The CVWA reminds you it's time to get your birdfeeders filled and up. Birds use more energy staying warm so they need to have a high fat diet to help them survive

cold winter temperatures. Consider keeping blackoil sunflower seeds and a variety of seed-suet mixes in your feeders through the winter months. They are available at most local retailers.

List your local birds online at Project Feederwatch from Cornell Lab of Ornithology. Project FeederWatch is a winter-long survey of birds that visit feeders at backyards, nature centers, community areas, and other locales in North America. Feeder Watchers periodically count the birds they see at their feeders from November through early April and send their counts to Project FeederWatch. FeederWatch data helps scientists track broadscale movements of winter bird populations and long-term trends in bird distribution and abundance. FeederWatch is conducted by people of all skill levels and backgrounds, including children, families, individuals, classrooms, retired persons, youth groups, nature centers, and bird clubs. You can count birds as often as every week, or as infrequently as you like: the schedule is completely flexible. All you need is a bird feeder, bird bath, or plantings that attract birds. H.E.A.T. Program

The Home Energy Assistance Target program provides winter utility assistance to vulnerable, lowincome households, the disabled, elderly, and families with preschool-age children. This assistance is available between November and April. This service is funded through the U.S. Department of Energy Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) and you must apply for assistance. You can apply by calling 713-1444 to schedule an apointment, going online, or print and send a completed application my mail. Getting to Know Nibley's EMTs



Rachel Swanton is a member of our Nibley/Millville EMT squad. She is married to John and has 4 children; Jacob (19), Michael (17), Ethan (13), and Adeline (9). She also has a very spoiled cat named York.

While Rachel was growing up her father served in the Air Force so she has lived in England, Las Vegas, California, Wisconsin, Oregon, Idaho, and of course Utah. When Rachel isn't off saving lives she likes to garden with her husband, hike, and read.

Rachel worked at home as a medical transcriptionist for 17 years while raising her children. She obtained her EMT certification in September of 2009 and has served on Squad 140 since then. Rachel said that one of the main reasons she became an EMT and chose to serve with Squad 140 as a volunteer was that she wanted her children to see that serving their community was important. She said, "I wanted them (her children) to understand that in order to have a community that was worth living in, everyone needs to contribute to make that community the best. When I serve with Squad 140, my whole family has to sacrifice for their community. I have had neighbors who have sacrificed so I could serve the community by being my on-call babysitter when calls came in. It is not just myself that serves . . . there are others who serve to make that possible."

When Rachel was asked to share a heroic story, she responded saying "Every time one of our squad responds to a call, there is a person who is having an emergency and needing help. We have the unique opportunity to step in, calm the storm, and help that person in need. To relieve pain, to provide medical services, and to save a life is one of the most rewarding experiences I have ever participated in!"

If Rachel has inspired you, and you want to serve and feel like you have what it takes to provide medicanl services, the Nibley-Millville First Responders are currently recruiting. Applicants must hold a current EMT certification from the Utah Bureau of Emergency

Medical Services or be willing to attend and successfully complete an EMT course. Financial tuition assistance may be available for interested applicants. For more information please contact squad leader Chris Searle at squad140@gmail.com.

Snow Plows VS. Mailboxes



Snowplows and mailboxes don't mix. If your mailbox and a city snowplow have an unfortunate encounter, please let us know. Our snowplow drivers do an amazing job and do their best to avoid collisions, but sometimes the conditions lead to an unavoidable mishap. Most often, mailboxes are hit

because they are not built according to the national specifications adopted by the United States Postal Service and protrude into the roadway. Please keep the design standards in mind when erecting mailboxes. Mailbox design stadards can be found at www. usps.com/manage/mailboxes.htm.

The U.S. postal service also requires that you clear the front of your mailboxes of snow. If too much of the white stuff builds up in front of your mailbox your mail service may be interupted so be sure to exercise those winter muscles and dig out your boxes.

Winter Parking Regulations

Nibley's winter parking regulations are being enforced. Please be sure to keep vehicles off the street between the hours of 12:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. to avoid being sited.

Parking regulations were enacted to keep streets clear should Nibley's Public Works Department need to clear the roadways after a storm. However, this ordinance applies whether or not there is snow on the ground. It is also very helpful to pull your garbage containers in from the roadway as soon as possible after pick-up. Cache Valley snowstorms can burry those cans pretty quickly. Thank you in advance for your help.
