One time, when my kids were very small, we spent a Saturday morning teaching my son, Luke how to ride a two-wheeler without training wheels. When he felt confident, Layla offered to take him for a bike ride to enjoy his newfound ability. We gave her permission with two important caveats: they had to stay on the sidewalk and they couldn't cross any streets. In our parent minds, this meant they would ride down the sidewalk a ways and then turn

around and ride back home on the sidewalk. They set off together and after a few minutes, when we didn't see them, we started to wonder. Then we started to worry. Then we set out to find them. My wife was panicking and praying. After what seemed like hours but was only about half-an-hour, they came calmly riding up on their bikes to find us really worked up. After the questions and lectures and hugs and relief, it came down to them following our rules. They stayed on the sidewalk and didn't cross any streets; they assured us they just "went around the block." In our Nibley Gardens neighborhood, this meant they went on a very convoluted and long ride that, luckily for all of us, ended up back at our house again.

One of my priorities as mayor has been sidewalks and trails. They serve important practical functions to get people from here-to-there safer, and they also serve a social function to unite our community. When we go out for a walk or a bike ride, we invariably pass neighbors, friends, and strangers who wave hello just because. While we don't own the land along the front of our homes that the sidewalks sit on, we do have responsibility to maintain it. This can mean trimming trees and shrubs to keep the path clear for pedestrians. With winter coming, it also means clearing snow.

One day while driving through our neighborhood after a particularly big snowstorm, I saw a very small boy with his backpack on trudging through the snow in his boots and warm coat. He was on his way to school, was already late and still about a quarter mile away. The snow was up to his knees and with each step he took, he sunk in, making his short walk to school one that he'll be telling his kids about some day (I don't think it was uphill both ways though). Seeing him that morning made me wish I could safely stop and offer him a ride, but long-term made me decide to always keep my sidewalk clear for the kids who walk to school, the adults who walk their dogs, the teens who play Pokemon Go, the parents who push strollers, and

the kids who just learned how to ride a two-wheeler without training wheels.

Reminders from Nibley City Staff

Nibley City Hall-Closed



Nibley City Hall will be closed Wednesday, November 11 for Veteran's Day and Thursday, November 26 & Friday, November 27 so our employees can celebrate Thanksgiving with their families.

Nibley's Greenwaste Location

Nibley's greenwaste dump site at 3390 South 1200 West <u>is</u> now closed. The location will open again in the Spring.

Your other available options are to take your greenwaste, including leaves and tree trimmings, to the Logan City Greenwaste facility located at 153 North 1400 West. The Logan facility is open year-round and there is no charge for dropping off greenwaste. Residents may also order a green waste can for their home by calling 716-9755. There is a \$4/month charge for these cans, which are picked up from your curb April through November.

Keeping Nibley Beautiful

Never dump leaves or other yard debris in a canal or other waterway. Nibley City code 19.24.230-T. states, "It is unlawful for any person to place . . . any trash, yard waste or other waste material, other than irrigation water, in any conveyance structure . . . Violation of this provision constitutes a Class B misdemeanor."



Leaves are a great composting material. Consider mulching leaves into your garden space or flower beds instead. Carbon-rich leaves balance high-nitrogen compost ingredients such as fresh grass clippings. Com-

posting leaves creates a nutrient-rich garden soil and is also a terrific way to recycle.



Do not push snow into the street

Our Nibley City's Public Works crews do a fantastic job keeping our roads clear and safe during Cache Valley's numerous snowstorms. Let's do our part to help them out by

not pushing or shoveling snow from our driveway or sidewalks into the street. Please keep the snow on your property. Pushing extra snow into the streets is a safety issue and can cause icing problems. And there is actual a state law prohibiting this. The law states: "It is unlawful for any person to place snow from a driveway onto any road or highway which interferes with the normal use or creates a safety hazard."

Other snow reminders:

- Do not allow children to make snow forts in snow piles or at the edge of the road
- be pushed to the side of the road. If you have a neighbor who is unable to remove the snow from their driveway or in front of their mail boxes, please assist them.
- Residents and businesses should remember to clear their sidewalks within a reasonable time after a snow or ice event.

A special thank you to Terry and David Mann, Steve Stowers, and several missionaries who have worked on the pollinator garden at Firefly Park on a weekly basis to remove weeds, mark existing perennial plants, and mulch. Combined, this group spent over 100 hours at the park this summer. As a community, we can look



forward to spring when the new plants emerge and not only beautify Firefly Park, but enhance the area in regards to pollinator habitat.



Speaking of pollinator habitat, you might have noticed the multitude of naturally occurring milkweed at Firefly Park. Becky Yeager has conducted two years of studies at the park hoping to document the presence of a monarch breeding population. Adults occasional-

ly flutter through the park but it wasn't until this year that she observed the presence of caterpillars feeding on the milkweed. These efforts in the pollinator garden are sure to enhance the habitat for monarchs, a species in critical decline. This summer, the CVWA also certified the park as a Monarch Waystation thanks to RAE Environmental.

Stormwater Do's and Don't

Do

- Sweep gutters and driveways and place the sweepings in the garden or flower beds.
- Rake leaves or lawn clippings up and use them
 as mulch in the garden
 or place them in the
 garbage.
- Replant areas of disturbed soil.
- Pick up litter in the park or on the street.
- Clean up pet droppings and dispose of them in the garbage can.

Don't

- Don't pile sand and soil in areas where it can wash into the stormwater system.
- Rake leaves or lawn clip- Don't use too much pings up and use them fertilizer.
 - Don't drop litter or cigarette butts on the ground.
 - Don't leave litter where bins are already full.
 - Don't leave grass clippings or leaves in the street when you're doing yard work. Use them for fertilizer, compost, or bag them.


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Recreation Roundup
