City Park.
- Heritage Crossing, located at 3200 South 1200 West, adjacent to the new roundabout is a standard 17-lot single-family subdivision and was recently approved by City Council.

#### **Long Range Planning Activities**

- Transfer of Development Rights Ordinance—This ordinance would allow the preservation of open space in some areas while allowing for more development in other areas.
- Moderate Income Housing Plan Update—There are a few elements the State requires cities to include in General Plans. Land Use and Transportation are two. Moderate Income Housing is a third, (they just added water conservation). The City Council just updated this plan, in accordance with State guidelines. In particular, the City added strategies to remove barriers to developing accessory dwelling units and plan to partner with Bear River Association of Governments and Neighborhood Non-profit Housing Corporation to provide affordable housing options.

# **Sewer RATs in Nibley City**



... no, not that kind of sewer rat! In the next couple of months, Nibley City will be having their sewer system assessed using a Sewer Line Rapid Assessment Tool (SL-RAT). The SL-RAT comes with a receiver and a transmitter. One goes in the

upstream sewer access and one goes in the downstream access. The upstream transmitter sends sound acoustics through the line to the opposite end where the receiver picks it up. It uses special technology that is formulated to give a condition assessment of the sewer line. This makes it possible to allocate resources to the areas with the greatest need and saves Nibley time, water, and money by avoiding the need to clean every sewer pipe.



Residents should also be aware that the tones that are RAPID ASSESSMENT TECHNOLOGY SERVICES INC. emitted in the SL-

RAT process can be heard outside the sewer lines. It may be possible to hear it in homes, and it may even sound like it's coming out of the toilets. While it may be startling when it's first heard, there is nothing to be concerned about. This process does not take long—usually 5-10 minutes per segment.
