All registered voters in Nibley City will receive their ballot in the mail. Ballots will be mailed the

week of October 11. Nibley City voters will get a Ranked Choice ballot (see below).

Once you have carefully cast your vote, you may drop your ballot at the ballot drop box outside of Nibley City Hall or at any number of ballot drop boxes throughout the County. Ballots may be dropped in a ballot drop box through Election Day (Tuesday, November 2). You may also drop your ballot in the mail. Ballots must be postmarked by Monday, November 1, 2021.

Winter Parking*

Plan ahead and be sure to keep your vehicles off the street between November 1 and April 1 between the hours of 12:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. to avoid a parking ticket.

Winter parking regulations were enacted to keep streets clear should Nibley's Public Works department need to clear the roadways after a storm. This ordinance applies whether or not there is snow on the ground. It is also very helpful to pull your garbage containers in from the roadway as soon as possible after pick-up. Cache Valley snowstorms can bury those cans pretty quickly.

Meet the Candidates for Mayor*



Craig J. Peterson—When elected mayor, I will not instantly be smarter, grander, or superior to anyone in our city. I will not be a politician taking over. I will simply be a resident doing my best to serve you and help guide this great city that my

family has called home for over 18 years. I will simply be YOUR representative tasked with leading Nibley. In doing so, I believe we must address the following criteria:

Financial Responsibility—We must make sure our tax rates and fees adequately cover needed services. We must monitor those taxes and fees to guarantee they are needed and efficiently spent, if not those taxes and fees should be reduced or eliminated.

Future Planning—We must balance individual and property rights as we plan. We must guarantee Nibley can handle growth before it is allowed. In Cache Valley, Nibley is projected as the largest city south of Logan by 2030 and the second largest city by 2060. The 2020 Census puts Nibley at 7,328 residents and state projections put us at 14,136 by 2030 and 21,905 by 2060. Those pro-

jections are at a much lower growth rate than our last 50-year average. We must manage growth.

Quality of Life-We must guarantee plans protect air and water quality as well as provide necessary public safety. Growth must not negatively impact the quality of life of the current residents.

I would be honored to be your first choice on the ballot. Choose me to represent YOU.



Larry Jacobsen—Greetings! My name is Larry Jacobsen and I am running for Mayor in Nibley City. I have lived in Cache Valley for 43 years, and my wife, Becky Yeager, and I moved to Nibley 25 years ago where we raised our two


