
Mayor Jacobsen's Message




In last year's November newsletter article, I longed for a productive water year with meaningful precipitation. It might be old news, but we got it! Although we are still in a historic drought, and a single year by itself won't pull us out of it, the last water year (October to October) was excellent. The graph below shows last winter's water in the snowpack

Mayor Larry Jacobsen at Bug Lake located east of Nibley. Last April's snowpack water (shown by the blue curve) peaked at nearly two times the usual amount (shown by the purple curve). For reference, the green curve shows the snowpack water for 2022.



We had so much snow in the mountains that we began to worry about how quickly that snow might melt and cause flooding on the Blacksmith Fork River. However, springtime conditions weather gave us a well-paced runoff that called for only a few precausandbagging tionary

efforts. The blue curve on the graph below shows the flow rate for the Blacksmith Fork River for the past five years. The yellow curve is the usual flow rate from historical measurements.



Most of our precipitation comes in the winter as snow, and in addition to melting directly into streams and rivers, much of that snow percolates through the soil and emerges at springs and seeps that drain to streams and rivers. That water moves slowly through the soil, and the

process creates storage to give us water throughout the summer. We live in a great place that provides us with this important natural resource.

Not that the extra water last year didn't cause any problems. However, those problems weren't from surface-water flooding; high groundwater was

the culprit. Many homeowners, especially on the west side of Nibley, dealt with water in their basements. Sump pumps that ejected water out to the street gutters saved most, but not all, basements from flooding. We are grateful that Nibley's storm-water system was able to receive the extra water from basement sump pumps and keep up with the extra demand.

Groundwater isn't always our enemy. High groundwater in Nibley has played a major role in shaping land use in our city. Groundwater comes to the surface in many areas and creates wetlands throughout our community. The Clean Water Act of 1972 helped define the federal government's role in protecting water quality in the US. The protection of US bodies of water not only included streams, rivers, lakes, and oceans, but also wetlands. Over the years, the definition of wetlands that are federally protected has shifted back and forth. Last May, the US Supreme Court ruled that moving forward, the only wetlands that will receive federal protection are those that have a "continuous surface connection" to navigable waters and their tributaries.

Why does this matter to Nibley? We have lots of wetlands in our city that have previously received federal protection through the US Army Corps of Engineers. Those wetlands not only affect water quality in Utah, they have also shaped Nibley City's land-use policy and ordinance. Our ordinance has protected wetland open space with federal, state, and municipal regulation. Considering the recent Supreme Court ruling, I worry about Nibley's ability to protect wetlands, and the associated open space, without the help of the federal government. Local governance draws the line between the rights of individual property owners (often represented by developers) and the rights of the community. With that concern, I wrote a letter of support for funding to the State Wetlands Coordinator with the Utah Geological Survey to investigate the state's role in wetlands protection. I am also contributing to draft legislation that could be considered in the upcoming Utah legislative session. It's early days on this topic, and I hope my concern is unfounded. However, Utah legislative actions over the past few years have pitted the Property Rights Coalition, a collection of developers, against Utah municipalities over issues like this. I will keep you posted as this issue evolves.

If you are interested in updates on what Nibley City is working on, I write periodic status reports for my boss (that's you). You can find those reports on Nibley's website under the Mayor's Journal, or if you send me an email, I will send those reports directly to you. I will never share your email address or use it to campaign during an election.

Reminders from Nibley City Staff

Winter Parking



Winter parking regulations are now being enforced. Be sure to keep your vehicles off the street between the hours of 12:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. to avoid a parking ticket.

Winter parking regulations were enacted to keep streets clear should Nibley's Public

Works department need to clear the roadways after a storm. This ordinance applies whether or not there is snow on the ground.

Hunting



It is against the law to discharge a firearm within 600 feet of a residence within Nibley City limits.

Hunting or harassing wildlife is also forbidden on all City property. Ordinance 13-04 prohibits hunting on property owned by

Nibley City and states, "Hunting, as defined in \$23-13-2, Utah Code Annotated, which shall include hunting with firearms or with bows, each as defined by the laws of the State of Utah, . . . is prohibited on properties owned by Nibley City."

Nibley's Green Waste



Nibley's green waste cart pick-up is finished for the season. Nibley City elected officials and staff are currently negotiating with Nibley City's new solid waste service provider, Waste Management, for green waste rates and services for 2024.


TASKS
