## **Thoughts From Mayor Dustin**



My kids come to me every once in a while and ask me for money. I always try to come back with, "What are you going to do with it?" If they don't have a plan, then the answer is an easy "no." If they do have a plan, then they know that I am willing to talk to them.

We manage the City budget the same way. When I vote for someone now, the thing at the front of my mind is that I am

**Mayor Shaun Dustin** giving someone the power to spend my money-money that I earned through hard work and takes me away from my family and the things I want to do for fun. If I am going to be giving my money to other people to spend, and to people that I might love, but not as much as I love my kids, then I expect them to have a plan. And I expect a better plan from grown-ups than I do from a 10 year old.

That's why our City staff and our Council invest time and effort into planning. First, we should be budgeting around your priorities–not necessarily individual priorities, but community priorities. A good plan asks people what they need. Second, once we know what the needs are, good plans will document those needs and commit to making them happen. From that commitment, we can figure out costs. Then we can match the priority and the cost against the budget.

Have you ever made a plan and it doesn't go the way that you expected? Sometimes plans don't work exactly the way we want them to. That great American philosopher Michael Gerard Tyson once said that, "Everyone has a plan until they get punched in the face." When something unexpected happens, that doesn't mean that the plan was bad or the effort was wasted. Sometimes life throws us a curve ball. The important thing about planning is that when the plan doesn't work out, and even though we may not get the result that we wanted right now, we still know where we want to go when we regroup.

So if you want to know what the plans are for Nibley, you can go to the City's redesigned website or come in and talk to Stephen Nelson, your City Planner. If you want to get to the nitty-gritty of how the money is being spent, you can also look at the city budget (also on the website). Finally, if you want to have a say in how it's all done, 1) vote in November, 2) volunteer and/or comment when the City is working on a plan, and 3) talk to your representatives. We represent you best when we know how you feel.

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# Meet the Candidates for City Council



**Tom Bernhardt**—I've lived in Nibley since December 2007. I served briefly on the Planning & Zoning Board prior to serving as a Councilmember starting in 2015. These last 4 years it has been a great privilege to serve you, the citizens

of Nibley. I've also enjoyed working with the other members of the Council, the Mayor, and city staff.

Dealing with growth and trying to balance the vision of maintaining the rural feel of Nibley that the citizens helped define in Nibley City's General Plan is a good example of a continued issue that the City Council will be faced with over the next several years. The decision on the best way to grow affects all of us in many different ways. I've tried to make sure that I've listened to citizens concerns, both during council meetings and individually, and make decisions based on the input and what current ordinance allows.

Approving annual budgets and setting property tax rates are additional examples of difficult decisions that need to be made. This has a direct impact to you as it involves your money. I do listen to the citizens' concerns and try to balance those concerns with the necessity of ensuring that the city continues to be in a solid fiscal position, now and well into the future.

My goal is to continue working hard to maintain Nibley as a gem of the valley. With your vote and support I know that we can continue to do that.

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exchange for suburban and commercial developments. However, these changes provide opportunities for great places to recreate, new business and economic opportunities, and the development of great places to live.

Because of the challenges and opportunities that Nibley City faces, we are taking steps to ensure we have a plan for future growth to help enhance the lives of all that live here. The Nibley City General Plan was adopted in 2016 and helps guide the City by outlining the vision for Nibley City housing, economic development, transportation, utilities, growth, and the general character of the City. In addition to the General Plan, the City has several other master plans to provide more detail for the needs of the City. These include transportation, water, sewer, stormwater, economic development, future land use, annexation, financial stability, open space, parks, recreation, and trails. All of these plans are available to the public and can be found on the Nibley City website under Departments; Planning & Zoning; Master Plans.

## **Cache Valley Wildlife Association**

Nibley City and the Cache Valley Wildlife Association will be hosting several activities at Firefly Park on Saturday, October 12, from 10:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m. The City will dedicate a pollinator garden that has been designed to attract and support pollinating insect and birds. Bring your gloves and shovel and help plant more plants in the pollinator garden at Firefly Park. Nibley City is providing the plants for this butterfly-shaped garden. The specific plants used will provide nectar for bees, butterflies, and hummingbirds.

Finally, bring seeds collected from your garden or those that didn't quite make it into the ground this summer, to share with others at a plant and seed exchange. Also, bring over zealous perennials from your yard; this is a great time to thin them out. However, you don't need to bring anything. Simply come pick up seeds/plants and chat about types that do well in our area.

Nibley's City Council meets the second and fourth Thursday of each month at 6:30 p.m. at Nibley City Hall. The Nibley City Planning Commission meets the first and third Thursday of each month at 6:00 p.m. Meetings are open to the public. Agendas, minutes, and ordinances are posted on the Nibley City website: www.nibleycity.com and www.pmn.utah.gov.

Nibley City keeps plans updated with the newest inland uses, such as vast fields of cattle, alfalfa, and corn in formation and examines and updates a master plan each year. In the past twelve months, the City has updated the Future Land Use Map, Annexation Policy Plan, and the Transportation Master Plan and is currently updating the Water Master Plan and is creating a new Moderate Income Housing Plan. The Water Master Plan will help Nibley plan for new water infrastructure and water conservation. The Moderate Income Housings Plan reviews Nibley City's current housing, zoning, subdivision options, and future housing needs. The City works hard to balance the need for housing developments but maintain open space by using a Rural Preservation Subdivision ordinance and Residential-Planned Unit Development ordinance. These ordinances are designed to allow property owners to realize the value of their property but maintain some open space within those developments.
