Thoughts From Mayor Dustin

Nibley Is Getting Apartments But There Is Something We Can Do-Nibley is getting big apartment complexes along the Nibley/Logan border. Nibley's elected representatives did not vote for this, encourage this, or otherwise cause this. The apartments are not within Nibley City boundaries. They are across the street in Logan and unfortunately

100% of the impact from this development will fall on Nibley. The Nibley City Council, myself and city staff are working our hardest to minimize the impact on our city and your neighborhoods.

Where Are These Apartments?—Logan is annexing and rezoning property along 2200 South near the Firefly Park. So far they have zoned approximately 45 acres with an average density of 20 units per acre. They are in the process of doing the same thing with the land immediately north of Clear Creek Park which was sold this week to a developer for the same purpose. That's another 40 acres at 20 units per acre.

How Did This Happen?—This is a common occurrence were two cities connect. Land values appreciate or depreciate dramatically depending on what can be done with the land. An acre that can be developed with 20 apartments/acre on (Logan's zoning) is worth more than an acre you can build two houses on (Nibley's standard zoning) or even 8 houses on (Nibley's Firefly Estates development). So landowners usually sell to whoever pays the most, and developers will pay more for land that is zoned for more houses. In a case like this, with two cities and land in between, the landowners and developers went to the city that offered the most, and that was Logan. Nibley does not have ordinances that allows high density development. Logan does.

What Are the Impacts? Impact 1: Community Feel—What I mean by this is not farms and parks and whether we have sidewalks or not. What I mean by this is how we treat each other. The people that move in to these apartments didn't have anything to do with the decision to sell, rezone or annex the land into Logan. They moved into a home in an amazing community where they felt like their kids would be safe and have a fighting chance to grow up and be happy. We can give them that. What's the alternative? To be angry and grumpy and resentful of people that want to be a part of our neighborhoods? That's not who we are. I beg you to welcome them and their kids into your neighborhoods, churches and schools. They want to be here because it's awe-some. They are going to be here one way or another. Let's make it awesome.

Impact 2: Financial–Logan has created a financial impact that has the potential for a whole other Nibley along 2200 South with no indication that they intend to build parks, provide safe routes to school or crossing guards, provide for churches, or any other open or public infrastructure. Any park impact fees Logan collects will be spent on the other side of the highway. Logan's intent is to zone all the property Logan controls for similar development, annex all of the property in the County on both sides of 2200 south, and to support any property

What is a Citizen Scientist?

A citizen scientist, also referred to as community scientist, is a member of the general public who collects and analyzes data relating to the natural world, usually as part of a collaborative project with professional scientists. Citizen science enables people from all ages to advance scientific research in every part

of the world. For the individual, it is an excellent way to explore nature.

One of the easiest ways you can jump into citizen science is with the app, iNaturalist (www.inaturalist.org). This app allows you to explore nature in your own backyard and share your sightings with others for insight and verification. Data collection involves identifying plants, birds, and insects and submitting photos.

For other ways you can contribute to scientific studies in Utah, check out the following:

- Utah Water Watch (www.extension.usu.edu/utahwaterwatch.com)-a water quality education and data collection program that seeks to increase awareness about the importance of water quality and promote stewardship of Utah's aquatic resources.
- Wild Utah Project (www.wildutahproject.org)-Opportunities include data collection trips along the Wasatch Front to count black rosy-finches, document western boreal toads in wilderness areas, and identify wildlife images captured on trail cams.
- Utah Pollinator Pursuit (www.utahpollinatorpursuit. org)-Provides training and information on reporting monarch butterfly and bumble bee data in the state.
- Southwest Monarch Study (www.swmonarchs.org)-An organization that researches the migration and breeding patterns of monarchs in the southwestern part of the U.S.
- Natural History Museum of Utah (www.nhmu.utah. edu.org)-Coordinates a number of citizen science projects including Neighborhood Naturalists, Firebugs of Utah, Utah Fox Squirrels, and Western Firefly Project. This is a fun place to visit and a great resource for learning about our natural environment. I recommend Nalini Nadkarni's free online talk, Branching Out: Exploring the Tapestry of the Forest Canopy at 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, April 15.

It's time to get outside, explore your natural world, collect some data, take some photos, and contribute to citizen science!

Why Nibley Needs Higher Density Zoning—Nibley City continues to grow and there is demand for a wider range of housing types. Much of the demand for this housing is near the border with Logan City, near 2200 South. The Strata Apart-

ments, currently being built, are just beyond the boarder of Nibley in Logan. The residents of these apartments will be, for all intents and purposes, Nibley community members, who will visit our parks (across the street) and attend our schools, although they are in Logan City.

