Stormwater Management



Every year, fourth grade classes from around the Valley are invited to attend the Cache Valley Water Fair. Many communities around the valley, including Nibley City staff, assisted in teaching more than 1,600 fourth-grade students about a variety of water topics. They learned about the water cycle, the Bear River watershed, the importance of riparian habitat, water treatment, and backflow prevention. They also learned

that these topics are critical in protecting one of our most precious resources and that it's everyone's responsibility to do their part. There is minimal treatment of water that gets into the stormwater system, and storm drains are often piped directly to a stream or river. Here are a few ways that you can help:

- Don't wash out paint brushes and cans in the storm drain system.
- Follow instructions on fertilizers and pesticides. Don't allow the fertilizer or pesticide to get onto paved surfaces where stormwater could cause it to run into the storm drain system, and don't apply near open water bodies such as streams and rivers.
- Don't wash equipment or your vehicle on a hard surface that could be washed into the stormwater system.
- Do your best to keep dirt and mud off of streets, where it can be washed into the stormwater system. (continued on page 4)

2017 Notice of Election

Anyone seeking to become a candidate for a municipal office should file a Declaration of Candidacy in person with the Nibley City Recorder or Deputy Recorder at Nibley City Hall, June 1 through June 7, 2017 from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. The appropriate filing form will be available at Nibley City Hall.

Nibley City will hold its municipal election this fall to elect a <u>Mayor</u> and <u>two council members</u>. If a Primary Election is necessary, the Primary Election date is <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>August 15</u>, 2017; the General Election date is <u>Tuesday</u>, November 7, 2017.

The Mayor and City Council members serve four-year terms and are elected at large. Anyone interested in filing for one of these offices must:

- Be a U.S. citizen at time of filing
- Be a registered voter of Nibley City
- Be at least 18 years old
- Be a resident of Nibley City for at least 365 consecutive days immediately preceding the date of election (November 7, 2017)
- Not be a convicted felon

Community Cleanup Day




Are you needing an excuse to dejunk your garage or get rid of that old lawn chair? Does your car need it's home back? If so, mark your calendars because on **June 10**, Nibley City will have dumpsters on hand

to accept items that would be better off at the Logan Landfill. The dumpsters will be located at Elkhorn Park (750 West 2600 South) and Anhder Park (294 West 3200 South). You drop it in the dumpster and the City will take it to the landfill. This was a great success last year and the dumpsters filled up fast, so don't procrastinate. Heritage Park will also have a DI pod for more useful items that should be donated.

Green waste and cardboard should be disposed of at the Nibley Recycle Site (3390 South 1200 West). There are several items that will not be allowed in the dumpsters, but most of those items can be taken to the landfill for free or dropped off the following Saturday at a special collection event.

Tree Board & Wildlife Association



Nibley residents are starting to see Orioles, Goldfinches, Hummingbirds, Grosbeaks, Lazuli Buntings, Towhees, White-Crowned Sparrows, House Finches, Song Sparrows, Chickadees, House Wrens, Robins, Flickers, Woodpeckers, Turkeys, Pheasants and even Gamble's Quails. Why

such diversity? Food. Nibley's Ron Hellstern says blackoil sunflower is a favorite for seed-eaters, but a mix of wheat, millet and other seeds are also eaten. He also puts out all-season suet. Hummers like sugar water at a 1 to 4 ratio (no food coloring), and nearly all birds like berries, oranges, grape jelly . . . and don't forget water.

Make a plan to improve your habitat for wildlife. Plant trees now while it is still cool, or wait until Fall. Your property value will rise and you'll benefit from the shade and wind protection. Also, don't forget milkweed for the beautiful Monarch butterflies. Remember to search for native plants and avoid those that are for Zones 6 and higher or that have unusual names like Razzamatazz. These plants usually produce zero nectar for pollinators.

Bear River Celebration & Free Fishing Day

Family activities, free fishing, and fun are the highlights of the award winning 16th annual Bear River Celebration and Free Fishing Day. On Saturday June 10, 2017, children, teens and their families are invited to Logan's Willow Park West Skylar Pond (500 West 700 South in Logan) from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. to learn about water, conservation, water quality, wildlife, recycling, and the Bear River Watershed. Enjoy free fishing, educational booths, and activities such as fly tying, fish printing, face painting, and other hands-on activities. 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Power Outage & Emergency Safety

Parts of Cache County recently experienced an electrical power outage that lasted for up to 22 hours. During the outage, many residents relied on portable generators to provide back-up electricity. Nibley City encourages you to consider the fol-

lowing when using a portable generator for your needs: *Hazards Associated with Generators*

- Shocks and electrocution from improper use of power or accidentally energizing other electrical systems.
 - Carbon monoxide from a generator's exhaust.
- Fires from improperly refueling a generator or inappropriately storing the fuel for a generator.
 - Noise and vibration hazards.

Precautions to ensure safety during a power outage or electrical emergency

- Assemble a preparedness kit to help in the event of any kind of emergency, including items such as a flashlight, non-perishable foods, manual can opener, bottled water, blankets, battery-operated radio and clock, extra batteries, and a battery-powered cell phone charger.
- Have a back-up system and plan of action for an emergency if someone in your home is on life support.

Don't overload your generator

- Determine the amount of power you will need to operate those things you plan to connect to the generator.
- Light bulb wattage indicates the power needed for lighting.
- Appliance and equipment labels indicate their power requirements.
- If you can't determine the amount of power you will need, ask an electrician.
- Make sure your generator produces more power than will be drawn by the things you connect to the generator, including the initial surge when it is turned on. If your generator does not produce enough power to operate everything at once, stagger the use of your equipment.
- If your equipment draws more power than the generator can produce, you may blow a fuse on the generator or damage the connected equipment.

Use your generator safely

• Incorrect generator use can lead to carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning from the toxic engine exhaust, electric shock or electrocution and fire. Follow the directions supplied with the generator.

Never use a portable generator indoors

• Never use a generator in a house, garage, carport, basement, crawl space or other enclosed or partially-enclosed keep our water clean.

area, even with ventilation. Opening doors and windows or using fans will not prevent CO buildup in the home.

- If you start to feel sick, dizzy, or weak while using a generator, get to fresh air right away do not delay!
- Install home carbon monoxide alarms that are battery-operated or have a battery back-up. Test batteries frequently and replace when needed.

Using your generator outdoors

- Place the generator away from windows, doors, and vents that could allow carbon monoxide to come indoors.
- Generators should be at least 20 feet away from buildings. Even 20 feet away, air flow patterns could still blow carbon monoxide into homes through attic vents, windows, or doors, so it's very important to have a working carbon monoxide detector inside the home.
- To avoid electrocution, keep the generator dry. Do not use in rain or wet conditions. Operate it on a dry surface under an open canopy-like structure. Make sure your hands are dry before touching the generator.

Connect your generator correctly

- Plug appliances directly into the generator, or use a heavy duty, outdoor-rated extension cord that is rated (in watts or amps) at least equal to the sum of the connected appliance loads.
- Never try to power house wiring by plugging the generator into a wall outlet, a practice known as "back feeding." It can lead to the electrocution of utility workers or neighbors served by the same utility transformer.
- The only safe way to connect a generator to house wiring is to have a qualified electrician install a power transfer switch.

The safest way to get emergency power

• Permanently installed stationary generators are the best way to provide backup power during a power outage.

• Don't blow grass clippings into the street or gutter where they can be washed into a storm drain.

When it comes to Stormwater, Nibley City must follow a long list of State and Federal requirements and has developed a Stormwater Management Plan to address those requirements.
