Thoughts From Mayor Dustin



I am concerned about what is happening with ambulance services in Nibley and countywide. I think it's dangerous. A lots of things we do are optional. But some are not.

Cache County has the authority and responsibility to run Emergency Medical Services (EMS, or ambulance) in the County. Fifteen years ago, all of the cities and towns got together with the County and set up the Cache County


Mayor Shaun Dustin got together with the County and set up the Cache County Emergency Medical Services Authority (CCEMS). CCEMS is how you get a ride to the hospital if you need one in Cache Valley. They respond to car accidents, home accidents, and every medical emergency. The men and women who serve, or have served, in this capacity are heroes in every sense of the word, but they and we are being failed by politics in the valley. I will explain what happened and why, but what I really want to focus on is what we are going to do to make sure that you as Nibley citizens are going to have the service you expect and deserve.

WHAT HAPPENED

Emergency medical services and first response ambulances grew out of fire services back in the 1960s and 1970s. These services are usually administered by fire departments because that is what made sense 50 years ago. Times have changed. When you look at budgets and what people actually need, the need for pure fire service is going down—most of the calls and most of the revenue are for ambulance services, not fire. But the budgets and decisions are still being made by people whose primary focus is fighting fires. The two services can coexist, and they should, if their leaders understand that their jobs are to save lives, whether they do that in ambulances or shiny red trucks. But I feel like they are prioritizing their personal jobs over what is best for the taxpayers and citizens who pay their salaries.

I appreciate fire fighting, but my house can burn to the ground and I will get over it. If I'm in a car accident and my kid is hurting, or if my mom is having a heart attack, I want an ambulance and I want it now. Every penny that is spent on EMS/Fire should be spent based on what is best for the people paying the bills, not the people getting the checks. In Cache County, ambulance services are run by Smithfield and Logan fire departments. Both of those groups see ambulance services as a cash cow to supplement their city Fire Department budgets. They got together, and decided to break up the Cache County system so they could make more money. They tell a different story in public about independence and fairness, but if you press them and follow the money, it doesn't look to me like they are interested in working out issues or finding a fix unless it involves one of them getting paid to provide the services on their terms.

Cache Valley has always pulled together in times of crisis, and the degree of selfishness and shortsightedness on display is all the more shocking because it runs so deeply against everything I thought we were in this valley. I am saddened and disappointed. It is sad and dangerous.

Nibley City Hall will be closed on Christmas Day, Wednesday, December 25. *Nibley City and its employees wish you a happy and safe holiday season!*

Snow Plows, Mailboxes, and Hydrants... Oh my!

The USPS requires that you clear the front of your mailbox of snow. If too much snow accumulates in front of your mailbox, your mail service may be interrupted.



While you are clearing your mailbox, you should also clear your neighborhood fire hy-

drant. Please clear enough perimeter to walk around the hydrant and clear a path from the hydrant to the street. Your efforts could make a huge difference in a fire.

Finally, we all know that snowplows and mailboxes don't mix. Nibley City's Public Works staff do everything they can to avoid mishaps. Unfortunately these adversaries occasionally have an unfortunate encounter. Please let us know when this happens. However, most mailboxes are hit because they are not built to the national specifications adopted by the USPS (*www.usps.com/manage/mailboxes.htm*) and protrude into the public right-of-way.

Do not push snow into the street

Help Nibley City's Public Works department keep our roads clear and safe. Please do not push or shovel snow from your driveway or sidewalks into the street. There is actually a state law prohibiting this. The law states: "It is unlawful for any person to place snow from a driveway onto any road or highway which interferes with the normal use or creates a safety hazard."

WHAT WE ARE GOING TO DO

The best thing to happen would be for the political leaders in Cache Valley to stand up and lead on ambulance service. Treat fire departments as a separate service, and focus on fixing the ambulance service.

