Thoughts From Our Mayor

Hi Nibley,

I sure enjoyed our preview of spring in February this year. Hopefully everyone's trees don't freeze and your lawns and gardens don't get too confused with the early warmth.

Last night, we were talking to our kids about how getting big things done is really just a series of small things that add up. Every journey begins with a single step, right?

I told you last month about replacing the engine in my daughter's car. It took me back to my mechanic days as a BYU student. I used to service the University vehicles, and like clockwork, every 6 months we had to work on the Chicken Truck. We called it that because its only job was down at the University chicken farm. Nibley City Tree Board

Our City Tree Management Plan is being written now with the assistance of Branch to Bud professional arborists. They are evaluating the condition of hundreds of our trees and proposing appropriate methods of care. This plan will make us eligible for funding to replace damaged/dead trees and enable us to maintain our Tree City USA status. Tree removal continues along the South side of 3200 South to prevent the eventual fall of hazardous dead or dying cottonwood trees.

The Tree Board holds open meetings at Nibley City Hall the first Wednesday each month at 6:30 p.m.
