Mayor Jacobsen's Message



This month's newsletter topic – snow and winter – is a great one for me. In my other life, away from city hall, I work on environmental instrumentation for a local company. For better or worse, some of my nerdiness might show through in this article. Even if data and graphs aren't your thing, I hope you will keep reading to the end to see some exciting news for Nibley

that is not related to snow.

There wouldn't be a Nibley without water for irrigation and culinary uses. We are fortunate to have access to water that not only comes directly as rain, but more importantly, from snow that accumulates in the mountains that surround Cache Valley. While a lot of the water in the snowpack runs past Nibley during the spring runoff, a significant amount soaks into the soil. That water percolates through the strata to sustain flows in the Blacksmith River throughout the year for irrigation, and it supplies water to springs and deeper aquifers. Nibley City pumps water from those deeper aquifers, ensures it is safe to drink, and puts that water in pipes that run to our homes. Snowfall is the source of much of our water, and our mountainous geology stores that water for use throughout the year. Pretty neat system.

Because water from snow is so important to us, we want to know how much water is accumulating in the snowpack in the mountains. The Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) makes those measurements at various locations available to meteorologists who forecast water supplies, and even more fun, to the public. The above graph shows last year's accumulated precipitation, along with the snowpack water at Bug Lake. The y-axis is inches of water. This site is east of Nibley and near the boundary between Cache and Rich Counties. It is one of the many locations that meteorologists use to forecast our water supply. As you know, we are in an historic drought throughout the western US. However, last year's precipitation (rain and snow) at this site (the black line) was very close to normal (the grey line). Last year's snowpack water (in blue) was about 75 percent below normal (in red). There is lots of discussion to be had about the data at this site, and more importantly, the trends over time along with trends from additional sites. This article won't go into all that. However, if you want to "keep score" at Bug Lake this winter, here is link to the NRCS data https://tinyurl.com/Bug-Lake-Snow. It's early in the water year, so there's not much to see yet. However, that will change with time. Let's hope for a good snow year.

The second topic for this article is not related to snow. If you follow my on-line status reports (the *Mayor's Journal* on www.nibleycity.com), then you likely know that we have applied for funding to build 1200 West through a county-wide, voter-approved, local-option sales tax. We submitted three separate

GOAL FOR NOVEMBER

Remember important items that may be overlooked when leaving your home in a disaster.



An Emergency is easier to handle when you have prepared ahead of time. Put together an emergency kit with important items to keep

at home, and a go bag with items you will need to take with you if you evacuate. Think about what you and your family would need in a disaster. You can make kits for your home, car or workplace. Emergencies can happen anywhere.

When severe weather is predicted, make sure your car has a full tank of gas. You don't want to wait in line for gas if you are told to evacuate. Some storms may also knock out electricity, causing gas stations to close.

TASKS

- Gather emergency supplies in an accessible place.
- Create an emergency supply kit for your pet, your car, and your workplace or school.
- Stash some cash in case ATMs and credit card machines are not usable in a disaster.

Cleaner Street, Cleaner Water—Nibley City's storm drainage system is designed to efficiently carry rain and snowmelt away from our streets and homes. Storm drainage inlets are the grates or openings usually located in the street near the curb. Storm drains ARE NOT con-



nected to sewage treatment plants, so all storm water, and the litter it carries from the streets, goes strait to our streams, creeks, rivers, and lakes. Liter adds bacteria and nutrients that hurt water quality, damages the environment, and creates unhealthy conditions for animals and humans.

You Can Help!—Please keep trash and debris,

automobile fluids, leaf litter and organic matter off the streets. *Remember* . . . the drain is just for rain . . . and sometimes snow.

Reminders from Nibley City Staff

Winter Parking

Winter parking regulations are now being enforced. Be sure to keep your vehicles off the street between the hours of 12:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. to avoid a parking ticket.

Winter parking regulations were enacted to keep streets clear should Nibley's Public Works department need to clear the roadways after a storm. This ordinance applies whether or not there is snow on the ground.

Nibley's Greenwaste Location

The green waste dump site at 3390 South 1200 West will close November 18. It will open again in the Spring. Likewise, green waste cans will not be picked up after November 18.

You must now take your greenwaste, including leaves and tree trimmings, to the Logan City Green Waste facility located at 153 North 1400 West. The Logan facility is open yearround and there is no charge for dropping off greenwaste. Hunting

It is against the law to discharge a firearm within 600 feet of a residence within Nibley City limits.

Hunting or harassing wildlife is also forbidden on all City property. Ordinance 13-04 prohibits hunting on property owned by Nibley City and states, "Hunting, as defined in \$23-13-2, Utah Code Annotated, which shall include hunting with firearms or with bows, each as defined by the laws of the State of Utah, ... is prohibited on properties owned by Nibley City."

Why Did the Woolly Bear Caterpillar Cross the Road?



Most of us have heard the recent push to "*Leave your Leaves*" for the sake of many of our declining insect species who use the leaf layer to overwinter. This also benefits other

wildlife by providing food and shelter. Pictured is a specific reason to *Leave your Leaves*... the fuzzy woolly bear caterpillar.

In late fall, the harmless and captivating fuzzy woolly bear caterpillar crawls across sidewalks and roads looking for shelter under the leaf layer where they will hibernate for the winter. In spring, they spin a cocoon and later, emerge as an Isabella tiger moth. This is true of many of our beneficial native bees, butterflies, and other insects that serve as critical pollinators for the food we eat and the flowers we enjoy.

As an added benefit, raking the leaves into your gardens eliminates the need (and effort) to dispose of them and provides excellent compost and protection for your gardens. Think of the woolly bear!

Now is the Time - Register Your Dog



Did these adorable puppies grab your attention? . . . Good! Their furry faces should remind you that it's time to renew your 2023 dog license. Renew between now and December 31, 2022 to qualify for early-bird pricing (which is a \$10 discount). This year when you register your dog during the discount period you'll be entered into a prize drawing and we swear on these adorable puppies that you'll want one of the prizes that our animal licensing staff has lined up. 2023 dog licensing fees are as follow:

If needed, please provide proof of your current rabies vaccination during registration. It may not be well known, but rabies is a fatal but preventable viral disease. Part of the reson Nibley City requires ALL dogs to be registered is to ensure our canine population is rabis vacinated. The other reason Nibley City requires dog registration is to collect the fees needed to pay our annual contract with Cache County Animal Control, which is bacially animal law enforcement. Even with the regstrations that are collected, Nibley City has to subsidize a portion of this annual contract price. We encourage all residetns who have a dog to ensure their "best friend" is registered with Nibley City to do their part in providing animal control services.

Your dog must be licensed with the city within 30 days of moving into city limits or at 6 months of age.


