Thoughts From Mayor Dustin

I just want to update you on a couple of projects, propose a new organization, and announce a contest that's not a contest.

Please keep your ATVs, UTVs and motorcycles out of the new nature park. There are lots of places to ride, but only one place in the valley with fireflies. Fencing the area would cost the taxpayers about \$100,000, and it's not a necessary expense. If you see someone riding in there, give the Sheriff a call.

The contest That's Not a Contest—It's winter and it's going to start snowing. For some people in our house, that's really exciting. For others (me) it's not. My Dad says the great thing about the weather up here is that it keeps the riff-raff out. So, congratulations—by virtue of your decisions that brought you here and keep you here, you are all, by definition, not riff-raff. We have a City with no riff-raff.

I'm announcing the Passing it Forward Non-Contest. It's not a contest, because there are no losers, only winners. Catch someone shoveling someone else's driveway or sidewalk. A New Organization for the Blacksmith Fork River?—The Blacksmith Fork River is a beautiful asset to the City and the valley. It is the source of the water that made agriculture, and therefore the establishment of this city possible. It feeds canals that provide water to farmers and landowners, habitat to wildlife, recreation to free range kids and the fishermen, and beauty to all of us. It is also a management challenge to us as a government. The ownership of land on the river is fractured. The river belongs to private individuals, trusts, the City and County, and some, per the County records, doesn't belong to anyone. The riverbed dries up most years, leading to water quality problems and the fish die. Flooding threatens public and private property on a regular basis and irrigation companies are facing new and difficult challenges with changes in land use as farm ground is broken up and sold.

Everyone in Nibley is a stakeholder in the river. As a city, we all pay for flood mitigation on the river. We all own shares in the irrigation companies, deal with the impacts of flooding when the canals are over full, and we all own the parks and trails that have access to the river. River problems are not exclusive to the people that have to sandbag in the spring. However, we all benefit from the vital spark that the river brings to this community.

For the past five years, I've thought long and hard about what we can do to protect this incredible natural asset, the property rights of those who own the ground around the river, the rights of those who own water rights, and the habitat and environmental benefits that make this such an incredible resource. I still don't know what to do. I know what we need to accomplish—I've already outlined that. I know the City has the resources to help solve some of the problems but the City and the Mayor may not be the best political entity to address this problem. We can be a part of the solution, but an independent river commission,

Winter Parking

Nibley City's Limited Winter Parking ordinance (6-1-4D.) is now being enforced until April 1 of 2019. Please keep vehicles off the street between the hours of 12:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. to avoid a parking ticket.

month in the Bear River Environment Health office at 7:00 p.m. The term would begin January 1, 2019 and continues for four years.




Millville/Nibley Cemetery District Board

Prepare Your Home for Winter Weather

Cold temperatures and winter weather will be here before we know it. There are steps you can take in advance for greater wintertime safety in your home.

• Listen to weather forecasts and check your emergency supplies whenever a period of extreme cold is predicted. Periods of extreme cold cannot always

be predicted far in advance but weather forecasts can provide several days' notice.

- If you plan to use a fireplace or wood stove for emergency heating, have your chimney or flue inspected each year.
- If you'll be using a fireplace, wood stove, or kerosene heater, install a smoke detector and a battery-operated carbon monoxide detector near the area to be heated. Test them monthly and replace batteries twice a year. All fuel-burning equipment should be vented to the outside.
- If you are over 65 years old, place an easy-to-read thermometer in an indoor location where you will see it frequently. Your ability to feel a change in temperature decreases with age. Older adults are more susceptible to health problems caused by cold.
- If you have pets, bring them indoors. If you cannot bring them inside, provide adequate shelter to keep them warm and make sure they have access to unfrozen water.

Checklist

- ☐ Insulate walls and attic.
- ☐ Caulk and weather-strip doors and windows.
- ☐ Install storm windows or cover windows with plastic from the inside.
- ☐ Insulate any water lines that run along outer walls, making water less likely to freeze.
- ☐ Service snow-removal equipment.
- ☐ Have chimney and flue inspected.
- ☐ Install easy-to-read indoor thermometer.
- ☐ Repair roof leaks and cut away tree branches that could fall on your home or other structure during a storm.

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Cache Valley Wildlife Association

Please join Nibley City in congratulating Ron Hellstern and the Cache Valley Wildlife Association (CWA). The CWA was named Organization of the Year and Ron was given the Lifetime Achievement Award by the Utah Society for Environmental Education (USEE). The EE Organization of the Year award is given to a non-profit organization that has made a major contribution to environmental education in Utah.

Ron Hellstern's award was given for a lifetime of dedication and achievement in environmental education. You might recall, in 2016 Ron helped Nibley become the first city in Utah to earn Certified Wildlife Habitat status from the National Wildlife Federation, after working

tirelessly to help Nibley's citizens prepare and designate their properties as wildlife friendly habitats. Ron has 42 years of teaching experience and is the Education Chair of the United States and Canadian North American Environthon. You may have also heard Ron on Utah's Public Radio as he is a writer and the voice for "Wild About Utah." Nibley Councilman Larry Jacobsen (and CWA member) said,

"Ron is inspirational as a real-world Lorax-one who speaks for the trees. Becky and I are in awe of Ron's tireless promotion and work to benefit nature, especially when nature cannot promote and defend itself."

Freezing temperatures are tough on wildlife, especially when food is scarce. Flowers are gone and pollinators have migrated or gone dormant. Many of our native songbirds have traveled south, not be-

cause of the colder temperatures, but because of the reduction in food supplies. Birds who share winter months with us (like chickadees, finches, sparrows, towhees, and juncos) take their chances in hopes that they'll find sufficient food supplies.

Considering the benefits birds provide us, such as insect control, beauty and song, we should assist them by providing food through winter. Winter is one of the easiest seasons to lure birds into your backyard. Because the rigid season gives rise to some of the highest bird mortality rates of the year, birds are naturally drawn into any safe havens you create. Black oil sunflower seeds are the best choice due to their high fat content. However, mixed seeds will also suffice.

Make sure your feeder is placed in an area to provide shelter from wind, hawks, and cats.

like the one that operates on the Logan River, might be of benefit to the River, and by extension to all of us that have an interest in the river.

The City can offer some things. The City has water rights that can be used to keep water in the river year round if we can find the right legal framework. The City has resources that can be used to improve flood control and public access to publicly-owned property. But the City cannot, and doesn't have any interest in trying to take anyone's property on the river or forcing them to sell it, telling canal companies how to run their operations, or spending taxpayer money for improvements on private property. A river commission can't do any of these things either, but might provide a forum where we can work through these issues and preserve and manage an asset that is important to all of us. This leaves two questions . . .

- 1. What can we do to preserve and improve the Blacksmith Fork River?
- 2. Would a Commission help?

Doing nothing isn't really an option. The problems are going to get harder as the population grows and river ownership fractures. We can do this if we put our heads together. Please let the City Council and me know what you think. If you own land on the river, please check your records and check with the County to make sure you know your ownership and your rights. If we decide to have this conversation, it's important that we all know where we stand.

Project Update–Pickleball and Tennis courts should be done by spring. We are working with Logan and UDOT on the light at 3200 S. and Highway 89. The intersection is in Logan, not Nibley, so we are negotiating with Logan to move our city boundaries and bring the intersection into Nibley. We hope the project will be complete by 2020. We are also working with UDOT on the light at the other end of 3200 S. That light is going to be stopping traffic coming northbound later this fall.
