Thoughts From Our Mayor

There is a proposed industrial subdivision on the West side of Nibley. I'm excited about the possibility of a new business venture that will bring jobs and opportunities, but I'm deeply unhappy about the location.

It seems to me that we made promises to people that just can't be kept when we decided to allow a residential zone next to an industrial zone with no buffer (as we did here). When we put the zoning out there in place sometime before 2006, we effectively told the owner of the industrial property that they could put anything out there that Nibley permits in the way of business. Sure, we might be able to put conditions on it depending on what they want to do, but ultimately, an industrial zone is our most permissive land use. The adjoining property is zoned for residential use, and it's had homes on it for the past 5 years. People have invested their lives and their life savings in what we as a City represented as an appropriate place for them to raise their families.

When we plan, set zones, and write ordinances, we make promises to people. I hate broken promises. I am appreciative of the opportunity to bring appropriate business to Nibley City. At the same time, I'm afraid that we've dug ourselves a real hole in pitting these two uses against each other like this. I understand the concerns of and wholeheartedly support the residents impacted by this development. The zoning that allows it is more out of place now than it was 6 years ago when I first pointed it out. This is going to take some time and patience to fix, but I want you to know that we are working actively to find a solution that respects the rights of the owners of all the properties involved.

This is the wrong parcel for an industrial development. I hope that we can work out a compromise that brings a great partner into the City and protects the homeowners and residents. At the end of the day, the law says that because of the way that property is zoned, we have to allow development so long as it meets the requirements of our ordinances.

Moving forward, we need to take the lesson this offers, and have a serious look at our City zoning. Our ordinances have not kept up with our realities, and we've got to get on top of that or this will happen again.

Thanks for all that you all do. I'm humbled to be your Mayor.

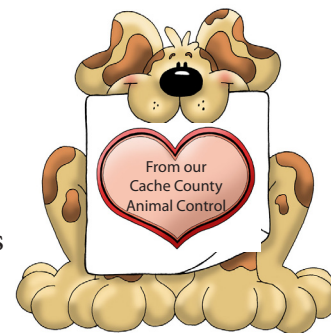

Caring for Our Pets in Cold Weather

When it gets cold outside, and especially with the frigid temperatures we are experiencing, there are times when it’s important for you to do special things for your animals. Outside animals like dogs use more calories to keep warm in winter, so you should give your dog additional food. Fresh straw (not hay) can make a nice bed in the doghouse because it is comfortable and helps keep your dog warm, and if you leave water outside, make sure it does not become frozen. Dogs need regular, cool water to drink, not ice.



After your dog has been playing in the snow, check his feet. There may be snowballs stuck between his toes. Snow can also build up on a dog’s ears, tail, and belly. It forms little balls of very hard, icy snow that can be very cold and painful.

Many people wonder where dogs, especially little ones, can go to the bathroom when there is deep snow. One thing you can do is shovel the snow in an area that is big enough for your dog to “do his business”.

Young puppies should not be left outside when it’s very cold. They can’t make themselves warm like older dogs. Please take these preventative steps to ensure our four-legged friends stay safe this winter.

The deadline for licensing dogs for 2014 is **March 1**. This includes first time applicants as well as renewals. Annual fees are as follows:

- Spayed/neutered—\$15.00
- Unaltered dogs—\$25.00
- Kennel License—\$25.00

A \$10.00 late fee for each dog will be charged after March 1. You can also renew your dog license online by going to www.nibleycity.com. Next, click on “Citizens” and then scroll down to “Dog Licensing” and finally, click on “Renew Dog License Online.” If you have more than two dogs, a kennel license is required. Call the Nibley City Office if you have questions regarding renewal and/or kennel licenses. Dogs not previously registered with Nibley City must be registered in person at the Nibley City offices. Please bring proof of vaccinations and alteration.

Please be a responsible pet owner. Keeping “man’s best friend” licensed with the city can be useful in contacting you and ensuring your pet’s safety should your dog ever get loose
