Mayor Jacobsen's Message



Our pets are important parts of our families as well as our community. We care for our pets as we would our own kids. Because many of our pets, especially our dogs, don't live exclusively indoors, those pets also become members of our community. Becky's pets (I'm Becky's husband) are so well cared for that I joked in this column last year that I hoped in

Mayor Larry Jacobsen my next life to come back as one of her pets—dog, cat, goat, chicken—any of those would be fine with me. I have an update on that plan. I asked my friend Ajay, who has knowledge about the Hindu religion, about coming back as a goat. Ajay told me that I already blew it. He said I can only be one of Becky's goats in my next life if I was mean to them in this life. I have no desire to be mean to something that is so important in our family.

I have three requests of you and your pets. Please license your dogs, control your dogs, and make sure your pets are good neighbors. Dog licensing is important for a few reasons. First, it ensures that your dogs' rabies vaccinations are current. Not only does vaccination safeguard your pets' health, but it also protects human health. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) reported in 2019 that "Human rabies is 99% fatal. However, it is 100% preventable through vaccinating pets against rabies, avoiding contact with wildlife and unknown animals, and seeking medical care as soon as possible after being bitten or scratched by an animal." The next reason to license your dogs is to greatly increase the chance of reuniting a lost pet. With registration, your dog gets a Nibley tag that will trace them back to you. Nibley has moved the due date for dog licenses from the first of the year to the end of February to avoid the holiday rush. There's even an early bird special if you renew dog licenses before the due date.

Finally, dog licensing helps pay Nibley's annual contract with Cache County Animal Control, who pick up dogs at large. Even with the registrations that are collected, Nibley City has to subsidize a portion of this annual contract price from the general fund. All residents who have a dog should ensure their "best friend" is registered with Nibley City to do their part in providing animal control services.

There are consequences if you don't control your dogs. I am sad to report that we had a recent dog attack on one of our citizens, with unfortunate consequences to the person who was attacked, the dog, and the dog owner.

I was excited to learn from the County Council meeting on January 11, 2023, that the new animal shelter is nearly ready to open. This facility is the result of the intersection of a few key elements. First, the Sheriff's commitment to the plan (more than \$3M in construction costs); second, New Vision Veterinary (a nonprofit organization); and third, the new vet program at Utah State University. New Vision is already doing a great job of reuniting lost pets with their families and finding new homes



for unclaimed pets. The USU Vet School will be a great resource to ensure that reunited and rehomed pets are healthy before they leave the shelter.

Please put yourself in your neighbor's shoes and realize the influence that your pets have on your neighborhood. Whether its barking dogs or crowing roosters, your neighbors might see your pets differently than you do. When in doubt, ask your neighbors if they are adversely affected, and if so, work together towards a solution. If that doesn't happen, then Nibley City and its land-use and nuisance ordinances get involved. Even though I promise to enforce Nibley's ordinances, I think the first solution is the best one. Our pets are incredibly important to us and our wellbeing. If we work together, we can ensure that they are happy and welcome members of our community.

Cache Valley Wildlife Association Dogs and Wildlife

Many of us enjoy taking our dogs out on a hike or ski. We also love taking them to our neighborhood parks for a bit of human

and doggy exercise. Nibley pet-owners are fortunate to have dog-friendly parks throughout the city where you can walk your leashed pet. However, one exception to the dog rule is Firefly Park. So, why is Firefly Park a no-dog zone when even the adjacent Virgil Gibbons Heritage Park (just east of Firefly Park) allows dogs on leashes?

Well, there's a good reason. Firefly Park is a "nature" park, meaning that it is managed for the diversity of vegetation and wildlife it supports, including several dozen types of birds that breed, nest, and overwinter in the secluded grasslands and wetlands that dominate the park. For example, there is a pair of sandhill cranes that raise their young in the interior of Firefly Park each summer that you can enjoy watching (from a distance).

While it is obvious how an unleashed dog can disturb wildlife inhabitants, it may be unclear how a leashed dog can impact species. The sound of barking, the smell, and yes, even the visual presence of a dog, can cause wildlife to be temporarily or permanently displaced and/or cause undue stress (which could lead to nest abandonment, increased risk to disease, etc.) and a reduction in the amount of perceived habitat available in which to feed, breed, and nest.

Most pet owners also appreciate an opportunity to watch and enjoy wildlife. Let's protect the "nature" in the Firefly "nature park" for all to enjoy by understanding -Larry and respecting the dog laws in Nibley City.

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A Spotlight on Our Animal Control Officers



Deputy Hadley is the newest Deputy for the Cache County Sheriff's Animal Control Office and is extremely excited to be with such a great agency. Deputy Hadley is also the STAR Animal Control Deputy for Nibley City. STAR means "Sheriff's Town and Area Representative".

This means Deputy Hadley is responsible for gathering information from Nibley City, and routinely checking in with the city to see how everything is going and answer any questions needed. All 3 Animal Control Deputies patrol Nibley, however Deputy Hadley is solely responsible for making contacts with the city and answering questions from any members of the public.

Deputy Hadley spent his time hunting and fishing with his dad while he was growing up and obtained a strong love for animals at a young age and knew that when he got older he wanted to work around animals. Deputy Hadley previously worked for the Utah Division of Wildlife Resources where he completed wildlife surveys, habitat work and trapped wildlife. When he was offered the job with the Cache County Sheriff's Office he "didn't know I would be serving such amazing people and representing one of the finest law enforcement agencies in the country. If you see me around and have any questions please feel free to flag me down as I would love to talk with you!"

Tips From Our Deputies

Our job as Animal Control Deputies is to help the animals within the cities we contract with stay safe and protected. It is our goal to return any animal home safely. The biggest part of our job is to enforce the animal ordinances that the city has created. As we patrol around the cities that we serve, we are looking to see if we can find any animal that has misplaced itself and help guide owners as to the city's ordinances. We have put a few tips together to help guide you with taking care of your dogs.

• *Microchips:* Getting your animals microchipped is simple to do and relatively cheap. A microchip is a small device inserted just under the skin between the shoulder blades of the animal. It is a permanent form of identification that has a number unique to each animal. The chip is registered to the company it was manufactured from and contains owner information. We scan any dog or cat that is picked up for a microchip and if that animal has one, we are able to contact the company and retrieve owner information to return the animal home.

- Collar with Tags: It is an ordinance and requirement of Nibley City that every dog have a collar on with their current rabies tag along with their city registration license. This can also to help us identify dogs. If a dog does not have a microchip, we are able to use the city license number of a rabies tag to find out owner information and return the dog home.
- Rabies Vaccinations: Rabies vaccines are required for every dog within the county. This is to help regulate and decrease the amount of rabies that is found in our area. It is also important to keep your dog up to date on other recommended vaccinations like Bordetella and DH2PP. A rabies vaccination is also required to license your dog with the city or county. All you need is proof of the vaccination being current.
- let your dog outside to use the bathroom, but it is important, especially if you do not have a fenced yard, to keep eyes on your dog. Several of the calls we receive about dogs at large are due to letting your dog outside to use the bathroom and leaving it unattended. There is a leash ordinance in the city that requires any dog that is not on the owner's property to be contained on a leash. This law includes in the parks that are spread throughout the city. All dogs must remain on a leash.
- Cold Weather Tips: With the cold temperatures it's
 important to keep an eye on your dog's body condition. Especially if your dog is housed outside, make
 sure that it has access to shelter, food, and water.
 Having a shelter that has a heat mat or straw to help
 insulate your pet during this extremely cold weather
 will add to their comfort.
