Adults, kids, animals—everybody hurts. It's part of life, and how we respond to our pain and the pain of others defines who we are. One of the great things about being a human being is the ability to put ourselves in each other's shoes, and to lift each other up. One of the rotten things about being a human being is that sometimes instead of lifting, we knock people down, and instead of helping, we hurt. The worst is when we do that to kids—when we hurt them, we betray the people we should be protecting the most.

This month is Child Abuse Prevention Month in Nibley City. Our City Council, working with the Family Place, adopted an official resolution this week proclaiming the following:

The work of raising children in Cache Valley and empowering them to thrive stands among our greatest responsibilities as parents and community leaders.

All Cache Valley children deserve to experience and enjoy the innocence of childhood in a safe and nurturing environment, free from abuse and neglect.

Child abuse, which robs children of this right, affects hundreds of Cache Valley's children annually, often negatively impacting them for the rest of their lives.

Physical, verbal, emotional, and sexual abuse are serious and growing problems that respect no religious, socioeconomic, or geographic boundaries.

Child abuse is often related to substance abuse, domestic violence, and other crimes that weaken families.

Preventing child abuse depends on the efforts of all Cache Valley residents to collectively recommit to providing care, stability, and a brighter future for our sons and daughters.

Each citizen of Nibley, Utah can play an integral role in preventing child abuse within their respective families, neighborhoods, and communities through education, involvement, and advocacy.

Decreasing the incidence of child abuse makes a positive, substantial impact on the children of today, paving the way for them to succeed as the leaders of tomorrow.

Effective child abuse prevention programs rely on community partnerships among individuals, families, municipalities, social service agencies, schools, religious and civic organizations, law enforcement, and the business community.

The purpose of this observance is to actively promote and improve public awareness; encourage responsible intervention; strengthen families; and protect children.

Let's watch out for each other, especially those who are most vulnerable in our community. Ben Franklin learned to change his character by picking one thing and focusing on it. That made him into Ben Franklin and now he's on money. It works. I'm going to ask you to pick one thing for April that will end child abuse. It's not scary or impossible. You can do it, and it will change your life. Be kind. When you get up in the morning, tell yourself that you are going to be kind. When you are talking to people, remind yourself to be kind. When you react or respond to someone, ask yourself—is this kind?

Flooding in Nibley City

No matter where you live in the City, you may be at risk for flooding.

Record breaking snowpack, coupled with unseasonably warm temperatures,

could contribute to higher than normal run-off in our rivers, creeks and canals this spring. Now is the time to evaluate your flood hazard risk and take the necessary steps to prepare for future hazards that may occur.

What to Do <u>Before</u> a Flood:

- 1. Know how to monitor the hazard. Stay tuned to NOAA Weather Radio, local radio, TV, check you phone for alerts sent out on the City emergency notification system, and sign up to get alerts with a weather app.
- 2. Know what flood risks exist related to your location.
- 3. Check with the City Planner to find out if you are in a flood-prone or high-risk area.
- 4. Consider purchasing flood insurance: Homeowners policies don't cover floods. You need a separate policy just for floods.
- 5. Consider options to protect your property:
 - Document personal property with photos or video
 - Store valuable documents in a safe place away from your home.
 - Install flood protection measures in and around your home.
- 6. Prepare a plan for your household:
 - Be prepared to evacuate. Plan a safe retreat and for a place to meet in case you are separated.
 - Choose an out-of-town contact for every-one to call to let them know where you are.
 - Prepare and maintain a 72-hour kit for each family member.
 - Prepare & maintain an emergency kit for your car.
 - Get to know your neighbors and discuss how you can help each other.
 - Plan how to take care of pets. Emergency shelters may not allow pets.
- 7. Prepare to leave your home.
 - If time allows, move valuables to the highest inside part of your residence.
 - If you can do so safely, turn off electricity, gas and water at main.

Avoiding Extra Flooding Costs





As many of you know, Nibley City's sewer system takes wastewater to Logan City for treatment. However, you may not know that Nibley City pays Logan

City for EVERY gallon of water that is sent for treatment. On average Nibley sends 400 gallons of water through the sewer system per minute during our daily peak times. Peak times include the early morning when most residents are showering and doing dishes to prepare for their day. As Nibley City experienced flooding this past February, we were sending 1,800 gallons of water through the system per minute. This resulted in approximately \$2,000 per day in additional charges. Just to put this all into perspective, when Nibley City had its residents flush their system during the water contamination incident, we were sending 1,500 gallons per minute. Nibley surpassed that number during this last flood. Even now, we are estimating that at the bare minimum we are still paying an extra \$250 per day to treat our sewer water, above and beyond what should be normal, because of residential water from sump pumps.

Not only is pumping your sump pump into the sewer system illegal, it also costs you, the tax payer, thousands of dollars. If storm water continues to be sent through the sewe,r it will eventually have to be compensated for by raising our sewer rates. Nibley City does not want to do this so please make sure your system is set up correctly and do NOT pump ground water into the sewer system. If you are not sure if your system is installed correctly, Nibley City is offering free, in-home inspections to help ensure you are not putting storm water into the sewer system. We thank you in advance for helping to make Nibley City the best it can be.

