Mayor Jacobsen's Message



It is the time of year when Nibley City prepares the budget for the next fiscal year that runs from July 1, 2024 to June 30, 2025. Raise your hand if you get really excited about the Nibley City Budget. (Pause.) Raise your hand if you have ever looked at the Nibley City budget. (Pause.) What comes to mind when you think about a municipal budget? Perhaps rows and col-

Mayor Larry Jacobsen umns of confusing numbers that don't seem to relate to our community? I challenge you to look at the current budget on Nibley's website under Departments/Finance/Budgets. I think you might be surprised. It's not just a bunch of numbers. There are explanations about the city's revenue and expenses for the general fund that supports (1) parks, trails, and open space to acquire, develop, and maintain these assets, (2) street maintenance, (3) fire protection and emergency medical services, (4) law enforcement, and (5) basic governmental activities. You will also find revenues and expenses for specific departments that take care of culinary water, sewer, and storm water services. The budget defines the very essence of why Nibley City exists in the first place.

I wonder why it might be difficult for some folks to get excited about the budgeting process. Maybe it's because budgeting forces us to deal with constraints. It's a lot more fun to dream big about a beautiful destination than it is to wrestle with the obstacles of getting there. Nevertheless, as we aim for an ultimate goal, we need to embrace incremental progress. Because we have limited money, budgeting is incremental progress.

I thought about incremental progress in a recent meeting (one of many to come) to help us write Nibley's first-ever, standalone Active Transportation Plan. During this meeting, we were talking with the Cache County Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC). This is a worthwhile group that does a good job of promoting active transportation throughout

For the third year in a row, Mayor Larry Jacobsen and his wife, Becky Yeager, will give away 100 bare-root trees and shrubs in celebration of Arbor Day and Nibley's Tree City status.

"Bare roots," when planted in the spring, have an excellent chance of establishing in your landscape. The available

trees and shrubs are quick growing, native species that do well in the northern Utah climate. All of them provide food and shelter for birds and nectar for pollinators. The varieties this year are redosier dogwood, peach leaf willow, buffaloberry, elderberry, chokecherry, and golden current. The last three produce berries that you can harvest to make tasty syrups and jams.

Larry and Becky will be handing out the free trees and shrubs on Monday, April 22, from 5:30–6:30 p.m. at the Nibley City Offices (455 West 3200 South). Please, one plant per household, until everyone gets a chance.

Curb Side Green Waste

Weekly curb side green waste pick up will begin on April 1 and will continue through the end of October. Waste Management and the Cache Waste Consortium have been ne-

gotiating the rate and have just recently settled on \$10.50 per month. Nibley City Council has yet to adopt this rate and will meet on April 11 at 6:30 p.m. at Nibley City Hall to discuss it. Historically, the Council has passed the rate charged by Waste Management straight through to Citizens. Citizens will see any rate adjustment on their monthly utility bill, for April services.



Community Clean Up

Nibley City's annual Community Cleanup will be on Saturday, April 20. 4 large dumpsters, 2 for green waste and 2 for general debris, will be offered at 3413 South 1200 West, from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. This services gives Nibley residents the opportunity to dispose of your household debris and dejunk your yards and garage.* Public Works staff will be on hand that day to help you determine if your item(s) can be properly disposed of.

The dumpsters are only available until they are filled and this service has been very popular in the past. Be sure to plan ahead and have your items ready to be hauled away.

*The following items will <u>NOT</u> be accepted: tires, antifreeze, computers/monitors, household cleaners, motor oil, propane cylinders, batteries, fertilizer, yard chemicals, insecticides, pesticides, fungicides, A/C units, paint/paint thinner, refrigeration units, bleach, televisions, gasoline, other fuels, pool chemicals, transmission fluid, or anything containing mercury.

Here at Nibley City we celebrate the budget process. When we begin working on the budget, each of our departments reflects on our priorities, accomplishments, and our goals. We welcome our citizens' amy@nibleycity.com input as well, which can happen at our first

Priorities: What is most important to our citizens? What are the most critical things we need to accomplish? These are the questions we ask as we decide how our budget funds are spent.

Accomplishments: What did we accomplish this year? Were our funds spent according to the plans we made? Goals: What will we try to do next year? How are the funds best spent to accomplish those goals that will make Nibley City a better place to live?


This year Nibley is adding some additional information to our budget, which will include specific, measurable goals and we will add some actual statistics on the work each department is doing so that we can quantify our ongoing efforts. We are also adding information about each department's future goals and plans as we project and plan a few years into our future.

Budget Facts

- Nibley City anticipated receiving \$18.4 million in revenues this current fiscal year, July 2023-June 2024. Almost \$5 million of those funds, or 27%, was anticipated to be sourced from grant revenue.
- Nibley's largest single source of annual income comes from sales tax (\$1.38 million in FY 2022-23). Monthly sales tax income is distributed from the State of Utah and is comprised of taxes that are collected from retail sales both in Nibley and throughout the state.
- Nibley plans for a balanced budget. This means we plan for 1 of 3 possible outcomes: Revenues > expenditures, revenues = expenditures, or revenue and any appropriated fund balances = expenditures.
- Nibley strives for transparency and accountability. Monthly financial statements, annual Budgets, and our Audited Financial Statements are available on our website for you to read.
- You can play a role in this process! By attending budget hearings beginning in May and watching Nibley's social media for announcements, you can review and see our budget before it is voted on. You can contact our City Council with any feedback you may have prior to the finalization of the budget.

We strive to do the best we can to use budgetary funds prudently and responsibly. Please take some time to review Nibley's financial information on our website.

our valley, and they had valuable advice for us. I like to dream about Nibley as a bike-and pedestrian-friendly community where conflicts between modes of transportation never happen. In this ultimate goal, we have separated bike lanes for all levels of riders and pedestrian trails that never compete with vehicle roads. While it's great to aim for that ultimate goal, we must embrace incremental progress.

As we were talking about safety in this meeting, I cited my own experience as a car driver and a bike rider, along with experiences shared with me by others, to voice an opinion that visibility of cyclists and pedestrians was a safety concern. I added that I intend to give away high-visibility vests to interested Nibley residents at some point in our plan-writing process. I was surprised by some push back from a couple of BPAC cyclists. They said that they would not wear a high-visibility vest because cities should provide infrastructure that was so safe that they didn't have to take that precaution. To me, it seemed that aiming for the ultimate goal was getting in the way of incremental progress. Dealing with a constrained budget means we cannot afford to immediately build the ultimate active transportation network. However, with proper planning, we can start on that network. In addition, as we ride and walk in Nibley, we can help drivers see us. Please note that this was not a contentious meeting, and it concluded with the BPAC members telling us they were impressed with Nibley's efforts to provide safe travel for all modes of transportation.

ater production, chalk art, family festivities, parade and many more activities! Save the date for this week long celebration and we will see you there, June 15–June 22.



- 1. Educate the public about pollinators and pollinator habitat, and
- 2. Distribute pollinator-friendly native flowering plants and seeds to enhance or expand habitat for a diversity of pollinators.
