
Thanks for who you are and all you do, and I hope to see you at the polls in November. It matters.

Head Up, Phone Down When Headed Back to School

Summertime offers a nice reprieve from the constant shuffling of papers, carpools and heavy backpacks of the school year. Now that Fall has rolled around again, parents and kids have a lot to juggle. As your children march out the door for school ev-

ery day, we need to ensure that they get home safely.

A Little History

In 1995, children ages 5 to 9 were more at risk than any other age group under 19 for being struck by a vehicle while walking. The good news is, the death rate for kids of all ages in this category declined more than 50% in the last 20 years. But there is much more work to be done. According to a study by www.SafeKids.org, 61 children are hit by cars every day in the United States, most often during the hours before and after school, and peaking in September. However, there has been a noticeable demographic shift. It is now much more likely a teenager will be hit by a car than his or her younger counterpart. According to a recent study, 47% of pedestrians who died after being hit by a motor vehicle were aged 15-19. During that same time, 16,000 pedestrians ages 19 and younger were injured. That's 44 per day.

Payment is due when the print is ordered and can be paid for with cash, check, or credit card (3% fee will send more than 3,400 texts a month. That's seven messages every hour they are awake. Before your children head out, remind them of these year-round safety tips:

- Never walk while texting or talking on the phone.
- If texting, move out of the way of others and stop on the sidewalk.
- Never cross the street while using an electronic device
- Do not walk with headphones on.
- Be aware of the surroundings.
- Always walk on the sidewalk if one is available; if a child must walk on the street, he or she should face oncoming traffic.
- Look left, right, then left again before crossing the street.
- Cross only at crosswalks.

Not Only Kids Are Distracted

Drivers have a lot to pay attention to in school zones and there is never an occasion that justifies using a phone while driving. One call or text can change everything.

The most common form of travel to school for students age 5 to 14 is the family car. That translates into

a lot of cars in school zones at the same time. Eliminating all distractions is key to keeping children safe.

As the new school year begins, please join Nibley City in doing everything possible to prevent senseless injuries and deaths.

Reminders from Nibley City Staff

Solicitors

Nibley City code (3-4) requires all solicitors or peddlers to obtain a license from Nibley City. Nibley City requires a background check of any individual seeking a license. Solicitors are required to show their license at the request of any citizen. If a solicitor is caught without a license, they can be cited by law enforcement. If you are dealing with an overly-pushy solicitor, whether they have obtained a license or not, it is your right to get law enforcement involved. Officers appreciate the name and a good description of the individual when being called to assist. However, if you are concerned about a solicitor approaching your doorstep, the best course of action may be to simply not open the door.

Keeping Nibley Beautiful

Fall is on its way and our beautiful Nibley trees will start dropping their leaves soon. Please dispose of your yard debris properly. You can pay to have a greenwaste garbage can picked up from your home regularly by calling the Logan Environmental Department at **716-9755**; or Nibley City provides greenwaste bins so you can properly dispose of yard debris. These bins are located at **3390 South 1200 West**.

Never dump leaves and other yard debris in a canal or other open waterway. Not only is this against Nibley City ordinance, it can cause a waterway to back up and may cause flooding.
