When it Rains it Pours

My family had a sad experience this last month. We learned about loss and lessons learned, so if you're not up for that, just know, that I learned something about not putting off till tomorrow what needs to be done today, and turn the page. If not, read on.

We have goats. I've had lots of pets in my life, but through a strange sequence of events that started with a family background in running sheep in Garden City, finding out that

cows, cats, dogs, and rabbits are amazingly fragile, and hating sheep, I've found that my favorite pets are the goats we'd had over the years.

One of the reasons I didn't run for City Council again after my first term was that I wanted a bigger piece of property so we could get some stock and we couldn't find it in Nibley. I wanted my kids to be able to have the same relationships, responsibilities and opportunities with animals that I had. We had great neighbors like Dennis and Dianna who let us keep 4-H animals with them but it's not the same thing as looking out the back window and watching goat kids and human kids jumping around like nuts in the back pasture.

Eventually we found a home here in town. One of the great things about the property was that it came with a well and water rights (Side note: If you have a well but no water rights, you need to get right with the state, purchase the rights, and transfer them to your property—water rights are serious business, and taking water without the right is against the law). I built goat worthy fences, and we got some animals.

My favorite goat was Harry. Harry grew up with our son Luke, and was, next to my kids, my favorite pet. She just liked people. I'd look out and watch her following the kids around the yard, feeding her banana peels, or being a pillow while Luke laid on her to read a book out in the pasture. It might not seem like a big deal to anyone else but she just fit with us.

We had some trouble with the well a couple of years back so we put in another one. I put a plastic cover on it, and had every intention of putting something permanent on. Every time I went out to feed or work out there, I would look at it and think "It looks OK. I'll handle it tomorrow". About three weeks ago, Lincoln went out to feed and he couldn't find Harry. We found her in the bottom of the well. It was usually a couple of feet above the ground, but with all the snow, I figure that the snow level had come up enough that she must have backed into it and broken through the cover. By the time we got to her she was gone. Bout broke my heart to face my kids and know that I could have prevented this.

Nothing lasts forever; pets, homes, people–everything goes away eventually, and I know that. I know that I can't fix everything or control everything. There are things that happen that we can't anticipate or predict. That's life and that's okay. Regret doesn't come from the stuff that happens that you didn't see coming. It comes from the stuff that you saw coming and didn't do anything about.

I learned this month that I choose regret when I chose to put off doing something that I knew needed to be done. Don't choose regret—if there is a problem, stop and fix it. Stop and visit the neighbor. Stop and hug the kid. Just stop and take a minute away from yourself and how busy you are and remember that all of us are part of a larger community and system. All of us depend on each other, and there are things that we know we need to do. So let's just do them and live without regret.

This past month, when all the snow melted, we got an inch of rain, and we flooded. My heart goes out to the people who have been impacted by this, and my respect goes out to all those who pitched in to help each other. We learned a lot about our systems and our city, and we learned that there are things that we can and should do to make things better for the future. I don't regret the storms and I don't regret the thaw. I don't regret the hard work. But if we don't learn from this and make the changes in our processes and infrastructure that we've learned are necessary, then I will regret that we've missed the opportunity to learn and to improve and to make sure that when this happens again, it doesn't hurt as bad.

This hasn't been fun, not for the public works guys that have been providing 24 hour coverage for the past several weeks to ensure that water is moving as efficiently as it can, not for staff who have been handling logistics and keeping all of us informed, and not for the people who have been taking care of themselves and each other. On the bright side, I understand that this event was a once in a century occurrence, so at least we can tell stories about it.

Can the City Public Works Help Me with My Property?

One last thing. There was some question about what the City's responsibility is in an emergency like this. The City is responsible for public infrastructure. That means that when it floods, the public works department's job is to keep the pipes, ditches, streets, and ponds open and functioning correctly. They are not responsible for work on private property or for private individuals. This may be an issue when the Blacksmith Fork begins to rise later this spring. Their job in that case will be to protect the roads, bridges, and other infrastructure that serve the community. We will stage sand and sand bags but the protection of private property is the responsibility of the homeowner. If you live by the river, a stream, or a ditch, please have a plan and be prepared. There is still a lot of water in the mountains, and it will come down.

This is a great place to live because you are great people. Thank you for your trust and your confidence, and thank you for your continued support of your City public works and other staff as we've worked through this. I'm honored to represent you.

Tree Board & Wildlife Association



The Cache Valley Wildlife Association's 4th Annual Birdhouse Building contest is underway. March 24 is the last day to turn in your birdhouses. Birds help control insect populations,

act as pollinators, are agents of seed dispersal, and are beautiful to look at and listen to. It's been a rough winter for birds, so birdhouses and feeders will help them have a successful year. It's also a good time to decide where to plant new trees in your yard. Trees increase your property value, produce welcome shade during summer heat, and provide shelter for a variety of wildlife.



March 20 is the Spring Vernal Equinox (when day and night are about equal length). As you plan to improve and expand your landscaping please consider using na-

tive, fertile flowers and shrubs. Many box-stores sell plants that do not thrive in our Zone 4 climate, or their flowers are sterile and are no good to vital pollinators. Consider planting milkweed in your flower gardens this year. Despite that the name says "weed", it will not spread everywhere. In fact, it's difficult to grow but is the only plant Monarch butterflies require for their life cycle. The western monarchs are experiencing a serious population decline. If steps are not taken to provide pesticide-free milkweed and nectar plants, we may see this beautiful butterfly disappear.

Reminders from Nibley City Staff

Stormwater Reminder

Stormwater is runoff form rain and snow storms. A system of gutters, ditches, and storm drains collect this runoff from our yards, rooftops, streets, parking lots, and other land surfaces. This collection of water then discharges into our natural waterways.

During last month's "melt" many of our residents had sump pumps running 24/7. As residents worked to pump this water from their homes, it was apparent that much of the water was being dumped into the City's sewer system. Nibley City pays for every gallon of water that is sent through the sewer system to Logan, but more importantly, the system can become overwhelmed, which would result in raw sewage backing up into our homes—YUCK! This happened in Wellsville. Please use hoses or other methods to divert floodwaters into streets and stormwater systems rather than floor drains, sinks, tubs or manholes.

Canals

It is a violation of Nibley City ordinance (Nibley City Code 4-1-4A.) to dump debris into any canal or waterway. Debris can travel downstream, build up at one of the canal grates, and cause a canal to backup and overflow causing damage to surrounding properties. It's important that we keep that water flowing. As spring approaches, be sure to utilize Nibley's recycling bins for yard debris (3390 South 1200 West). It is also important to not place structures or anything along the canals that would make it difficult for canal staff to conduct canal maintenance.

UDOT Click N' Fix

UDOT maintenance employees take care of nearly 6,000 miles of highway around Utah, including the state highways on each side of Nibley, US 89/19 and SR 165/Main Street. You can help them find and fix problem areas by keeping an eye out and letting them know about it. UDOT has implemented a new iPhone and Android app called *UDOT Click 'n Fix* which allows anyone to report an issue by dropping a pin on a map at the location of the problem.
