Mayor Jacobsen's Message



This month's newsletter topic—water—is a great one. The need for water is an excellent example of why we have cities at all: to provide services to citizens that they cannot easily provide for themselves.

Here is a bit of history about water in Nibley. In 1933, a private enterprise called the Millville Public Works Company applied for a loan from the Federal Public Works Ad-

ministration (PWA) to replace failing redwood pipe that delivered water from Yeates spring, a water source still owned by Nibley City. Because the PWA would not loan money to a private company, a mass meeting in 1935 adopted a motion to "incorporate so as to be eligible to take over the water works and get the government grant." You can find more about Nibley's story at *http://nibleycity.com/index.php/about-us/city-history*. If it weren't for the need for water, there might not be a Nibley City.

We have been incredibly blessed with water in Cache Valley and certainly blessed in Nibley City. The water available to us in Nibley collects in the surrounding mountains during the winter and is stored by natural soil percolation. This process makes water that fell as winter snow available for our use throughout the year. As evidence of this impressive collection and natural storage capacity, our annual precipitation in Nibley averages around 18 inches per year, and turf grass in the summer can use 2 inches of water in a single week. Being incredibly blessed doesn't mean that we have too much (except during very big snow years with abnormal spring runoffs). Previous good planning from city staff and Councils, have well prepared us for low water years by developing water sources in advance of demand. Good planning kept Nibley from having to restrict water use during recent summers like some communities around us, at least so far.

Although we are blessed with water, we are in an historic drought. In the past year, the Great Salt Lake shrank to a level below any ever recorded since the pioneers came to Utah. A study measuring tree rings from the past 2000 years shows our last 20 years in the western US to be the driest since 800 AD. Nibley's blessing of water in the context of the current drought presents a conundrum. Economies of scale mean that the more water we provide to our citizens, the less expensive it is on a per gallon basis. Despite that, I hope to encourage water conservation and for Nibley City to take an active role leading that conservation process. Even if we have adequate water supply now, new water sources – when they are needed – are expensive to develop, and I believe water conservation is our obligation to future generations. Please watch for coming water conservation opportunities promoted by Nibley City.

The water supply in Nibley is driven by weather and climate, and the only thing more interesting than talking about the weather is measuring it (I'm

a recovering environmental instrumentation engineer). If you want to see measurements of the weather parameters that affect Nibley's water supply and water demand, I will put several links in the Mayor's Journal under the month of March. Scroll down a bit at *www.nibleycity.com* to find the journal. Those links show real-time measurements from the weather station on Hwy 165 near Ridgeline High School, the amount of water in the current snowpack when compared to historical norms, and the flow levels of the Blacksmith Fork River.

Buster Backflow

What is backflow? Backflow is the undesirable reversal of flow of fluids, chemicals, or any other foreign material into the public drinking water system. There are two forms of backflow-backsiphonage (usually caused by a loss of pressure in the drinking water system) and backpresssure

(caused by pumps, piping systems elevation, or thermal expansion from a heat source). Backflow can cause our drinking water to become polluted or contaminated.

Can backflow be prevented? Backflow can be prevented by a backflow prevention assembly between the physical connection (cross-connection) between the water supply and any source of possible pollution or contamination.

Residents with a secondary water system should have a backflow prevention system in place and are required to have them tested annually. Nibley City will be coordinating with residents and water system representatives to ensure Nibley City's drinking is kept clean and safe.





Niblettes in the News

Vellys Nelson will turn 90-years young on March 10. Vellys has been a Nibley resident for almost 70 years. She was born and raised in Odgen Utah. She is the second of 5 children. Growing up, she always liked to be with her dad out in the fields. She especially liked to drive the big black team of horses.

With her love of loves horses, Vellys would go on to compete in an array of contests and became the rodeo queen for Ogden's Pioneer days. Rodeo queening has since been passed down to her daughters, granddaughters and great-granddaughters. Vellys also loved to play the violin and was in the Ogden high school orchestra and performed in the Ogden Tabernacle Christmas program with the Utah Symphony Orchestra.

After Vellys graduated from high school, she married Jay Nelson and in 1955 they moved to the beautiful Cache Valley where Jay would continue to commute to work at Hill Airforce base. Jay and Vellys started their family and also started a little dairy farm along 800 West. Once their 6 kids were all out of the house, they sold the dairy cows in 1986. Vellys then worked part time at the USU Caine Dairy for another 10 years.

After Jay retired he ran for mayor of Nibley City. While Jay was Mayor, Vellys served as President of the Utah League of Cities and Towns Auxiliary, President of the former Mayors of Cache Valley group, was the first woman to be on the Board of Directors of the Dairy Herd Improvement Association, and later served on the *History* of Nibley book committee which was published in 2005.

An open house to celebrate Vellys' 90th birthday will be held at the Nibley City Building on March 12 at 455 West 3200 South from **3:00-5:00 p.m.**

Reminders from Nibley City Staff

Sump Pumps

Nibley City prohibits sump pumps from being connected to the City's sewer system. Nibley City Code 15.04.040 states:

Sanitary And Building Sew<mark>ers An</mark>d Connections

J. Surface Runoff Or Ground Water: No person shall make connection of roof downspouts, foundation drains, field

drains, or other sources of surface runoff or ground water, to a building sewer or building drain which in turn is connected directly or indirectly to a public sanitary sewer.

Nibley City needs your help to minimize sump pump water from being discharged into the City's sewer system, especially during the spring run-off. Unfortunately, *illegal* discharge into the sewer can result in the sewer system operating at maximum capacity and could cause sewage to back-up into your home. Nibley City also has to pay Logan City for every gallon of wastewater we send them for treatment. A sump pump could cost the city thousands in extra treatment charges.

Nibley might seem far away from Antelope Island and Ogden Bay, but did you know that the water flowing in Blacksmith Fork is connected to the Great Salt Lake? Cache Valley is part of the Bear River watershed and our wetlands and streams in the valley are connected to the Bear River. A watershed is the land area that drains into a water feature, such as a river or lake, and our watershed is huge. Bear River watershed is 4.5 million acres and spans three states: Utah, Idaho, and Wyoming.

Bear River is the most important freshwater input into the Great Salt Lake ecosystem, as it provides up to 60% of the freshwater into the lake.

Why is this important? Great Salt Lake (GSL) is a terminal lake, meaning the water has no exit to a sea and the water evaporates. It has been shrinking over the last 30 years due to periods of drought and human diversion of nearby freshwater rivers. This impacts more than just the GSL ecosystem. Brine shrimp is a major industry tied to the lake, as well as outdoor recreation including skiing. Lake effect snow will decline as the GSL water level lowers and could shorten the ski season by seven weeks. To make matters worse, if more of the lakebed is exposed and dried, it will become a human health hazard from winds blowing lakebed dust into communities, carrying high levels of arsenic and other hazardous material into the air we breathe.

We are all connected to something greater and you can help preserve our watershed by conserving water and keeping our streams and wetlands clean. Go to https://river-runner.samlearner.com and follow the path a raindrop can take. Zoom into Cache Valley, click anywhere on the map, and get a birds-eye view of where the water goes.
