

Mayor Jacobsen's Message



Mayor Larry Jacobsen

Let's do a lightning round on roads, starting on a broad scale with Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT) and moving to local Nibley roads. We have a lot to cover, and this is going to be a high-density article. If you are interested in more details, many of these topics are included in my status reports (see the Mayor's Journal at www.NibleyCity.com).

I have been impressed with UDOT's change in emphasis over the past several years that has shifted from moving cars

to moving people (https://uvision.utah.gov/). This change started with SB 136 during the 2018 Utah Legislative session, which emphasized using transportation to improve Utahns' quality of life. UDOT understands that this quality of life includes active transportation-bicycling and walking-in addition to motorized vehicles. Nibley City attended a recent Move Utah Summit to participate in a panel discussion focused on our experience with the Centers for Disease Control's Virtual Walkability Academy. Speaking in broad terms, Nibley City has played an active role in a planning project to form a collaborative definition of the vision and desired outcomes for US-89/91 from Brigham City to Logan. I am pleased that the top two desired outcomes prioritize safety and the balance of mobility needs with access needs for communities and businesses. This is progress, as previous practice has been to race past Nibley to get to and from our neighbor to the north. On more Nibley-specific plans, we received a \$35k grant from UDOT to help us write our first ever stand-alone Active Transportation plan. We have previously only included active transportation modes in our general Transportation Plan, and I am happy that we understand that this important topic deserves its own plan. After we make progress on the new Parks and Recreation Plan, we will start cranking on the Active Transportation Plan this fall. I look forward to your involvement in both plans.

Moving to more specific projects, UDOT anticipates completing the 3200 South realignment with US-89/91 by November 1. This realignment will close the current 3200 South intersection at the highway and veer 3200 South to the north at a new signalized intersection on US-89/91. This will be a major improvement in safety and access for Nibley residents. Depending on how quickly commercial development happens on the new 2600 South, UDOT has indicated another traffic signal is appropriate at that intersection with US-89/91. 2600 South isn't open to the public because it is not yet a public road that Nibley City owns. Whenever possible, we require developers to build roads so Nibley citizens don't have to pay for them and don't accept ownership of a new road until it is completed, or until financial surety is in place to complete it. We have an agreement with the landowner at 2600 South that could allow us to accept ownership and open the road before it is completed, but the landowner has not yet delivered that financial surety to Nibley City.

Moving east, Nibley is ready to receive construction bids to build additional sections of 1200 West. This current project is funded by a \$3.4M voter-approved local-option sales tax that was awarded on a competitive basis from the Cache Metropolitan Planning Organization (CMPO). The design for 1200 West includes active transportation modes, including separated bicycle lanes and pedestrian trails. This project was slowed down slightly by property acquisition for a roundabout at 2600 South and 1200 West. However, last week we received the Right of Occupancy from the landowner, allowing us to proceed with construction while we finalize the land acquisition price. We will be going back to the CMPO late this summer to request funding for the final phase to connect 1200 West with 1000 West in Logan. Continuing east, Hwy-165 is going to be under construction for a bit while Millville builds their sewer line under this UDOT right-of-way. In addition, Nibley City will continue its protective asphalt-sealing program this summer, affecting travel on some local roads for about one day. Practice shows that applications of asphalt sealing at an appropriate interval greatly increase the life of a road.

I ask you to pay special attention to the section in this newsletter regarding off-highway-vehicle (OHV) use on public roads in Nibley. OHVs are regulated by the Utah Code explained in that article. First, vehicles must be titled and registered with the state. Second, starting on January 1, 2023, all vehicle operators must have an OHV education certificate. There is one certificate for operators under the age of 18 years and a different certificate for operators over 18 years of age. OHVs are never allowed in Nibley parks or on Nibley trails. My last thought is the most important: please be safe as you travel on the roads in, around, and outside of Nibley.

Wow! That was a lot to read and hopefully worth the effort. Roads are important to us all. Please call, text, or write anytime.

GOAL FOR JULY Have the ability to communicate with family members during a disaster.

Today we have more ways to speak with one another than ever before. We are used to staying in touch with cell phones, internet, and email, but disasters can change things. These devices may not be available. Cell phone towers quickly become overloaded with people trying to reach friends and family. If the power is out at your home, cordless phones, internet, and email will not work either.

