Mayor Jacobsen's Message



What makes Nibley unique? What are the things that make us proud to live in Nibley? I suggest that our parks, recreation programs, and open spaces belong on this list. Nibley City exists, in part, because we desire important places for our community to gather and to recreate, and it is unlikely that we could satisfy that desire as individuals. A recent Nibley citizen survey conducted by Utah State University showed how important our parks and open spaces are to us.

The survey indicated that in the past year, 83 percent of the respondents recreated in our city parks. In addition, 85 percent said they enjoyed birds and wildlife in their yards and nearby neighborhoods. The survey showed that city parks and trails have an overwhelming positive influence on our wellbeing. Certainly, we value our parks, recreation programs, and open spaces.

Something of value is worthy of serious planning efforts to ensure that we protect and enhance that value. This is especially true for parks and open spaces because the land in and around Nibley is a limited resource. If we don't consider how to use that land wisely, and how to include parks and open spaces in that consideration, then we will lose that limited resource. A small and seemingly insignificant item in this year's draft city budget appears in "Capital Project Expenditures." This line commits \$40,000 to review and rewrite our Parks, Recreation, and Open Space Master Plan. Despite this task's relatively small footprint in the budget, it is one of the most important things we will do next year. Nibley's Parks and Recreation Advisory Committee, the Planning Commission, the City Council, and especially the citizens of Nibley have an opportunity to plan what our parks and open spaces will be five, ten, and twenty years from now.

We need soccer, softball, baseball, and flag football fields for our kids to play on. We have a young population, with forty percent of Nibley's population under the age of 18. Participation in Nibley youth sports programs grew by a factor of 4.8 from 2016 to 2022. That's a compounded increase of 30 percent per year when our total population grew at less than two percent each year. Our recreation program and staff, led by Chad Wright, is truly amazing. Larry Jacobsen was born on August 14, 1938 in Montpelier, Idaho. He grew up there and went to Montpelier High School. He married his high school sweetheart and together they took off for Logan, Utah where Larry began attending Utah State University.

When Larry graduated from college, he began a teaching career at the old Woodruff Elementary by the present Logan High School. He also began to supplement his income by umpiring soft ball and baseball and reffing basketball and volleyball. Through this, Larry discovered the demand for sports officials, and someone who could organize and assign official to games, existed throughout the valley. Larry had a talent for this, so he started his own company—Cache Valley Officials. He assigned most of the officials for the northern part of Utah. He also umpired two national tournaments.

During this time Larry packed up his family and moved to New York City where he earned a master's degree in Education from NYU. Larry's biggest hobby was sports until he retired. Larry has lived in Nibley UT for over 45 years. His most cherished accomplishment was being able to work with the youth and adults of the Nibley and Logan City area and help provide fun and wholesome activities for the community to participate in.

GOAL FOR JUNE Be aware of and prepare for your family's unique needs.

Every household is different. Is there an infant or young child in your home? Does someone in your family have a medical condition that requires medication? Do you have a pet? Before disaster strikes, talk to your family about your household's unique needs. Make a list of special items you may need in a disaster.

TASKS—Do at least 1 of the following:

- Talk with family members to identify your household's unique needs.
- Make a plan to make sure pets are taken care of in a disaster. Disaster may happen while you are away from home. Your neighborhood may be evacuated, or you could be trapped somewhere else and unable to get home. Consider asking a trusted neighbor to check on your pets if you can't get home or to take your pets with them if an evacuation is ordered while you are not home because of a disaster or emergency. Make sure they are comfortable with your pet, and that they know where to find your pet supplies.
- If you or someone in your household has a disability, create an evacuation plan that works for them.

National Pollinator week is June 19–24. Northern Utah Pollinator Week is a national event that celebrates all things pollinator. A consortium of organizations has teamed up to present a buzzworthy week of events.

During the week, events will be dedicated to:

- Trees-Pollinator trees and the habitat they provide.
- Bees-Care, keeping, and identification of bees.
- Native Plants-Identification, how to incorporate them into your landscape plan, and why they are so important in our pollinators.
- Integrated Pest Management–Learn about how our native insects interact in our landscapes; understand the effects of pesticides on our pollinator populations and how you can minimize the impacts.
- Nocturnal Adventures—Learn about bats and pollinator activity at night.
- Local Nature Parks-Volunteer at your local nature park with us.
- How to Build a Pollinator Habitat-Learn how to build a pollinator habitat in your own backyard.

Pollinator BIOBLITZ at Firefly Park

Join the Natural History Museum of Utah and the Utah Rare Insect Conservation Project on Friday, June 23, from 5:00 to 9:00 p.m. to BioBlitz pollinators at Firefly Park (2360 S 1000 W) in celebration of the Northern Utah Pollinator Week 2023. This BioBlitz is a drop-in format, so join in when you can.

