

Thoughts From Mayor Dustin



Ron Helstern passed away this month. If you didn't know Ron, then I'm sorry. He is an amazing man. Ron was one of those people that saw how good the world could be and didn't just think about it or talk about it or blog about it. He got out and did stuff that made a difference. He was, at various times in his life, a teacher, a coach, an advocate, a naturalist, and, in the place I got to know him best, a City

Councilor. I'm going to tell you how Ron, an apolitical doer, got involved with the City Council, one huge difference he made that impacts all of you, and how your personal decisions will either make what he did even better, or not.

One of our Council members was moving and the way it works is that when someone resigns from the City Council, citizens submit applications to replace them. The Council reviews the applications, and in a public meeting, picks a new council member by majority vote. This has happened two times since I've been the mayor. Both times we have gotten some incredible candidates. One of those candidates was Ron. All the candidates presented their good ideas—ideas about governance, and regulations and better services. It was obvious that they were all plugged in and passionate about this City. Ron's presentation was a little different, and if you know Ron, you know that it was about nature and environment and what an amazing place this valley is. I was humbled by his perspective of who we are, his vision for what we could become, and how that was tied to the land, animals and plants around us.

I don't get to vote much in City Council. I only get to vote to break a tie, so when I do vote it's pretty memorable (to me). This vote was split, 2-2. I remember thinking that both candidates were great, and would serve with distinction, but that I really wanted to live in whatever town Ron was a part of. So I voted, Ron joined us on the council. Even though he wasn't there long, he made an impact that will serve this community for generations. You see, Ron was instrumental in making the Firefly Nature Park a reality. Nibley is home to one of the few known firefly populations in the west.

If you haven't seen a firefly, they are magical. For about four weeks at the end of June and beginning of July, they buzz around the park at twilight looking for a mate. Ron's vision for a preserve defined a space for people to observe and enjoy something really special. I love that a guy like Ron was willing to put a little bit of himself into this community.

So how do we help with this? Nibley is changing and growing. We all came here because this place worked for us. When something works for me, I don't want it to be changed. The fields and springs and ponds and canals and trees are obvious things. Less obvious are the animals—the birds, the marmots, the ermine, the raccoons, the deer, the muskrats, and even the skunks. Fireflies are pretty far down on the list of things we notice. The purpose of Firefly Park is to preserve something that is going away as land develops. Preservation (continued on page 2)



Dog License Registration & Renewal

Show your love for your pet and get them registered with Nibley City. Dog registration, for all of Nibley City's canine friends, is open from now until **February 29, 2020.** After February 29, a late fee will be assessed. Nibley City requires all dogs within Nibley City boundaries, over the age of 6 months, to be licensed and have a current rabies vaccination. If you know your registration is up-to-date you may call the Nibley City offices to renew your registration. However, there will be an additional \$4 processing fee should you choose this option.

When your "best friend" is registered with Nibley City, it helps the Cache County Animal Control officers and the Cache Humane Society facilitate getting your pet back quickly should it go missing, which may save you costly fees. 

On January 3, 2020, Nibley lost one of its most active and respected citizens, Ron Hellstern, to cancer.

Ron and Wendy have lived in Nibley for over 21 years. During that time, Ron worked tirelessly to enhance wildlife habitat in the community. He promoted ways to create and maintain nat-

ural environments along our roadways, in our yards, and in our parks; allowing humans and wildlife to coexist.

Ron's many efforts included serving on the Nibley City Council and the Tree Board as part of the Tree City USA program. Ron was instrumental in forming the Cache Valley Wildlife Association under the direction of the National Wildlife Federation. This contributed to Nibley being listed as the first "Certified Wildlife Habitat" city in the state of Utah. As you enjoy Firefly Park, think of Ron who helped name, acquire, and responsibly develop the area as a Nature Park. Ron was Nibley's 2013 Citizen of the Year and was also once the Grand Marshall in Nibley's Heritage Days parade.

Ron left his mark throughout the valley as well. Ron was always involved in environmental issues and educating the public—especially in regards to monarch butterfly conservation. You may have heard Ron on the radio where he was a frequent contributor on *Wild About Utah*, read his articles in the Herald Journal, or visited a booth tended by Ron during Heritage Days.

Ron leaves a void in our great city. His efforts will not be forgotten. The hope is we will all carry on his legacy by using our individual and collective gifts to better serve our City in ways that we are able. Plant trees, shrubs, and pollinator plants; reuse, recycle, reduce; enjoy the birds, bees, and butterflies in your yard; get involved in city organizations; and, encourage others to do the same.

Planning Our City

February will be a busy month for the Planning Commission and City Council as they review new developments, an annexation, and some updates to Nibley City Code.

The Nibley City Planning Commission make recommendations to the Nibley City Council. This month they are considering recommendations of the following updates and changes to Nibley City Code:

- Commercial Standards and Zoning Updates
- A proposal to change Nibley City Code to allow homeowners to have detached apartments/guest homes on their property.
- The Planning Commission will create a list of goals and projects to address over the next year.

There are also a couple of land use applications that the Planning Commission and City Council will consider:

- A Residential Planned Unit Overlay Zone of twenty acres west of Firefly Park. This overlay zone would allow the development of single-family housing, town homes, and open space
- A Residential Planned Unit Overlay Zone for 76 acres east of City Hall, and north of 3200 S. This overlay zone would allow the development of single-family housing, town homes, condominiums, and open space. The City Council will be holding a public hearing on the development on February 13 at 6:30 p.m.
- Final approval of Nibley Farms Subdivision Phase 2 and 3, located on 1500 W around 3500 S. Nibley Farms is a single-family rural preservation subdivision that has already gained preliminary approval.
- The annexation of over fifty acres north of 2600 S and west of 1200 W. The City Council will be holding a public hearing on the development on February 13 at 6:30 p.m.

Finally, the Planning Commission made a positive recommendation for a proposed Water Master Plan and updated Outdoor Lighting Standards to the Council. The City Council will consider these items for adoption to Nibley City policy this month.

Nibley's Laws Regarding Animal Residents



Most pet owners know that it's common courtesy to take small plastic bags with them when they walk their dogs and to clean up any "deposits" their pup may leave. Please be courteous and pick up after your dog. Doing so helps prevent the spread of parasites and disease between dogs and people.

It is also against Nibley City ordinance (19.02.110 A.2) to allow your animals to trespass on another person's property. Please remember that while you may enjoy the company and caretaking responsibilities of owning animals, your neighbor may feel differently.



Finally, please pay attention to the posted signs at Nibley City's parks. Nibley City Code 16.16.040 reads:

"Dogs are permitted in all parks and on Nibley City Trails unless otherwise posted, except that <u>dogs are not allowed</u> <u>in Firefly Park.</u> All dogs must be under control and on a leash, except for in des-

ignated off-leash areas or dog parks as may be designated by the City. All dog owners or person with the dog shall clean up after their dog's waste, and dispose of it in proper garbage receptacle, and must be in possession of a bag for such purposes whenever walking a dog on City property. Retractable and wireless leashes and leashes longer than eight (8) feet are not permitted in Nibley City parks."
