From the Mayor

Dear Nibley Residents,

Welcome to 2015 everybody. It's going to be a great year. I thought I'd take a few minutes and let you know what Nibley's staff, City Council, and Planning Commission have been up to this year; and what we hope to get done in 2015. I also want to thank you all for your help in getting some things done that we couldn't have pulled off without you:

- 1. UDOT's agreement to install a pedestrian crosswalk at 3200 South (thanks to all of you, UDOT, and the CMPO).
- 2. A balanced budget and a sparkling clean financial audit (thanks to Nibley's staff and City Council).
- 3. Sealing a third of Nibley's streets (thanks Public Works Department).
- The new baseball diamond (thanks Parks Department).
- Fair settlement of our protracted lawsuit with the irrigation company.
- 6. An agreement for a safe crossing at the new high school and stoplight at 2600 South.
- 7. Bringing all the small communities in the valley together to press for a fair wastewater system.
- 8. Hiring a new public works director (welcome Justin Maughn).
- 9. Signing an agreement with the County for a major expansion of Heritage Park.
- 10. Drafting new Subdivision and Noise ordinances (thanks Shari and Planning and Zoning Commission).
- 11. Standing firm on our development regulations (thanks staff, City Council, and P&Z).
- 12. Completion of the Blacksmith Fork River Restoration and Flood Control Project.
- 13. Safe school crossings.
- 14. The best emergency medical services team in Cache Valley.
- 15. A great Heritage Days program.

I'm feeling pretty good because 1, 2, 6, 7, and 11 were big items on my to-do list when I ran for Mayor. In fact, those were why I ran so I thank you for all your support as we've worked through these things. I feel like I've learned a lot, and I appreciate the opportunity to serve. And for what it's worth, I'd estimate that by focusing on these priorities, we've easily picked up \$2,000,000 in value to the taxpayers of Nibley this year—nearly a third of our annual budget . . . like a 30% tax cut. If you have any questions about how that was done, stop me and ask me some time. I'll be glad to share.

When I ran I figured if we got those things I mentioned done, my four years would be up and I could go back to my books and my plans to dig a pond. I frankly didn't expect to be where we are yet, but there's no shortage (continued on page 2)

Dog Licensing

The deadline for licensing dogs for 2015 is February 28. This includes first time applicants as well as renewals. Annual fees are as follows:

- Spayed/neutered—\$15.00
- Unaltered dogs—\$25.00
- Kennel License—\$25.00

A \$10.00 late fee for each dog will be charged after March 1. You can also renew your dog license online by going to www.nibleycity.com. Click on "Citizens" next and then scroll down to "Dog Licensing" and finally, click on "Renew Dog License Online". If you have more than two dogs, a kennel license is required. Call the Nibley City Office if you have questions regarding renewal and/or kennel licenses. Dogs not previously registered with Nibley City must be registered in person at the Nibley City offices. Please bring proof of vaccinations and alteration.

Please be a responsible pet owner. Keeping "man's best friend" licensed with the city can be useful in contacting you and ensuring your pet's safety should your dog ever get loose

of things that we need to work on and that we have the ability to do something about. This year, my goals are:

- 1. Get the right wastewater solution for Nibley.
- Update Nibley City's General Plan.
- Pass the new subdivision and noise ordinances.
- Build the 2600 South bridge.
- 5. Install the SR165 and 3200 South crosswalk and light.
- 6. Move recycling to a permanent home and clean up the site.
- 7. Start our new city well.
- 8. Streamline our park and community recreation services.
- 9. Formalize contracting procedures for city services.
- 10. De-politicize Mayor and Council salaries.
- 11. Get ready for the light at 3200 South

Then there's all the stuff that is just going to happen whether we plan for it or not, but I am confident that we have the right people in place to get that done. I'm looking forward to the challenges and the opportunities to serve, and I hope that you are too.

Something that makes Nibley great is the willingness of our citizens to serve. Several opportunities to serve will be available in the new year. City Council member Carrie Cook, who has served honorably for three years on our council, is moving out of the valley and is stepping down as of December 31, 2014. I am sorry that we are losing her. She has been instrumental in the successes we've had. Any citizens who are interested in being appointed to fill her seat should go to www. *nibleycity.com* to find out how to apply. The deadline to apply will be January 20 at noon and we will hold a meeting to fill the vacancy on January 29 at 6:30 p.m. The public is welcome to attend that meeting.

We are also losing a great servant on our planning commission, Wayne Anderson, who is completing his second five-year term on the commission. He will be tough to replace but I know we have plenty of other good people out there. I also need to make appointments for our city's representative to the Cache Valley Transit District and the Cache Mosquito Abatement District. Please consider serving in one of these positions. There hasn't been much need so far, so enjoy the break and gear up to be ready to keep Nibley's sidewalks clear when the snow finally decides to arrive. There can be a lot of pedestrian traffic on Nibley's sidewalks, even in the winter time, and especially if you live along a school route or one of Nibley's major

thoroughfares. Nibley's City Code (7-1-2) states that residents are required to remove the snow from their sidewalks within a reasonable time after the snowstorm has ended, which the City has interpreted to mean within twenty-four (24) hours after the storm is over.

The Planning and Zoning Commission adopted their 2015 meeting schedule at their last meeting on December 10, 2014. The Commissioners also opted to adopt a new meeting time. The Planning and Zoning Commission will now be meeting at 5:30 p.m. on the second and forth Wednesday of each month.

Bountiful Baskets

Bountiful Baskets is a not-for-profit food co-op that offers fresh produce for less money all year round. This co-op is all -volunteer with no contracts, so they pay rock bottom prices for their produce. The co-op offers a conventional basket for \$15, which is generally 1/2 fruit and 1/2 vegetables, and an organic option for \$25—you must bring your own basket or container. Participants make their contributions on the website (*www.boun-tifulbaskets.org*) when the website opens on Mondays. The produce is then delivered to 300 West 3200 South in Nibley on the following Saturday.