Participants will look for, photograph, and make iNaturalist observations of pollinators. Your iNaturalist observations will become important data points that inform managers and scientists about the biodiversity of species living in Firefly Park. New to iNaturalist? Experts, Ellen and Amanda, will help you get started. They will also guide in collection techniques and species identification.

Keeping Nibley Beautiful

It's been a cool spring, which means weeds have had plenty of opportunity to grow and flourish just like our seasonal flowers. Like most other things, "with the good comes the bad" and while we love the flowers, the weeds are considered a nuisance. You are required to control the weeds on your property (refer to Nibley City code 7.04). Cache County enforces our weed ordinance and has been diligently notifying residents when weed control has been neglected. If you have a weed issue to report, please go to www.cachecounty.org/vegetationmanagement and click on "Report a Noxious Weed." Please keep those pesky weeds in check.

Additionally, if you happen to have a canal on or near your property, please remember it is also a violation of Nibley City code to dump yard debris in a canal or other open waterway. (refer to Nibley City code 19.24.230-T.) Dumping debris into a waterway can cause a waterway to back up and may cause flooding and/or property damage.

Keeping Nibley Safe

School's out now and kids are out and about later in the evenings. If a streetlight in your neighborhood is not working properly, please start by contacting Rocky Mountain Power directly at www.rockymountainpower.net. Select the State where the light is located and then click on the "Report Outage" button right on their homepage. Then, if the light is not fixed in a timely matter, call Nibley City and provide the location of the malfunctioning light. Nibley City appreciates your assistance in keeping Nibley appropriately lit and safe for all residents.

Door-to-Door Solicitors

Spring often brings an influx of door-to-door solicitors. Nibley City ordinances requires every person soliciting any service within the city to have a license and qualify to be a "Licensed Solicitor." The solicitors are instructed to wear their license issued by Nibley in a visible location.

Cleaning Your Car and Driveway

Dirty water containing soaps, detergents, gasoline, rust, rubber, and motor oils can wash off cars and flow directly to storm drains and into the nearest creek or stream where it can harm water quality and wild life.

What Can You Do to Help?—Minimize the environmental effects of washing your car by using a commercial carwash. They are required to treat their wash water discharge before releasing it to the sanitary sewer system.

Also, be sure to sweep driveways, patios, and sidewalks rather than hosing them down into the storm drains. Put lawn clippings in a compost pile or garbage can.

new Parks, Recreation, and Open Space Plan must build on this success.

As if the demand for playing fields wasn't enough, we must also consider another requisite for Nibley's parks and open spaces. Our citizens have shown their desire to connect with nature by having access to enhanced natural areas in our city. Our Firefly Nature Park is a great example of an enhanced natural area, and it is a shining gem in Cache Valley. A new park currently in design within the Ridgeline Park project-with its trails, natural water features, non-programmed amenities, and enhanced natural gathering spaces-will make us proud. There are lots of areas in Nibley that are too wet for traditional construction, and the city has gained, and will continue to gain, ownership of those areas through open-space agreements with developers. Our new parks plan must consider the importance of these enhanced natural areas and include a strategy to manage these areas.

The desire for parks and open spaces is there, along with Nibley's unique identity established by those parks and open spaces. Our discussion on these amenities must include a plan to pay for them, and that discussion must include you, Nibley's citizens. The process that adopts the budget and adopts the new parks plan ensures that our dreams are founded on reality. Many of the costs for parks and open spaces are generated through Nibley's General Fund, and the General Fund is largely financed by property tax and local sales tax. In addition, Nibley City has put increased effort into securing grants for our parks and open spaces. Our "Grants" page shows that those efforts are paying off. Park-related grants received last year, plus grants expected this year, exceed \$2.8 million. Many thanks to the efforts of city staff over many years that have led to this success to help fund our parks. Another source of funding is the Park Impact Fee, with anticipated revenue of about \$500,000 next year. The City Council recently adopted an increased Park Impact Fee that is twice the previous fee to ensure that new homes built in Nibley will not dilute the level of service enjoyed by our current residents.

Our upcoming work on the Parks Master Plan will allow us to dream big. How do we feel about an indoor recreation center? Are there public-private partnerships for us to consider? And of course, what mechanisms should we consider to pay for these dreams? Nibley's parks, recreation programs, and open spaces define our community. I look forward to hearing from you as we write a new plan for those items. Please look for the first opportunity to be a part of this important planning process at Family Festivities on June 17, during Heritage Days.

Nerf Tag Summer Camp—Keep kids busy and active this summer with a Nerf tag summer camp at Elkhorn Park. Hourlong sessions include traditional Nerf tag,

a tactical obstacle course, team-building activities, and dedicated coaches. Camps will be every Thursday in July and participant must be 7 years old by July 6 to register. Flag Football—Registration opens Football June 14 and if you sign up early you get the early bird discount!



This program is available to players from 1st-9th grade and has grown significantly over the years. The season starts in early September and wraps up the middle of October, so players that want to play both Fall soccer and Flag football will not have any game day overlaps.
