

Mayor Jacobsen's Message



Nibley . . . a river runs through it. Water runs deep in our history. In 1935 Nibley came to be from the desire to borrow money from the Federal government to replace aging redwood pipe that carried water from the Yeates Spring (still owned by the city) to the residents of a brand-new town. Cache Valley was originally called Willow Valley by the fur

Mayor Larry Jacobsen trappers because so much ground water made it easy for willow trees to thrive. According to AJ Simmons, a local historian, those same trappers stored (or cached) blacksmith tools in the banks of a river that runs through the present-day Nibley when a scheduled rendezvous was postponed. As a result, a river and a valley were tagged with names that still survive today.



Water is as important today as it was in the past. Cache Valley is incredibly blessed with water. The snow that falls in the mountains in the winter provides a reliable source of water throughout the year–with some years being more reliable than others. The chart above shows the flow rates for the Blacksmith Fork measured by the US Geological Survey at a gaging station above Nibley. The yellow line is the usual flow rate throughout the year calculated from the past 103 years, and the blue is the measured flow rate for the past five years.

We could use a good snow year, and by golly, we are on track for it. Have a look at the graph below. The blue line shows that we have already

line shows that we have already achieved the amount of water in the snowpack at Bug Lake (a location east of Nibley at an 8000-foot elevation) that is the usual historic peak (the red line). We still have a month to accumulate more water in the mountains. This year by itself won't get us out of the drought, but I am grateful to see the snow.

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Nibley Children's Theatre!

Bare Root Tree & Shrub Sale


Trees and shrubs provide important shelter, shade, and forage for wildlife during all seasons. Trees and shrubs also benefit you like by shading your property and home, pro-

and your family by shading your property and home, providing you with food and, of course, beautifying your yard.

The Blacksmith Fork and North Cache Conservation Districts offer bare root shrubs and trees to the public. The types offered are known to grow well in northern Utah climates and are often quick growing. Purchasing plants as "bare roots" provides an affordable option for a tree or shrub that, when planted in the spring, has a greater chance of becoming established. The bare roots are offered in bundles of 10. Check with neighbors and friends to see if you can make a cooperative purchase and split up the bundles.

Information on plant species and a printable order form can be located at https://www.uacd.org/cash-valley-tress-sale. Orders must be placed no later than April 5 and plants must be picked up at the Cache County Fairgrounds on Saturday, April 22.

Reminders from Nibley City Staff



Sump Pumps

Nibley City prohibits sump pumps from being connected to the City's sewer system. Nibley City Code 15.04.040.J states: Surface Runoff Or Ground Water: No person shall make connection of roof downspouts, foundation drains, field drains, or other sources of surface runoff or ground water, to a building sewer or building drain which in turn is connected di-

rectly or indirectly to a public sanitary sewer.

Nibley City needs your help to minimize sump pump water from being discharged into the City's sewer system, especially during the spring run-off. Unfortunately, *illegal* discharge into the sewer can result in the sewer system operating at maximum capacity and could cause sewage to back-up into your home. Nibley City also has to pay Logan City for every gallon of wastewater we send them for treatment. A sump pump could cost the city thousands in extra treatment charges.



Downspout extenders

Preventing water damage should be among every homeowner's top priorities, which means seriously considering downspout extensions–even if your standard spouts and gut-

ters are well-cleaned and in good working order.

The placement of a quality downspout extension will help to keep water from dispelling next to your home. This is important because the accumulation of water around the base of your home will cause costly damages to your basement, patio, or structure of your home.

Sewer Rate Increase

According to Resolution 18-02, residential sewer rates will increase by \$1.00 a month in March 2023. This means that the sewer portion of your utility bill will be \$55.00 monthly instead of \$54.00. These fees cover your household's wastewater collection and treatment. Please let our office know if you have any questions about this scheduled rate increase.

Wait, do we have too much of a good thing this year? Are we worried about flooding? Maybe. If you go back to the first graph, we start to worry about flooding when the Blacksmith Fork flow rates approach 800 cubic feet per second (ft^3/s). I remember seeing over 1000 ft^3/s on years that we were packing sandbags. City staff have already been meeting to be prepared if we get close to flooding, and we will let you know through Nibley's website, through social media, and through the emergency text service (if you are signed up for it) when, or if, there is a flooding threat, along with the appropriate actions to take.

OK, one more graph, and once the spring runoff starts, this one is the most interesting. The graph below shows the instantaneous, or real-time, flow rates on the Blacksmith Fork measured every 15 minutes. It's not very interesting right now, but it will be in a month. The top dotted line just above 70 ft^3/s shows the historic, most-common flow rate for the past week, the solid blue line shows the flow rates from last year, and the yellow line shows the most recent measurements. The blue region of the chart indicates when measurements were not available because the gage was fouled by ice. This is the graph to watchalong with forecasts from the experts- when we start to worry about flooding. At 50 ft^3/s, we are currently a long way from flooding concerns, but we are also a long way from the peak runoff that usually occurs during the first week of May. Thanks for indulging me with a bunch of data and charts this month. As you likely know, I split my time between being mayor and an environmental instrumentation engineer, and I get excited when those two lives intersect.
