

Thoughts From Our Mayor

Dear Citizens,

I need to cover a couple of things that you should all be aware of this month: 1) Wastewater progress: We presented a fair proposal for an agreement that said we were willing to pay our fair share and take on the risk of co-ownership of the wastewater plant. We did this along with the other six communities that have been trying to negotiate with Logan on the wastewater plant. This is the best way to protect ourselves against unfair and oppressive charges from Logan, and Logan's ability to tell all of us how and what kind of development happens in Cache Valley. Logan came back and said no way-the contract they want us to sign is the same type of contract that has allowed them to almost double our rates without doing anything to improve the existing plant, and with no corresponding increase in expenses. They proposed a plan that allows them to bill us based on one set of numbers that jacks up our rates, while we all vote on things based on another set of numbers that makes sure Logan will always get their way. Logan's proposal also allows them to change our bill once a year to whatever they deem appropriate and to essentially charge a 6% profit in addition to any overhead. The only concession they have made is to form a "rate" committee but the only power that committee would have is to make recommendations, and even then, guess who controls 75% of the votes on that committee?

When we (Nibley, Providence, River Heights, North Logan, Smithfield, and Hyde Park) have asked for fairness, we've been told that it's good enough and it's not going to change. Your Council, City Staff, and I have been working overtime to try to bring Logan to the table with no success. We have asked for assurances on rates, costs, billing, and governance, and we get nothing. At this point, the best numbers we have show between a \$20 and \$40 increase to our sewer bills per month, but Logan and the State have yet to give us anything that resembles a straightforward accounting of projected costs.

I could live with the increase if I had to; what else are we going to do? What I refuse to live with is being bullied and buffaloed and told that I'm ungrateful AND paying that much for the privilege. We are currently negotiating with Hyrum and Providence. If we can find any way to match the cost that Logan will put on us and get off this hamster wheel, I am going to ask for your support to do so. I wish Logan's elected representatives would treat us the way they would like to be treated but that doesn't look like its going to happen in spite of our best efforts and it's time to move on.

2) Water District. You are going to be hearing more and more about a Water Conservancy District. Here it is in a nutshell: The Wasatch front politicians want our water. They will take it if they can. If we don't have a strong unified voice, they will succeed. If we do have a voice, they might pull it off, but I guarantee it will happen if we don't organize. The proposal that's on the table might not be perfect, but it's pretty darn good. In a year and a half, there will be an election to set up the district. Please support the effort. It will increase your taxes. I know that hurts. But if Salt Lake politicians take your water and dry up *(continued on page 2)*

Tree Board & Wildlife Association News

The Tree Board and Cache Valley Wildlife Association (CVWA) combined meetings in March in order to collaborate on park plans and obtaining trees for Nibley City. As a result, 505 tree seedlings will be funded by the National Wildlife Federation (NWF) and a private donor from the CVWA, at no cost to Nibley. They will be planted in various parks and will be given to citizens who sign up with NWF to certify their property to help accommodate songbirds and pollinators. Nibley only needs 5 more residents to certify their property to make us the first community in Utah to be awarded as a community that values its properties as habitat by the National Wildlife Federation. You can do this by following these easy steps; go to nwf.org, scroll to the bottom of the page and click "Garden for Wildlife", then click on "Certify" and follow the simple instructions.

Nibley has earned the Tree City USA status for the 4th consecutive year and will be presented with the award on April 15 by the Utah Division of Forestry, Fire, and State Lands. We are proud of this status and continue to make every effort to maintain it.

There are couple of good things going on too. UDOT is engaging with us to help fund reworking the 3200 South intersection, which is going to be a good thing for Nibley. In fact, the City Council will discuss and make a decision regarding the realighnment of 3200 South at their April 16 meeting. Come listen to their debate.

The City also negotiated some additional improvements for the new City Park by the High School that will give us land for a trail along the east side of the Blacksmith Fork and tie into the existing City property on the east side of the river. You may have already seen the cleanup and grading of the City property on the West side of the river at 2600 South. It's going to be beautiful when it's done—think Logan River trail behind Elements. Nibley is great, and we'll get all this other stuff taken care of and make life better.
