# **Mayor Jacobsen's Message**



Back to school means new and exciting possibilities. New things to learn with new teachers and the prospect of making new friends. Back to school also means a return to familiar themes. A chance to see friends from the previous school year and the return to a more regular cadence for family life. One of the most important yearly themes is the

Mayor Larry Jacobsen continued commitment to safely getting our children to and from school. This requires active cooperation from the schools in Nibley and from Nibley City. That cooperation includes each School Community Council (SCC) establishing Safe Routes to School for every student within walking distance of their respective schools. UDOT publishes these safe routes at https://saferoutes.utah.gov/. It's easy to see why teaching our children to use these routes is important. I also encourage you to review these routes even if you do not have kids walking or biking to school. That review can make you aware of where there is extra kid traffic and help you use extra caution along these safe routes. The website mentioned above also lists benefits of walking and biking to school. Those same benefits of active transportation apply to all of us, even if we have outgrown school as a destination.



Nibley City's part in getting students safely to and from school includes hiring and training crossing guards, contracting with law enforcement, implementing traffic control, designing and retrofitting roads for traffic calming strategies, and building sidewalks. A couple of these items deserve extra attention. I talked about traf-

fic calming in last month's newsletter, and let's talk about traffic control devices for a minute. Traffic control devices include crosswalks, stop signs, speed limits, and flashing beacons. These are all great ways to make Nibley's streets safer. The best way to apply these devices is with a combination of a data-driven process established by traffic experts, as well as through collaboration with Nibley citizens. The data-driven process comes through the nationwide Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD) and helps us understand when these tactics will help, when they will not, and when they might even compromise safety. As an example, it might seem that more stop signs will make vehicles slow down. However, the MUTCD shows vehicle speeds can, in fact, increase between stop signs because drivers try to make up for lost time imposed by stop signs. The MUTCD, along with local traffic measurements conducted by Nibley staff, guide us on when, where, and what traffic control devices will improve safety.

The MUTCD is not the complete solution, however. Nibley citizens have helped city staff and elected officials understand where safety concerns are



the worst. In addition, Nibley citizens have made excellent suggestions about deploying traffic control devices. Recent organized and informal meetings to discuss street safety, which included parents, school officials, law enforcement, city staff, and elected representatives have been very productive. Armed with knowledge of specific concerns and suggested remedies, Nibley staff can perform the appropriate traffic studies, compare the resulting data to the MUTCD, and make safety improvements.

The key role that we all play in getting our students safely to and from school is while we are driving our cars. Safety for pedestrians and cyclists can only come from the conscientious awareness of others who share our streets. Last spring, an unfortunate accident involving a vehicle and a student on their way to school occurred when the vehicle driver proceeded past a crossing guard who was standing in the crosswalk in the middle of the street and holding up a stop sign. Thankfully that student recovered from their injuries. Nevertheless, we all share the responsibility that this-or something even worse-never happens again in Nibley. As our kids head back to school, please be extra aware of them and use extra caution as you drive on Nibley streets.

# **Cleaning Your Car and Driveway**

Dirty water containing soaps, detergents, gasoline, rust, rubber, and motor oils can wash off cars and flow directly to storm drains and into the nearest creek or stream where it can harm water quality and wild life.

What Can You Do to Help?—Minimize the environmental effects of washing your car by using a commercial carwash. They are required to treat their wash water discharge before releasing it to the sanitary sewer system.

Also, be sure to sweep driveways, patios, and sidewalks rather than hosing them down into the storm drains. Put lawn clippings in a compost pile or garbage can.

#### NO PARKING In Front of a Fire Hydrant!



Lookout for the members of our community and be aware of the location of fire hydrants in Nibley City. Be sure to not park in front of them.

Nibley City follows State code (41-6a-1401 (1)(b)(ii), which prohibits parking within 15 feet of a fire hydrant. Obstructions in front of fire hydrants can prohibit

the fire department in the event of a fire, and could cause further loss of property or even loss of life.

#### Controlling Noxious Weeds



We know its the "dog days of summer" but despite the heat, we still have the responsibility to control the weeds on our property(s). Section 4-17-6 of the Utah Noxious Weed Act states:

"noxious weeds standing, being, or growing on such land shall be con-

trolled and the spread of same prevented by effective cutting, tillage, cropping, pasturing, treating with chemicals or other effective methods, or combination thereof . . . " .

The County may enforce control measures on properties with noxious weeds present at the expense of the property owner. For a complete list of declared noxious weeks go to www.cachecounty.gov/vegetationmanagement/.
