Notice of Proposed Tax Increase

The Nibley City Council is proposing to increase its property tax rate. Before doing so, the City Council will hold a hearing to receive input from citizens. The hearing will be held on **Thursday, August 4, 2016 at 6:30 p.m.** at Nibley City Hall.

For the average home in Nibley, this tax increase will cost an additional \$1.79 per month or \$21.44 per year.

The purpose of the increase is to adjust the rate back to the City's historic tax rate of 0.001667.



The Tree Board was able to provide 500 free trees to Nibley residents with the help of the National Wildlife Federation. These trees will provide cleaner air, summer shade, increased property values, and shelter for wildlife species.

Cache Valley Wildlife Association



The Cache Valley Wildlife Association and Stokes Nature Center partnered together and held a Firefly Night. It was spectacular. They expected around 100 people but that estimate over 2,000 people showed up to learn about firefly habitat and life cycles. Participants came from as far as Idaho Falls and St. George just to learn about Nibley’s fireflies. The CVWA encourages all Nibley residents to help protect our small and fragile firefly population. Never collect even a single insect, and remind your out-of-town visitors to only be observers of these amazing creatures.

Congratulations to the 90+ families and Nibley’s three schools that certified their properties as wildlife habitat with the National Wildlife Federation. Because of this, the NWF has awarded Nibley City the status as **the first community in Utah** that values its properties as wildlife habitat. A ceremony is being planned when the official award will be presented to the city.

Weeds

Besides barbecues, hikes, and no school, summer is also a time for weeds and other not-so-fun yard problems. As a reminder, Nibley City code 4-2 states that weeds over 12" are a nuisance and must be cut. Please keep those pesky weeds under control.

Trees, shrubs, and flower gardens adorn our community along sidewalks and roadways. While they provide beauty and shade, untrimmed trees and shrubs can inhibit pedestrian use of sidewalks and cause walkers to sometimes leave the sidewalk to avoid the vegetation. Please trim trees and bushes so they do not impede the normal flow of pedestrians.

Please continue to use the greenwaste bins provided at 3390 South 1200 West and properly dispose of yard debris and weeds. Nibley is a beautiful community and we appreciate the efforts our citizens take to make it this way.

Help Our Emergency Responders

Nibley is protected and served by the Cache County Sheriff's Office and the Hyrum Fire Department. They do a fantastic job. They've asked us to remind residents to use coordinate addresses (ex. 455 W. 3200 S.) in the unfortunate event that you need 911 assistance. Using a street name (ex. 1200 Heritage Ln.) can make it more difficult to locate your property. Using coordinate addresses enables them to assist us in the quickest way possible.

Enforcement Along State Road 165

There will be additional traffic enforcement along SR 165 in anticipation of the opening of Ridgeline High School and the new light at the intersection of 2600 South and SR 165. Nibley City encourages all drivers and pedestrians to observe traffic laws. Please exercise extra caution while traveling, as it will take time for everyone to become accustomed to the changes in traffic patterns.
