Thoughts From Our Mayor

Dear Citizens,

THANK YOU NIBLEY! Heritage Days was awesome this year; from the art show to the children's play, and the Concert to the Fireworks, what a great week. Heritage days is about our heritage, our families, and having fun together. My hope is that next year everyone will come out and draw a picture, ride a bike, catch some candy, drink from a firehose, or watch the fireworks—it's all good, and its all for you.

FIREFLIES—Please leave them alone. Look at them, but don't catch them. We want the population to grow, and catching them won't help. I'm proposing that we name the new park Firefly Park in honor of these unique and super cool bugs. If you want to see them, head to Heritage Park after sunset but before full dark, walk from the parking lot to the west side of the park by the big willow, and wait. It's awesome.

SEWER UPDATE—The rubber has hit the road in our negotiations with Logan and Hyrum. The best deal we could get with Hyrum was \$12/month more than the best deal I could get with Logan. In either case, our sewer bill is going to go up. At the end of the day, the main sticking points in working with Logan were fairness in billing, fairness in representation, long term security, and whether the project was even necessary. This is how these first three points were addressed in the agreement:

Fairness in billing: We will get charged the exact same rate as Logan residents for the length of the agreement (30 years). They cannot bill us any more than they bill their people.

Fairness in representation: We have a representative on the Rate Setting Committee that determines rates, and Logan cannot unilaterally set the rate. There is a defined process.

Long term security: The agreement runs thirty years, and cannot be modified without the agreement of at least 3 of the participating cities, so Logan can't arbitrarily change the terms.

Project necessity: I've learned a lot over the past 18 months, and the responsibility for the necessity of the project falls squarely on us as the people who have elected our legislature. The Council and I have fought hard to get you the best deal we can, and now that it's done where all the bodies are buried. At a state level, we could sure do better. We complain about the Federal government, but we had the power and the standing as a State to fight back, and the State's failure is what permitted this mess. So we are going to build the plant, but I'm not going to give up. We can't do anything else about the sewer, but I will do everything I can to push for better governance and keep dumb stuff like this from happening in the future.

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The Nibley City Council will meet Thursday, July 9 to appoint a new member to the City Council. The City Council meets at 6:30 p.m. at City Hall. The Planning and Zoning Commission meets the second and fourth Wednesday of each month at 5:30 p.m. All meetings are open to the public. Reminders from Nibley City Staff

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We would like to remind residents that it is against Nibley City ordinance to dump yard debris (weeds, grass clippings, tree limbs, firewood etc.) into any canal. Debris can travel downstream, build up at one of the canal grates, and cause a canal to backup and overflow causing damage to surrounding property.

Nibley City Code §4-1-4 states:

"(A) It shall be unlawful for any person to permit any drainage system, canal, ditch, conduit or other watercourse of any kind or nature, natural or artificial, to become so obstructed as to cause the water to back up and overflow therefrom, or to become unsanitary."

Violating these sections is a class C misdemeanor, punishable by up to ninety (90) days in jail and a \$750 fine, plus \$10 per day for each day the violation is not remedied.

The city has provided two large green waste bins which are available to all citizens for the proper disposal of green waste. You may also order a green waste can for your home, which costs \$4.00 per month.

We are grateful for the efforts the vast majority of you take to properly dispose of debris and keep the canals surrounding your property free from clutter. We hope that you will be diligent in keeping the canals free of debris and helping your neighbors and friends do likewise. —Nibley City Staff

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City Council Election



Nibley City will hold its municipal election this fall to elect three City Council members. The Primary Election will be held on Tuesday, August 11, 2015 with the General Election following on Tuesday,

November 3, 2015.

The following Nibley residents have filed a Declaration of Candidacy and will be included on the Primary Election ballot: Carol Albrecht, Larry Anhder, Larry Jacobsen, Timothy Ramirez, Malia Roundy, Allen Cook and Tom Bernhardt.

City Council Members serve four-year terms and are elected at-large. The incumbents in the seats to be elected are: Larry Jacobsen, Ron Hellstern, and the seat that was vacated by Amber Whittaker.

A Word from Our Council



I was an athlete and coach in High School and at the NCAA level. All of my children participated in High School sports. I say this to let citizens know that I am a fan of recreational sports, but I also know there is much

more to a quality life than playing games.

Nibley residents have consistently expressed their desire to maintain green, open spaces within our city. Honoring those opinions, while providing for diverse interests, is one of the City Council's challenges. Those diverse interests include sports, but also trails and opportunities to enjoy nature in quiet settings. The Parks & Trails Master Plan shows eight soccer fields, four baseball fields, and other properties which could be developed into small game fields. But now we have an opportunity to develop what a USU landscape professor described as a potential regional treasure.

Nibley City, authorized by the City Council, just purchased twenty acres connected to the west side of Heritage Park. This land was part of the original Elk Horn Ranch established around 1855. The large Crack-Willow tree on that land has just been designated as a Utah State Heritage Tree. Eighteen species of birds use that area, a small spring feeds it, and rare fireflies light up the summer nights. Here is a unique property that could serve all of our residents, including senior-citizens and students, with nature trails, shaded benches, and educational signs.

Nibley truly has sites that are diamonds-in-the-rough to be enjoyed by folks of all ages and interests. I encourage you to go outdoors, enjoy a morning or evening walk, and appreciate our community neighborhoods.
