Thoughts From Mayor Dustin



Get ready for the rain. Two years ago, Nibley flooded. We live in a beautiful spot but if you are not aware, when you moved to Nibley, you moved to the low spot in the valley. When the snow melts, the water flows downhill and that's where Nibley sits.

We learned a lot about our systems and our city in the last flood. There are things that we can and should do to make things better for the future. So here is what you need to know.

The question always seems to come up about what the City's responsibility is in an emergency like this. The City is responsible for public infrastructure. That means that when it floods the public works department's job is to keep the pipes, ditches, streets, and ponds, that belong to the City, open and functioning correctly. They will not work on private property or for private individuals but they will work to keep public infrastructure open so that there is a place for your water to go. There are three principle types of flooding that happen in Nibley. The most obvious one is along the Blacksmith Fork River. When the river comes up, people living on the banks and near canals fed by the river need to be prepared for overtopping. The City does not remove debris or otherwise work in the river or the canals. The City only builds flood barriers to protect lives and public property. If you are concerned about your private property, take the time for an assessment, and make sure that you are prepared.

The second type of flooding is water that collects and flows along the surface of the ground. This can happen anywhere in Nibley, but it's especially a problem in the flat areas west of highway 165. This water comes into your house through windows, doors, and window wells. Your best defense against this type of flooding is to make sure that water can flow away from your home. If you have a walkout basement or window wells, don't let water or snow collect around them.

The last type of flooding threat is groundwater. When surface water goes away, a lot of it goes into the ground. That means that water can actually rise up and get into your house from below. Your best bet here is to have a sump and a sump pump.

Whatever you do, <u>do not</u> pump water into your house drains. These drains include toilets, tubs, showers and sinks, which all go into the regular sewer system. If the sewer backs up and fails because it has too much water in it, then all the toilet water, food garbage, and whatever else we flush might reappear. I think we can all agree that this is far worse for your home than the relatively clean groundwater.

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Kindergarten Registration

Cache Valley Wildlife Association



The Cache Valley Wildlife Association (CVWA) will hold its first meeting of the year on Tuesday, May 12, at 7:00 p.m. CVWA meetings are open to the public and membership to the group is free. The goal of the CVWA is to promote the development and maintenance of wildlife habitat in our home

and city landscapes. The CVWA will discuss activities for the summer and fall, such as providing a booth at Nibley Heritage Days, assisting in the Mariposa Festival (more details on this fun event will be coming next month), and hosting a fall seed/plant exchange, at their May meeting.

In Cache Valley the month of March can be a bit confusing. We enjoy rain, snow, and sunshine. Plants, especially spring bulbs, begin to emerge. Sometimes, the plants are just as confused as we are by the extreme temperature changes. Surely, however, March brings with it a hint that our beautiful valley and mountains will soon be bursting with flowers, grasses, shrubs, and trees.

Many plants, trees and shrubs start to form buds in March. These buds are the beginning of what will create new growth and provide nectar, fruit, shade, nesting sites, and shelter for our wildlife species. Pollinators and birds thrive in "treed" environments. Now is a great time to purchase and plant bare root woody plants. The extra moisture in the ground and from precipitation will give newly planted trees and shrubs a head start on the summer. For an inexpensive source to purchase bare root plants, check out the annual bare root sale put on by the local Conservation Districts. Order forms and information are located at www.uacd.org. The deadline to order is March 25.

March is the perfect time to prune back the woody branches of existing trees and shrubs, before leaves appear. The internet has a lot of information on pruning, specific to the various trees and shrubs that you may have in your yard.

The USU Extension (www.extension.usu.edu) is a good resource on just about anything garden related. The Extension will be hosting a free, hands-on workshop on the proper practices behind pruning fruit trees and ornamental plants at the following locations and

Planning Our City

March will once again be a busy month for the Planning Commission and City Council as they review new developments and updates to Nibley City Code.

The Nibley City Planning Commission make recommendations to the Nibley City Council. This month they are considering recommendations of the following updates and changes to Nibley City Code:

- Commercial Standards and Zoning Update
- A proposal to change Nibley City Code to allow homeowners to have detached apartments/guest homes on their property.

The acronym R-PUD stands for Residential Planned Unit Development. In order to build using R-PUD standards, a developer must first be granted a Residential Planned Unit Overlay zone. The City Council has designated six-areas (*Nibley City Code 19.32*) in Nibley City were a developer can ask for an R-PUD overlay zone. If the R-PUD overlay zone is approved by the City Council then a developer can apply for a plat using R-PUD development standards. These standards include the development of single-family housing, townhomes, and open space.

The City Council and Planning Commission will consider the following land use applications in March:

- A R-PUD (Residential Planned Unit Development) Zone of twenty acres west of Firefly Park.
- A R-PUD Zone for 76 acres east of City Hall, and north of 3200 S.
- A Residential Planned Unit Overlay Zone for 54.6 acres south of 3200 S at 1000 W.

Reminders from Nibley City Staff

Sump Pumps



Nibley City prohibits sump pumps from being connected to the City's sewer system. Nibley City Code 15.04.040 states:

Sanitary And Building Sewers And Connections

J. Surface Runoff Or Ground Water: No person shall make connection of roof downspouts, foundation drains, field drains, or other sources of surface runoff or ground water, to

a building sewer or building drain which in turn is connected directly or indirectly to a public sanitary sewer.

Nibley City needs your help to minimize sump pump water from being discharged into the City's sewer system, especially during the spring run-off. Unfortunately, *illegal* discharge into the sewer can result in the sewer system operating at maximum capacity and could cause sewage to back-up into your home. Nibley City also has to pay Logan City for every gallon of wastewater we sent them for treatment. A sump pump could cost the city thousands in extra treatment charges.

Garbage and Recycle Pickup

Please space your trash and recycle can(s) at least 4 feet apart. This helps prevent trucks flipping over the cans. It is much safer for you and for the Logan Environmental operator. Is is especially helpful in winter when it is more difficult to line the trash truck up withe refuse cans. To watch a video with more information go to https://youtu.be/u2ho6QG1tC8.
