Thoughts From Mayor Dustin

Before we moved to Nibley, we had a dog. She was an OK dog, not a great dog, not a bad dog. One day, she up and disappeared. Just gone. A few days later, we found out that one of our neighbors had decided that we were not good dog owners, and that Betsy would be better off with her.

At first I was mad. I called my lawyer friend Geoff all ready to scorch the earth and get Betsy back. After a while though, I got to thinking a little bit more. Why would our neighbor feel like that? Was it because she was a dirty thief who wanted our stuff? I'd argue that the answer to that was yes, but was there more to it? How were we handling our responsibility as dog owners, not just to Betsy but to our neighbors? Why would she decide that risking an obvious felony was a good idea?

With a little introspection, I realized that we were not good owners, and we weren't being fair to Betsy or to the neighbors. We weren't bad. There was no dogfighting, she had plenty to eat, and we would scratch her behind the ears when she asked for it, but we also didn't take our responsibilities seriously. When she got out (she liked to get out and run), we figured she would be OK, and that our neighbors wouldn't mind her being out any more than we did. But when we did that, we were creating a danger to Betsy by letting her run where she could be hit by a car. We were creating at least a perceived danger to our neighbors by letting her out unsupervised (even the best dog will do dangerous things if it doesn't feel safe). And we were creating a nuisance and bad blood with all of our neighbors every time she pooped on their lawn or barked in the street.

The irony is that I was willing to take my neighbor to court over her wanting to give Betsy a safe responsible home. At the same time, I wasn't thinking about my responsibility to provide that same thing. Also, what I thought of as a little inconvenience was actually just as much against the law as her keeping the dog.

We have laws and standards about pet ownership for two reasons; one is for the welfare of the animal. The other is to give us a path to the companionship and utility that animals provide, while also making sure that we don't infringe on the rights of our neighbors to pursue their own lives, liberty and happiness, without having to take care of something that they didn't sign up for. Our neighbors might like us, and they might like our pets, but they don't own them—they don't have the responsibility to clean up after them, they shouldn't need to listen to them, and they certainly shouldn't be threatened by them. That's why we have rules about how they should be treated, what kinds are permitted (did you know you can have chickens, but roosters are not allowed—too noisy?) and how many we can have (no more than two dogs without a special kennel permit). We require dogs to be on leashes and in yards, not because we are mean and we don't like your dog, but because

Nibley's Canine Residents



Nibley is currently updating, renewing, and replacing all dog licenses in the City. All Nibley canine residents must be registered and have proof of rabies vaccinations. Nibley City requires dogs to be registered to ensure that all dogs are up to date on their rabies vaccination and to help Nibley City and Animal Control return your dog to you safe-and-sound should they get lost.

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If a dog is lost in Nibley City, Animal Control with the Cache County Sheriff's department (716-9400) is responsible for collection. The animal control officers examine the dog, check

for ID tags and scans for a microchip with the hope that they can return the dog quickly. Unfortunately, if animal control is unable to find any identification, or if this not the first time your dog has been picked up, a citation will be issued and the dog will be impounded with Nibley City for up to five business days. To retrieve your missing dog, you will be required to pay \$45 for the citation and \$15 for each evening the dog was left in Nibley City's care.

While we are "pup sitting," Nibley City staff reviews our records to find any registered dogs matching the description of the impounded dog and reaches out to potential owners. If the owner cannot be found within the week, the dog is turned over to the Cache Humane Society to be adopted. Nibley City had a great track record in 2017 with only 27 dogs impounded and only two sent to the Cache Humane Society. Luckily these dogs were later claimed by their owners and returned home. This meant that every dog picked up last year got reunited and none were euthanized.

To register your dog, please come into to Nibley City Hall by February 28 with your proof of rabies vaccination. Each dog will be given a new Nibley City tag. If you ever lose your dog, please call Nibley City or the Sheriff's Office. We will do everything within our authority to help reunite your family will your furry friend.

Whether you get water from the City water system or your home has a private

well, your water supply depends on having power to operate the system. During a power outage—or any disaster that can cause a power outage, such as severe weather, earthquake, or flood—you may find yourself without drinkable water.

Tasks:

- Purchase and store a 72-hour supply of commercially bottled water (or more—up to two weeks).
- Bottle a 72–hour supply of water at home.
- Learn how to provide a safe supply of drinking water for your household in a disaster.

License Registration/Renewal

Come visit the new Heritage Animal Hospital next to Camp Saver for Nibley City's FIRST-EVER Dog Rabies Vaccine & License Clinic featuring \$20 rabies vaccines. No appointments will be necessary and a friendly Nibley City employee will be on hand to assist with dog licensing. A dog license is \$15 for an animal that has been spayed or neutered and \$25 for an animal that hasn't been fixed. For this clinic, cash or check is preferred for license fees.

If you are able to provide proof of previous vaccination or proof of last year's Nibley City registration, the clinic may be able to issue a rabies vaccine that is effective for three years.

Tree Board & Wildlife Association



Winter is hard on wildlife and their habitat. If your trees are starting to blister on the south side of their trunks wrap them with white, reflective tree wrap. Some have also found success

by wrapping sections of 12" white styrofoam rolls, used in wrapping fragile items for mailing, around tree trunks and attaching them with clothes-pins. They are easy to take apart in the Spring and store for use in the following winter.

Don't forget to feed your neighborhood song-

birds as well. Black-oil sunflower seeds and cakes of suet are favorites of many colorful birds and help them maintain the body fat they need for cold winter temperatures. If you

And if we fail in our responsibility to live up to our obligations as pet owners, we need to expect that we'll be picking the dog up from the pound, and paying the fine that we owe.

So, what happened with Betsy? We decided to let it go-we figured that we liked her, but that lady loved her. She would be about 16 now, and I'm sure she lived out her days sleeping on the couch and eating the dog equivalent of bonbons. I think it worked out for the best for all of us.