We All Live Downstream

Everyone knows we all live downstream, but in the case of a sewer system, some live more downstream than others. Is your home one of the lucky ones to be

on the downstream end of the system? Regardless of where you live on the system, you are part of it and, as such, have a responsibility to do your part to ensure that the system functions as it is intended to.

The system is not intended to be a drain for ground-water. During the rain event and subsequent flooding in Nibley last month, sewer flows in the sewer system reached almost 1,800 gallons per minute. Peak flows on normal day produce 400 gallons per minute. This time, we were fortunate enough that our pumps were able to keep up and did not get clogged by any debris that came rushing into the pump station. Part of the reason we were successful is the great amount of effort that city staff puts in to taking care of and maintaining the system. However, despite these efforts, city staff can't keep the sewer system safe or from backing up into people's homes without responsible citizens being educated and doing their part.

Please do not put groundwater from sump pumps, or from any other source, into the sewer system. It may only appear to be a small amount to you at your home, but with hundreds of people doing it simultaneously, it is a large amount of water at the bottom end of the sewer system. Not only does this increase the chance of clogging and overwhelming the system, it is costly to all residents of Nibley City. We all pay for every drop of water that goes down the pipe at your house.

City crews have been using video inspection of sewer mains throughout March to identify those who are dumping ground water into the sewer system. Those found to be doing so, could face financial penalties of up to \$1,000 per day. Please encourage your friends and neighbors not to put ground water into the sewer system.

So what else can you do? Do not put the following items, or any items like those listed here into your toilet, drain or garbage disposal.

- Fats, oils or grease from cooking
- Coffee grinds
- Egg shells
- Produce stickers
- Chunks of garbage
- Disposable diapers
- Feminine hygiene items
- Paper towels
- Flushable cat liter

• Rags

- Condoms
- · Bags/wrappings and cardboard

- Motor oil, transmission fluids, anti-freeze or other toxic chemicals
- Solvents, paints, turpentine, nail polish, polish remover
- Flammable or explosive substances
- Corrosive substances that are either acidic or caustic
- Needles and sharps
- Prescriptions and over the counter medications



What About Flood Insurance?

It was Friday night, my wife calls me and tells me our basement had flooded. I got to our house in Nibley, and sure enough, water was seeping up through

the carpet in every room in our basement. Many neighbors, friends and family members came over and helped, and since I am an insurance agent, many of them jokingly said, "I hope you have good insurance," and although we do have "good insurance," groundwater is not covered by any insurance company.

It's important to know, flood insurance is very expensive (\$1,000-\$3,000 per year). I've been a licensed insurance agent for 11 years and have only sold 1 flood policy, which was required by the bank because the home was in a federally-designated flood zone. Flood insurance would not have covered ground water coming into your home. Nibley experienced ground water infiltration a couple weeks ago, not a flood, and ground water is excluded by all insurance companies. Flood insurance only covers situations when hundreds or thousands of gallons of water are flowing down the street from a river or a dam break and the water is literally sweeping away cars and homes in this path of destruction. That is a what a flood is.

So here's what you can do about ground water:

- #1 Make sure you install a sump-pump and ensure it works.
- #2 Ask your insurance company if they have an endorsement on your home policy called "Sewer Back Up/Sump-Pump Failure." This endorsement gives coverage to your home or personal property if your sump-pump fails and/or is unable to keep up with the ground water coming up from the ground.

For more information, contact your current insurance company or other insurance professionals in the valley to help make sure you understand your policy.

Tree Board & Wildlife Association

Did you know that your landscaping choices can provide an added layer of protection with excess water? Consider planting trees in low areas of your yard to help with potential flooding concerns. Trees will take up more water than grass alone, and your property value will skyrocket.

By now you've heard the territorial songs of Waterfowls, Robins, Red-Wing Blackbirds, Meadowlarks, and other local birds. They are establishing nesting sites now. This is a great time to get your birdhouses put in your yards since many species produce several hatches through the Summer. Please avoid approaching nesting sites so birds can raise their young without feeling threatened. These birds help with insect pest control so you don't have to use toxic chemical sprays.

Nibley's Community Alert System

Nibley City's Community Alert System has been in place for about three years and, in that relatively short time, it has proven to be a valuable tool in notifying Nibley's residents of Nibley City events, problems with utilities, warning of water shutoffs, and to communicate any other important information as needed. Most recently, it was used used to communicate during the flooding Nibley experienced in February and may have been instrumental in preventing raw sewage from backing up into Nibley homes. This system allows Nibley City to contact residents by phone, text, and/or email. Nibley City encourages all Nibley residents to sign up for this service or to update their contact information to ensure we can reach you and your family. To do this, you will need to go to www.nibleycity.com and click on the blue "Community Alert System" button on the right side of the home page. You can include more than one number and the information gathered will be used strictly for Nibley City purposes. Please be sure to enter your home address because messages are sometimes sent out by area.
