## **Thoughts From Our Mayor**

Dear Citizens,

Things are pretty quiet here at City Hall right now, but here's what's going on in Nibley (as far as I know):

New Councilman: Tom Bernhardt was selected and sworn in as a new Nibley City Councilman last Thursday. I'm excited to have Tom on board. He brings a wealth of experience, a love for Nibley, and a desire to do things right for all of us. His appointment left a vacancy on the Planning Commission.

New Planning Commissioner: I have asked Carol Albrecht to serve on the Planning Commission. I've known Carol for about as long as we've lived in Nibley, and I have been hoping for an opportunity to work with her and her husband Don ever since they moved in. She has held faculty positions at Texas A&M, Utah State University, and Utah Valley University in Sociology, and I feel really fortunate that she's willing to bring that in-depth knowledge of planning and social dynamics to the table for us. Plus, she's just a good person. The trade-off is that she's withdrawn from the election for City Council to focus on the Planning Commission, but a bird in the hand...

The sewer is quiet.

The sidewalk across Highway 165 at 3200 South is in design and should be done this summer or fall. It apparently depends on whether UDOT has the new lights and poles on hand or whether they have to order them, but once the design is complete, construction should be relatively fast. I hope its in before school starts but I'm just happy to see it getting done.

Nibley staff and I are working with our City Attorney to draft standard contracts that we can use when we contract for services (planning, construction, design, etc). Historically we have used contracts prepared by our consultants. My father-in-law taught me a long time ago that the power in any contract sits with the person that writes it. I appreciate the support of the City Council and staff in getting this done. It will make a big difference in the cost and control that the City sees in our contracts.

## **Reminders from Nibley City Staff**

Keeping Nibley Beautiful

Trees, shrubs, and flower gardens adorn our community along sidewalks and roadways. While they provide beauty and shade, untrimmed trees and shrubs can inhibit pedestrian use of sidewalks and cause walkers to sometimes leave the sidewalk to avoid the vegetation. Please trim trees and bushes so they do not impede the normal flow of pedestrians.

Besides barbecues, hikes, and no school, summer is also a time for weeds and other not so fun yard problems. As a reminder, Nibley City code 4-2 states that weeds over 12" are a nuisance and must be cut. Please keep those pesky weeds under control.

It is also an ordinance violation to dump yard debris (weeds, grass clippings, tree limbs, firewood etc.) into any canal. Debris can travel downstream, build up at one of the canal grates, and cause a canal to backup and overflow causing damage to surrounding property.

Please continue to use the greenwaste bins provided at 3390 South 1200 West and properly dispose of yard debris and weeds. Nibley is a beautiful community and we appreciate the efforts most of our citizens take to make it this way.

There are vending machines with Coca-Cola products located at all of our city parks. Pennies will not work in the machines. If the machine "eats your money," please call **1-800-659-4395** and someone will assist you. They will come and fix the machine and you will get a refund from Coca-Cola directly.

## Cache Valley Wildlife Association & Tree Board News

Increase your property value, shade your home and yard, provide a place for songbirds to sing, help improve air quality... just plant trees. When is the best time to plant trees? 20 years ago. The second best time is today and if you want a free tree the Tree Board will donate a free tree to Nibley residents who certify their property as a certified wildlife habitat.

If you have flowers, trees and shrubs, and a place where birds and butterflies can get a drink of water, your property is eligible to help our city become the first in Utah to be awarded by the National Wildlife Federation. We're seeing more of the "Certified Wildlife Habitat" signs being posted in yards throughout the city. Join them, or be the first one in your neighborhood, to help us achieve this recognition. Nobody comes to inspect your property. You simply describe the habitat qualities of your yard on the online or mail in application. Right now there's a CVWA Board member willing to contribute the one-time fee of \$20 for the first five new registrations. You'll also receive your free tree, the National Wildlife magazine, a sign for your yard, and a personalized certificate for your home. Help wildlife, your yard, and our city at the same time. It's a win-win.

Let's Keep Doing What We Do Best

It's strange how differently we tend to feel when we propose to do something on our own property compared to how we feel when a neighbor proposes to do something on their property. That irony

leads me to a favorite question, "How do we find the right balance between individual property rights and the shared rights of the community?" Here is my best attempt at an answer. It all starts with a balanced, openminded, empathetic, and transparent planning process that receives input from all corners of our community.

While there are milestones in planning—such as our current work to update the General Plan—Nibley City never stops planning. Planning is important because change is inevitable, and if we fail to anticipate change, our community will be designed by those who are not familiar with what we value. But planning isn't only about change and what we want to become, it is just as importantly about what we don't want to change.

I hope you will think specifically about what we do best and don't want to change. Let's build on our strengths. Given the way Utah distributes sales tax and assesses commercial property, it's easy to be lured by things that we are predominantly not. However, the 2008 economic downturn showed that Nibley is a vibrant, sustainable community—even if we aren't approving new subdivisions and adding commercial enterprises.

Just to keep the discussion balanced, I end with this. As we decide to keep doing what we do best, let's also be careful that we not unfairly take away the property rights of our neighbors, lest we also unfairly lose ours.