TASKS—Do at least 1 of the following:

- Have a phone with a cord and a car charger for your cell phone standing by in case of a power failure
- Develop a plan for how your family will stay in touch during a disaster
- Program In Case of Emergency (ICE) numbers into all family cell phones. If you are hurt and can't talk, first responders and hospital staff may not know how to contact your family right away. You can provide the phone numbers for your emergency contacts to first responders and hospital staff in your cell phone.
 - 1. Create a new contact in your cell phone book
 - 2. Name the contact ICE
 - 3. Enter <u>all</u> phone numbers for the person you would like to have notified in a medical emergency.

2023 Road Maintenance in Nibley City

Between July 13–23, Nibley City will seal coat roads in the following areas in Nibley City:

- 4000 south 3850 south 250 east
- 3650 south 100 west (half horseshoe)
- 600 west 450 west/east side of Mt. Visa
- Nibley Park Ave. 2600 south 3410 south

Any homes directly effected by these maintenance projects will receive notification a week prior to the road being treated, which will give further instructions.

Nibley City appreciates your patience regarding scheduled road maintenance. Nibley City follows a maintenance schedule to keep Nibley's road network in tip-top condition, with the intent of avoiding future, costly road replacement costs.



Off-Highway Vehicles (or ATVs) on Public Streets



ments for titling and requirements for registration at https://dmv.utah.gov/vehicles/street-legal-atvs.

Utah also requires all OHV operators to complete the Utah Off-Highway Vehicle Education Course.

"Operators under the age of 18 shall possess a youth OHV education certificate in order to operate an OHV on public land, road or trail. Operators 18 years of age or older may operate an OHV if they possess an approved adult OHV education certificate. The once-inalifetime course should take less than 30 minutes to complete and is now available."

HB180 set forth these education requirements, which began January 1, 2023. Find more information on these new education requirements at https://recreation.utah.gov/off-high-way-vehicles. Nibley City asks that parents and guardians ensure minor children understand necessary traffic laws when operation OHV vehicles on public streets.

Parking & Storing Vehicles



It is safe to say that the majority of Nibley City residents rely on their motor vehicles to get to work, school and services, not to mention for fun adventures. However, it is important to park or store your vehicle in the

appropriate place when it is not being used. Below are some restrictions on parking and storing vehicles in Nibley City Code to be aware of:

- When parking on street, vehicles must be parked at the curb within 12 inches of the curb line. Parking in park strips or on sidewalks is not allowed (NCC 11.02.040(C)(1))
- No parking on the street for longer than 48 consecutive hours (NCC 11.02.040(C)(3))
- No parking vehicles in front yard areas outside of a driveway and unsheltered (NCC 7.02(B)(6))
- Storage of more than 2 inoperable vehicles within public view is not allowed ((NCC 7.02(B)(7))

This past month, Nibley had the unique opportunity to show off our Firefly Park to the Natural History Museum of Utah staff.

The CVWA conducted a "BioBlitz" as part of the Northern Utah Pollinator Week celebration. Here's what we learned on our adventure. Firefly Park is an amazing resource for people to enjoy nature and for insects, birds, and other organisms to thrive. Firefly Park is rich in all things living and that includes us. The people that visit the park truly enjoy being able to walk along a path and see bugs, flowers, and listen to the birds. The diversity of insects, thanks to varied habitats, is amazing. Did you know that we not only have blinking fireflies but we have diurnal (non-blinking) fireflies? Pretty cool!

Monarchs have arrived after their very long journey north. Our pollinator garden provides nectar for the adults and the abundance of milkweed supports their offspring. This is a hard-earned effort by a small group



of volunteers that has built this habitat over a three-year period. Join them Tuesday morning at 8:00 a.m. to continue this rewarding effort.

If you see plants, insects, birds, etc. while you are out and about in Firefly Park, report your observations to iNaturalist. Download the app at https://www.inaturalist.org/. Firefly Park has been set up with their own project link so all of the information for Firefly Park goes to one spot. Join Nibley's Firefly Nature Park Biodiversity on iNaturalist.

Fireworks In Nibley City

In the interest of the health, safety and welfare of Nibley City's residents, all fireworks are prohibited <u>east</u> of SR 165/Main Street in Nibley. These zones have been deemed more prone to dangerous and deadly wildfires during the summer holiday season.

Also, Nibley City Code 13.16.040 states the following:

"Fires and Fireworks: It is unlawful for any person to burn an open fire in a City park, trail, or outdoor recreational facility, except in barbecue, grill or fire pit areas provided by the City. No fireworks shall be allowed within a public park, including parking lots, without a special event permit issued by the City."

Please remember to obey all local laws regarding fireworks and make sure your pets are in a safe, interior room to avoid exposure to fireworks. It's also a good idea for your pets to have up-to-date identification tags in case they run off.


