Mayor Jacobsen's Message



Heritage Days! One of the three reasons for having city government. We have Heritage Days to help make us proud to live in Nibley. To put the "home" in hometown. The Children's Theater, the Community Dinner, the parade, Party in the Park with fireworks, and more (additional information in this newsletter). These events give us pride in our community. The other two reasons for city government providing services and enabling local control—could really

be subheadings of a single reason for having city government. To make us proud to live in Nibley. While applying for this job (aka campaigning), I made a deal with myself to approach every decision after the election with a simple goal. To make our citizens proud of where they live. At times it might be hard to decide on the details of how we achieve that goal. We can discuss budgets, taxes, paying for parks, zoning, ordinances, planning for growth, preserving open space, ways to balance individual property rights with the rights of our community, and on and on. However, for me the overall strategic goal is clear: my job is to help make us proud to live in Nibley.

The second topic for this newsletter is serving our community. How is that connected to Heritage Days? As I see it, there is a straight-forward path.

Cultivating pride in our community grows into service to our community. When we are proud of where we live, we put our best foot forward. Because that best foot can include service, we all benefit. Consider how many good things have happened in Nibley because people gave their time and talent to serve our community. Think of how much additional good there is to be had. When Becky and I moved to Nibley, we were (and still are!) proud to be here. That pride led us to be involved in our kid's schools, to Becky helping organize a Wildlife Committee and promoting pollinator gardens in Nibley City, and to me joining the Planning Commission. For others, it could be volunteering to coach a youth athletic team, helping at city celebrations, working with the Children's Theater, serving on the Parks and Recreation Committee, or any of the other important and rewarding ways to serve our community.

I will close by returning to Heritage Days, Nibley isn't unique when sponsoring town celebrations like Heritage Days. Everybody should be proud to live where they live, even if it isn't Nibley. If you look around the valley, then you will see lots of chances to participate in other town's celebrations. They are all open to neighboring citizens to share the uniqueness of individual communities and to celebrate the commonality of our larger community. Ginny's Pit Stop—In 1979 the Harris family opened Bob's Service, a service station/repair shop/ convenience store on the corner of their property in Nibley. Their goal was to provide a place for their friends and neighbors to grab a gallon of gas for their mowers, or a gallon of milk and a loaf of bread without having

to drive all the way into Logan. They were also able to provide a place for their friends, their children, grand-children and neighborhood kids to work. It also was known as a favorite spot for the young kids to ride their bikes or scooters to the corner store to shop for penny candy and other treats during their growing up years.

After over 30 years of running their business Bob and Virginia (Harris) decided it was time to let someone else take over so they leased it out to several different mechanics during the next 10+ years. After their passing in 2019 the family began making plans to bring back a family business to honor their parents legacy. This time they decided to name it after Virginia but still keep the service station theme–hence, Ginny's Pit Stop was born –featuring flavored soda's, cookies and other savory snacks all baked from scratch in-house. Their treats all carry an automobile-themed name.

So now the legacy lives on-once again many community members are employed at Ginny's, and the neighborhood kids can once again be seen riding their bikes and scooters down the sidewalks to the corner store for their drinks and treats.

Protecting Water Sources in the Spring

Think Twice about Lawn and Garden Chemicals-

Water is a precious commodity, more so because Utah has been in drought eight of the last ten years. Help protect our water sources by limiting the use of pesticides or fertilizers, and always follow the label directions. Many fertilizers and pesticides contain harmful chemicals which can travel through the soil and contaminate groundwater or run off in stormwater to rivers, streams, and lakes. Fertilizer helps things grow, but when it gets in water, it helps algae grow. Algae blooms can cause major problems in waterways because they use up oxygen needed by other river critters. Pesticides, intended to kill bugs around our homes, also damage the important ecosystems that live in creeks, rivers, lakes, and the ocean.

Dogs and Sports Fields

Our park ordinance allows dogs, on a leash, at all of our parks (except for Firefly Park), as long as the leash is NOT retractable or wireless and is no more than 8' long. Also please be aware that dogs are NOT allowed, even on a leash, on any athletic field whether that field is in use

by athletes or not. How do you know if there is an athletic field at a park? The ball diamonds are the most obvious with backstops, bases, dugout benches, and in some cases outfield fences, however, if there are painted lines, typically rectangular shapes, painted on grass at one of our parks, anything inside of those lines is an athletic field. Most of these fields, depending on the year and season, are located at Heritage Park, Clear Creek Park, Elkhorn Park, and Anhder Park, and they may or may not have a soccer goal on each end. Thank you for respecting these ordinances, created for the health, safety, and enjoyment of participants and spectators utilizing these fields for a variety of sports and activities. Our community and city staff LOVE dogs but we want to remind dog owners that it is all about time and place. While many communities strictly prohibit dogs in any public space, we trust that our community can respect one another in the use of our public parks by managing their dogs use of the park as outlined here, and in Nibley City ordinances. Please be aware that failure to follow these ordinances can result in a citation and fine from a Cache County Sheriff or Animal Control officer. Thanks you for your cooperation and consideration of all park users.



Park Pavilion Reservation

Nibley City park pavilion reservations are now open. Make sure to reserve your use of a Nibley City pavilion as soon as possible to ensure you don't miss your chance. Nibley's four pavilions can be reserved online at a cost of \$35 per pavilion, per day. If you'd also like to reserve the kitchen at the Elkhorn Park pavilion there is an additional \$25 fee and a refundable deposit must be paid to pick up a key.



How Can We Preserve Our Rural Heritage as Development Pressure Increases?—There are several tools in use across the Country and in Utah that communities can consider to address the above question. The City is discussing one concept called Transfer of Develop-

ment Rights (TDR).

Transfer of Development Rights (TDR) is a zoning tool that helps to preserve the character of a community by assigning theoretical developments rights to properties intended for preservation that can be transferred to an area where more density is acceptable. TDR provides a new property right, one that landowners do not have now. In a TDR system, the theoretical development rights attached to a property that the community wants to preserve can be purchased by a developer in a private, market-based negotiation for use in another part of the community. The land that the development rights are purchased from is permanently preserved for farming or some other open space purpose. TDR is a totally voluntary process where the City simply sets up the framework for a private transaction (e.g., developer/ farmer negotiation) through an ordinance.



Nibley City is considering setting up a TDR system. The graphic covers the concept but there are hurdles that need discussion. Generally, most communities can agree on what areas should be preserved, but determining what areas are the best to receive the transferred density is usually more difficult.
