# **Getting to Know Nibley's Candidates for City Council**



Larry Anhder—I have worked in local government for 35 years with a Masters degree in Public Administration and Public Finance. After my wife Margot and I returned from our mis-

sion to Argentina I was struck with the idea that serving on the City Council was a way to give back to our lovely city for all that it has given to us. We have lived and raised our 5 kids in Nibley for nearly 30 years. I coached their youth sports and believe strongly in the city's role to help provide recreational activities for kids. I am also interested in restoring Nibley's financial strength. We need council members that understand the financial reports and the financial condition of the city. We have lost about a fifth of our water supply with the accident earlier this year. We need to complete the new well immediately. I would also like to see the city improve the entrances to our community. I believe we should proudly announce to all that they are welcome to a lovely community . . . not so much in words, as in attractively landscaped entrance features. Being retired, I have the time and the expertise to dedicate my best efforts to Nibley City. I feel I have the experience to understand the background of the issues facing the city and have the vision to help plan the future. I am pleased and excited to be a candidate for the Nibley City Council.



Larry Jacobsen—My wife Becky and I moved to Nibley 19 years ago. I served on the Planning Commission for five years, and I have been a member of the City Council for the past nine years. My passion in city govern-

ment is finding the proper balance between individual property rights and the rights of the community. More than twenty years ago, a landowner exercised her property rights to develop land, and by doing so, enabled Becky and me to build a house and raise a family here in Nibley. I am sincerely grateful for the process that made this possible. The community also has rights, and sometimes they are in conflict with individual property rights. If we ignore those community rights, we will lose the very things that the citizens of Nibley treasure. The process that establishes the proper balance between individual and community rights starts with open and honest planning where the citizens identify what they do not, and what they do, want to change in our community. Next, the process enacts ordinance that implements the plan and deals with its financial realities. Finally, the process enforces the ordinance fairly and evenly. I am proud to have been a part of each of these

activities during the past 14 years, and if the citizens of Nibley would like me to keep working on them, then I would be honored to do so.



*Tim Ramirez*—I moved to Cache Valley in 2004 where I started a career in law enforcement at the Cache County Sheriff's Office. I have served in the Jail, Criminal, and Support divisions as a corrections deputy, inmate transportation deputy, pa-

trol deputy, and detective. As a detective, I worked as an agent with the Cache/Rich Drug Task Force and worked as a property crimes detective. I am currently a team leader on the Cache County SWAT team and also work in Hyrum as their designated town deputy. I hold a position as the legislative co-chair with the Cache County Republican Party and have been a state and county delegate. My wife Kate and I recently had our first child and I am looking to serve the community where we plan to raise our family.