Similar development in this area is going to continue to occur due to the desirable location of this area and a rapidly evolving housing market. A property owner north of Clear Creek Park has petitioned to annex to Logan City with the same zoning of the Strata Apartments and will likely to lead to similar development in this area. Logan City allows for up to 20 dwelling units/ acre or up to 737 housing units. If this is annexed into Logan, this could effectively increase the population of Nibley by 20-25%. Nibley will need to accommodate additional users of our parks and programs, more children in Nibley City schools, and additional traffic on Nibley City streets. However, if this development occurs in Logan, Nibley City will receive none of the revenue associated with impact fees and property taxes, while bearing most of the cost. At the time of this writing, the annexation is not finalized and the Nibley City Council has officially protested the annexation petition.

Nibley City is considering adopting a Mixed Residential Housing ordinance for this specific area as an alternative. This new zoning designation would provide better service to the City at large and allow for residential housing development of up to 20 units per acre for this limited unincorporated area that Nibley City has planned for annexation. The ordinance would require the provision of open space and park amenities such as playgrounds, pavilions, and trails. Design standards would ensure new development is of high quality. Existing single-family neighborhoods would be buffered by open space or other single family homes to mitigate impacts.

In addition to public hearings for the ordinance at regular Planning Commission and City Council meetings, the City will be inviting public feedback in other venues to explore solutions to create an ordinance that is most beneficial to existing and future residents of the community. Nibley Permits Required

If you are constructing a new fence in the City, you are required to obtain a Fence permit. The permit is free and requires limited information to ensure that you are in compliance with the City's fence regulations.

If you are remodeling your home, making an addition or building an accessory building over 200 sq. ft., please remember that a building permit is required.

Greenwaste



Nibley City has contracted with Logan City to provided extended greenwaste services for Nibley residents. Nibley's greenwaste facility is located at 3390 South 1200 West and will be available until November 1, 2021. We ask that resident do not place items at drop sites

if there is not a container present or if the containers are full.

Nibley residents can still bring green waste to the Logan City Green Waste Facility located at 153 N 1400 W in Logan for free. This facility is open year-round, Monday-Saturday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Or, residents may order a green waste can for their home by calling 716-9755.

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(Thoughts From Mayor Dustin, continued from page 1) developers in Nibley that want to de annex from Nibley and go into Logan with the same density. This includes the Firefly Estates PUD, which could potentially go from 128 single family homes and townhomes, with 30-40% park space, to 400 apartments. All together, the net result would be 7500-9000 new people who technically live in and pay taxes in Logan, but who culturally live in, go to school in, and use parks in Nibley. It costs a lot of money to provide the services that we do—you taxpayers know that.

We can't stop the development and as long as the land is controlled by Logan it is going to be built out in the density that Logan has determined (commercial and 20 units/acre). How in the world can we pay for all of these impacts if Logan is collecting all the taxes?

The Solution— What I am going to propose is going to be hard for many of us to swallow. We can't force landowners to develop at less density because they will just annex to Logan. We can't get Logan to share revenue but we can fight back by offering the landowners the same deal that Logan offers. We are going to get the development regardless. We are going to get the impact regardless. Logan can take the tax dollars and spend them in Logan, or we put the ordinances in place and work with the developers ourselves. We get the development but we get it on our terms, including open space, The taxes from the development will pay for the impact, and benefit both the people paying them and the people living nearby.

For years your City Council has fought hard to figure out how to deal with the pressure from Logan and the state legislature for affordable housing. We never wanted or intended have a multifamily ordinance. But sharing a common border has forced our hand, and the best way to protect our property, our kids, and our community is to 1) welcome these new people, and 2) to make sure that the unavoidable development happens in Nibley, under Nibley rules, and with Nibley values, so that we have the ability to build the best assets we can for the City and have the financial ability to make sure they are maintained.

We are now in the process of developing a multifamily ordinance that can be used in the 2200 south area, which makes sure that the apartments that will happen in the area are connected, vibrant, and conform to Nibley values. Your Council members, Planning Commission members, and I, need your input and hopefully your support. The alternative is that landowners develop under Logan control, and the money that should be used to maintain them will also be under Logan control. We need your help to keep this from happening. Please follow the process on FaceBook and in our meetings. Give me your ideas and let me know what you think.

2021 Notice of Election

Nibley City will hold a municipal election this fall to elect a Mayor and two (2) City Council members.

The Mayor and City Council members serve four-year terms and are elected at large. Anyone interested in filing for one of these offices must:

- Be a U.S. citizen at time of filing
- Be registered to vote in Nibley City
- Be at least 18 years old
- Be a resident of Nibley City for at least 365 consecutive days immediately preceding the date of election (November 7, 2019)
- Not be a convicted felon