Cache County has the authority to say, just like they have done for the past 150 years with the Sheriff's department, that they will provide the service countywide. Under this umbrella, Logan and Smithfield can keep their systems and run them however they want, and tax their citizens directly for the service, but the County provides the core.

If the County fails to live up to this obligation, Nibley will work out its own salvation. We have a core of dedicated, trained, and motivated volunteer emergency medical service folks who serve Nibley and Millville. We will work with Millville and whichever other cities around us that are willing to collaborate, to get to the level of service that we expect.

At the beginning of this newsletter I said this whole thing was dangerous. It is dangerous, but if we work together as a complete valley, and focus on what's really important—service instead of selfishness—we can have a system that is as focused and efficient as it is honored and serving. We could have a system that our predecessors and our kids would be proud of. It's still possible to work this out if the County Council will stand up do this the Cache Valley way—"conservative, cost effective and focused on the real problems." If this doesn't happen, your City Council and I will work with our Nibley-Millville First Responders and bring you a plan that works for our City. And that plan will be as conservative, cost effective, and focused on the real problem as we can make it.

The Home Energy Assistance Target (HEAT) program provides winter utility assistance to low-income households targeting those who are truly vulnerable-the lowest-income households with the highest heating costs, the disabled, elderly, and families with preschool-age children. HEAT is funded through the U.S. Department of Energy Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program.

HEAT is available November through April. Appointments are scheduled on a first-come first-served basis.

To qualify for HEAT assistance, you must be the person responsible for the utilities, have at least one household member who is a US citizen or qualified alien, and have an income at or below 150 percent of the federal poverty level. It's traditional to give gifts during the holiday season. Consider giving our local wildlife a gift this year.

 Buy a birdfeeder to hang up in a tree in your yard. A large feeder won't need to be refilled often. Hang it high to prevent deer from bothering it. Fill it with black-oil sunflower seeds, the favorite of most birds. Suet cakes are also loved by most birds since the extra fat helps them stay warm during cold winter temperatures-then enjoy the company and songs of the new birds that will visit your neighborhood.



2. The many, many benefits that trees provide cannot be overemphasized. Forest fires and droughts have recently destroyed millions of trees. The loss of those trees will affect wildlife, property values, temperatures, clean air, and soil erosion. Perhaps it's time to reconsider the traditional purchase of once-living Christmas trees just to have in our homes for

a week or two. As our population grows, more people will want to have more trees cut down. Whether they are personally harvested directly from our forest lands, or purchased from a Christmas tree company, the results will be the same. Artificial trees are an option, but now there are issues concerning plastics. Some people buy live, potted trees for the Christmas week, then keep them for planting in the Spring. Manager, EMT

An Emergency Medical Technician, also known as an EMT, cares for patients at the scene of an incident. They must have the skills to assess a patient's condition and manage a range of medical emergencies from respiratory, cardiac, and trauma emergencies to behavioral health emergencies and structure fires. While this is

an essential part of any community, most don't realize the critical necessity until it's needed by them or a loved one. Nibley City has a great team of emergency medical technicians who respond to a wide range of emergencies throughout the year. All are volunteers willing to give their time and talent to help the community in which they live.

Typically, Emergency Medical Technician's respond to emergency situations and their ability to quickly assess a medical condition and provide the appropriate medical care can be a highly stressful situation, but it also comes with a high level of satisfaction. Not every patient will be in a life/death scenario, but even the smallest medical calls are a chance to make a difference in a person's life. Being an EMT, you see people in the most important moments of their lives, sometimes those moments are good and other times they may be bad. However, being part of our community emergency services team allows you to understand what really matters in life and become a better person because of it.



The rewarding part of prehospital emergency medical care is that you get to step in on the chaos of the worst day in someone's life and bring some calm and peace to the situation. This, to me, is what it's all about. The Nibley Emergency Medi-

cal Services group is currently looking for dedicated volunteers willing to provide pre-hospital emergency medical care to their community members.
